For a deputy because Donald Sanders, holding that post under Stults, said this morning that he was leaving the office. Sanders was the choice of the Douglas County Republican Central Committee to receive the appointment as district attorney. He also had the endorsement of Stults.

Sanders, who was on vacation when the surprise announcement of Thompson's appointment was made, said, "As far as I'm concerned, Avery will have an open field to operate in. It's all his."

Regarding his future plans, Sanders said things were still too unsettled to say. He plans to stay in Roseburg where he will enter private practice, he said, but where, or with whom, he did not reveal.

Life Also Low Graduate
 Burgoyne, a graduate of the University of Michigan Law School, is originally from Detroit. He came to Oregon to work as clerk for Supreme Court Justice Earl C. Lorette. Upon the justice's death, he continued working for McAlister who was appointed to fill the vacancy on the high court bench.

Burgoyne's wife, Shirley, also is a graduate of Michigan law school and was a classmate of her husband. She could not understand him sinking so quickly.

Burgoyne said today, and if they come to Roseburg, will open a law office. Presently, she is working as law clerk for Randall B. Kester, supreme court justice.

Legal Action Planned
 Meanwhile, the movement to challenge Thompson's right to the district attorney's post continues to simmer. Roseburg attorney James Richmond said this morning that he has completed a rough draft of a legal action to oust Thompson.

File of the writ will have to be delayed until Thompson takes over the office May 1. At that time, Richmond, chairman of the Douglas County Republican Central Committee, plans to start his maneuver in circuit court.

Republicans in the county are irked over Holmes' appointment of Thompson, a Democrat, to fill the vacancy being left by Stults, a Republican. They feel that the intent of the legislature in passing a law covering appointments to state offices was to have a successor be of the same political party as the predecessor.

The statute, however, refers to the party designation as it appeared on the election ballot. In Stults' case, since he had received the nominations of both parties, was carried on the ballot as a Republican, Democrat. For this reason, the attorney general ruled that Holmes could appoint either a Republican or Democrat.

Honolulu To Portland Liner Sets New Record
 PORTLAND — A Pan American World Airways Douglas Super-C flashed into Portland Saturday after a six-hour-44-minute trip from Honolulu, and an airline spokesman said it was a record for the 2,640-mile flight.

Operations manager Jerry Pick said the plane, which carried 47 passengers and seven crew members, snapped by eight minutes the old mark set Jan. 8, 1953, by a Boeing Stratocruiser.

Capt. John Amundsen, the pilot, said the plane's average ground speed exceeded 335 miles an hour, and hit a top speed of 440 miles an hour.

The plane arrived here at 6:32 a.m.

ervoir in the Grand Coulee of Eastern Washington, but all turned up safely. They blamed their plight on rough water or engine troubles.

At Portland, the wind tore two condemned freighters from their graveyard and sent them with crashing impact against the Hawthorne St. Bridge over the Willamette River. No one was injured.

The derelicts were pulled free Monday and the bridge was reopened to westbound traffic only. The impact tore out 50 feet of railing and crumpled 75 feet of sidewalk.

The ships had been moored at a wharfed yard to be cut into scrap metal. Two fireboats responded quickly to the emergency, slowed the ships down and turned them sideways to reduce the blow to the bridge.

The Portland area was harassed by wind-topped trees. There were about 25 power line breaks in the city area. The Pacific Power and Light Co. reported trouble all the way from Tillamook on the coast to Powell Butte in Central Oregon.

A light plane landed at Troh's airport east of Portland and then was flipped over by the wind.

Heavy rains accompanied the wind in most parts of the Northwest.

Off the entrance to Grays Harbor, John W. Nevill of Seattle, a commercial fisherman, was rescued moments before his fishing boat, the Leona W., sank in the wind-whipped Pacific.

Nevill was five miles offshore when his 40-foot one-man trawler was wrecked by two heavy waves and started to sink. The ship went under so quickly Nevill didn't have time to radio for help or inflate a liferaft. An air bubble kept the bow afloat for a time, and Nevill clung there for 45 minutes until rescue came. He said he would not have been able to hold on another five minutes.

Fortunately, another trawler, the Julia Ann, saw the Leona W. start to sink and radioed an SOS. Then the Julia Ann lost sight of the stricken fishboat and the Rose Mar raced to the scene to save Nevill.

Winds in the Westport area, at the entrance to Grays Harbor, were reported as high as 60 miles an hour. Hoquiam, inside the harbor, reported gusts to 50.

