Britain Warns Against Venturing In Locality Of H-Bomb Experiment

LONDON — Britain announced Monday that any persons venturing into her Pacific H-bomb testing area "do so at their own risk."

Minister of Supply Aubrey Jones told the House of Commons that "all reasonable precautions, including search by aircraft, would be taken to ensure that no unauthorized vessel or aircraft was in the area when the tests took place."

A danger area has been declared around Christmas Island in mid-Pacific. The exact date has not been set for the tests.

A Japanese group has been planning to send a "peace flotilla" to the area as a protest. A British man and his wife have applied for Japanese visas to join the expedition, and Lord Bertrand Russell and some prominent Britons are raising funds to finance it.



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TOKYO — The newspaper Yomiuri Monday called Russia's continued testing of nuclear weapons without warning "the sadistic work of a pervert."

The paper, one of Japan's largest, said the Soviets have "the key to realization of prohibiting nuclear tests." It called on the United States, Britain and Russia to show their "sincerity" by stopping the nuclear explosions.

Dismissal From Service Backed By Commander

PARRIS ISLAND, S. C. — Brig. Gen. Wallace M. Greene Jr., commander of the Parris Island recruit depot, has approved the dishonorable dismissal sentence against 1st Lt. William D. Conroy.

A seven-man general court-martial handed down the sentence April 9 when Conroy, from Queens, N. Y., pleaded guilty to charges of conduct unbecoming an officer and gentleman.

The charges stemmed from an assault on an 18-year-old Marine private, David L. Porter.

Parris Island officials said the case has been forwarded to Washington for further review by the judge advocate general.

Dismissal for an officer corresponds to a dishonorable discharge for an enlisted man.

Conroy admitted assaulting Porter in the private's barracks March 13.

Porter, from Hartford, Vt., was a prosecution witness in the March 9 court-martial of Pvt. William R. Walsh Jr., who was a drill instructor under Conroy's command at the time.

Walsh, of Lyndhurst, N. J., was reduced in rank from corporal to private, sentenced to 30 days at hard labor and given a fine of \$40 a month for three months.

26,000 Navy Draftees To Get Early Releases

WASHINGTON — The Navy announced Monday it will grant early releases to some 26,000 men it drafted during late 1955 and March, 1956.

Men drafted in November and December, 1955, will be released after serving 21 months of the regular two-year draft time. Although no formal announcement was made about the March, 1956, draftees, a Navy source said these men may be released with less than 21 months service.

For the first time since World War II, the Navy was forced to take draftees during the months of November and December, 1955, and March, 1956. It did not use the draft after that.

The Navy said the releases are being made "to remain within budgetary and personnel ceilings and take advantage of optimum return in recruiting four-year enlistees of high caliber."

Crosby Ups Money Suit Against The Oregonian

PORTLAND — Clyde C. Crosby added Monday to the damages he seeks from The Oregonian on charges of libel. Three suits filed by him Monday ask \$900,000 from The Oregonian, two of its reporters, and James B. Elkins. An earlier suit, asking \$300,000 from the newspaper, is pending.

In his latest suits, Crosby says the defendants "wickedly and maliciously" damaged his reputation.

The reporters named are Wallace Turner and William Lambert, authors of articles alleging vice and corruption here. Elkins provided information which started the articles.

Two Jewish Watchman Reported Slain On Border

TEL AVIV, Israel — An Israeli army spokesman said Tuesday two Jewish watchmen were slain by Jordanians Monday night near Beit Shean, about 55 miles northeast of Tel Aviv. The biblical town is four miles west of the Jordan River frontier.

Tracks leading to the Jordan border were discovered, the spokesman said. The spokesman said the U.N. Armistice Commission was sending investigators to the spot.

GRENADE KILLS THREE

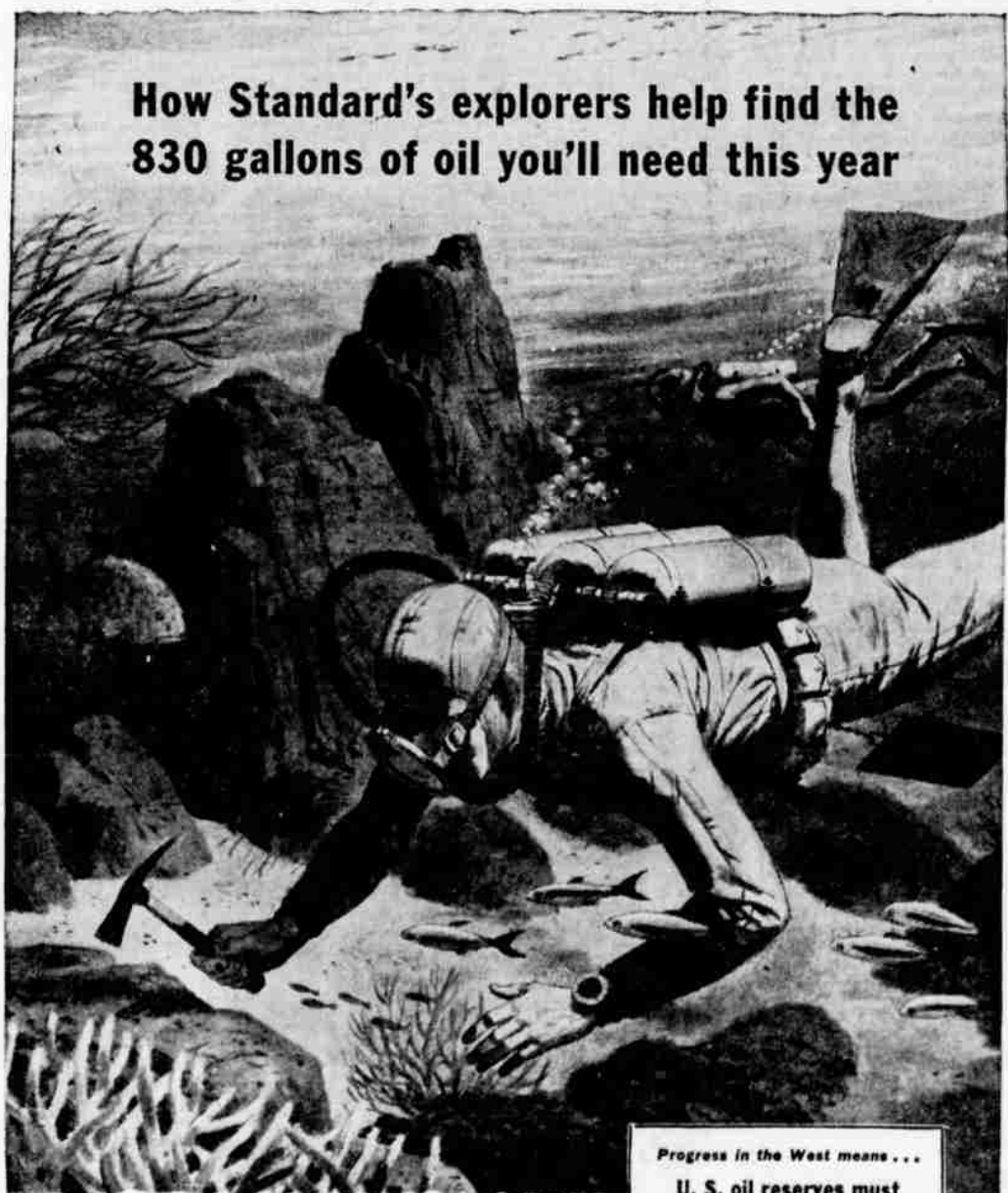