The 69 mph was recorded at Tatoosh Island. The winds reached 32 mph at Seattle.

At Spokane, winds up to 67 mph at hour were recorded. The wind caused considerable minor damage throughout the state. Power failures resulting from downed lines were reported at Spokane, Millwood (Spokane County) and Cheney.

Review reporter that Lane had been able to swim "25 or 30 yards" last summer and he could not understand him sinking so quickly.

The consideration that he might have been able to make it ashore prompted searchers to retrace the route to Lane's home Sunday evening.

Search operations started at mid-afternoon and continued until midnight Sunday. They got under way again at 6 a.m. today. Getting equipment into the scene was extremely difficult because of the muddy, broken character of the old logging road.

Coroner L. L. Powers had high praise for the searchers. The owner of the pond could not be determined immediately, but it was thought to have been the old Welby and Rainbow mill pond. The mill had been abandoned some years ago, but the pond had been used in more recent years. It is located about 1 1/2 miles off Highway 42 west of the top of Camas Mountain.

Besides his parents, Lane is survived by a sister in high school.

OKLAHOMA CITY — A homemade arrow hit Jimmy Rains on the head, penetrating half an inch into his skull, and the 9-year-old boy was reported in serious condition today.

His father C. W. Rains said Jimmy and a cousin were shooting the arrow as high as they could Sunday.

Doctors removed the arrow's tip in an hour-long emergency operation.

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Purge Of Egyptian Backers Started By King Of Syria

DAMASCUS, Syria — King Hussein today appeared to have won the early rounds of his fight to purge pro-Egyptian leaders from Jordan's army and political scene. But the possibility of violent riots among his Palestinian subjects still posed a grave threat to the young monarch.

So far, major units of Jordan's 24,000-man army and its most effective component — the British-trained Arab Legion — appeared supporting the King.

Wild demonstrations were reported yesterday in Palestine towns, held by Jordan since the 1948 war, at word that Hussein had deported the pro-Egyptian army chief of staff, Maj. Gen. Ali Abu Nawar, to Syria and placed ousted Premier Nabulsi under house arrest.

Leading members of Nabulsi's old Cabinet forced out last week by Hussein also were reported detained. Many of Nabulsi's followers in Parliament began fleeing across the Syrian border.

A strike against the 22-year-old monarch's army-backed coup was threatened as resentment spread among followers of the popular Nabulsi, a leading opponent of ties with the West and an advocate of close relations with Egypt, Syria and the Soviet Union.

Alliance Resented
 Tanks guarded the royal palace in the wake of two reported clashes between army units loyal to Hussein and military elements sympathetic to Syria and Egypt.

Syrian sources in Damascus described the King's action as a pro-Iraq coup d'etat. Iraq is ruled by Hussein's cousin King Faisal, and is the special object of Egyptian and Syrian hatred because of its alliance with the West through the Baghdad Pact.

Authorities in Cairo nervously awaited developments which could threaten Egyptian President Nasser's leadership of the Arab world. Egyptian officials were keenly aware the coup represented a major break in the five-nation Arab League — Egypt, Syria, Saudi Arabia, Yemen and Jordan — opposing the anti-Communist Baghdad Pact.

Moscow radio in one of its Arabic broadcasts charged the U.S. Embassy in Amman was behind the crisis.

Major Quake Believed In Fiji Islands Area

PASADENA, Calif. — Seismologists at the California Institute of Technology have recorded a "major quake" in the South Pacific.

Dr. Charles Richter said that the Cal Tech seismograph recorded the quake Sunday at 11:29 a.m. PST with a second wave at 11:38.

Dr. Richter estimated the quake's center to be 5,000 miles distant from Pasadena, probably in the region of the Fiji Islands.

under fire drew 150 members Sunday, instead of the thousands expected by sponsors.

The sponsoring group of union members had rented the civic auditorium, which seats 4,000 persons. They blamed a wind and rain storm for the small turnout.

Meanwhile, local AI of Portland Teamsters met and afterward reported the 300 members in attendance gave a vote of confidence to Clyde C. Crosby, the top Teamster official in Oregon and one of those under fire.

At the auditorium meeting, Robert B. Miller, one of the sponsors, urged Crosby, President Dave Beck and Frank Brewster, Western Conference Teamster leader, to "step aside."

That meeting also passed resolutions urging an annual audit of finances in each local; a rule that cash cannot be made out to cash; and a requirement that financial records be retained for three years.
