

Building Down 68 Per Cent During March

Building in Roseburg last month was down 68 per cent from the same period in 1956, according to statistics compiled by Equitable Savings and Loan Assn. The drop in the county was 4 per cent.

The decline in Roseburg was topped by Baker, 78 per cent; La Grande, 71 per cent; and North Bend, 75 per cent. The city was down 38 per cent in March from February.

Roseburg building permits for March 37 were for \$28,161 as compared with \$28,735 in March '56.

According to the association, building permits in the Pacific Northwest for 64 cities combined, increased in March over both February and March 1956. Dollar volume of building showed a substantial gain over February and was only 2 per cent under last year's record value.

In the 64 cities, 5,764 permits were listed, a figure 44 per cent over February and 3 per cent over March 1956. Total dollar volume was \$32,418,729 for the month, being 43 per cent higher than February and minus 2 per cent below a year ago.

Lowell Hyde, 48, Dies On Tuesday

Lowell Phillip Hyde, 48, an employee of Roseburg Motor Co., died Tuesday. He was a resident of 525 NE Housley Ave.

Hyde was dead on arrival at the hospital, the apparent victim of a long-standing heart condition.

He was born Sept. 9, 1908, in Seattle, Wash., and had been a resident of this community for the last 13 years.

He is survived by his wife, Geneva, of Roseburg and his mother, Maude Hyde, of South Bend, Wash.

Funeral services have been scheduled at the Chapel of the Roses in Roseburg Friday at 3 p.m. The Rev. Newell Morgan of the Roseburg First Christian Church will officiate. Cremation will follow at Rest Haven Crematorium at Eugene.

Makarios Lands In Athens, Greece

ATHENS — Archbishop Makarios, leader of the Greek Cypriot majority seeking union with Greece, arrived in Athens Wednesday after 13 months of British detention on the Seychelles Islands.

Thousands of Athenians braved unusually chilly weather and gloomy skies to cheer the Greek Orthodox Archbishop of Cyprus as he was driven in an open car along the seven-mile route to downtown Athens.

Makarios flew here from Nairobi, Kenya, where chief secretary Richard Turnbull of Kenya declared Tuesday the archbishop was not a welcome guest in that British colony. The prelate had stopped in Kenya for a rest and talks en route from the Seychelles.

contempt proceedings against him.

Husbandman, a big red-haired man, refused to answer any questions except to give his name and address. In testimony of others, he had been linked to acts of terrorism including beatings and sabotage.

Before Munley took the witness chair, the senators had an entertaining hour with Helen Canfield, brunette 27-year-old divorcee and friend of Bradshaw.

She related that the district attorney at Scranton called it a "gigantic hoax" when she and Bradshaw turned over to him secretly made recordings of conversations among union officials which she contended would clear Bradshaw.

Miss Canfield said she and Bradshaw then were questioned by Dist. Atty. Carlton O'Malley, and she was arrested and arraigned on a charge of obstructing justice, a charge she said on which she never has been put on trial.

She said Bradshaw was arraigned on a perjury charge.

Miss Canfield is a member of the Teamsters Union. She is an egg candler in a chain store warehouse in Scranton.

A peppery and uninhibited witness, she let fly a broadside at male members of the Teamsters Union who, she said, lack the "backbone" to fight to clean up union affairs and have let her carry on the fight alone.

"Men!" she exclaimed contemptuously. "They call themselves men. How can they sleep at night when they sit by and let a woman do their fighting for them?"

She said she had "dared" the district attorney to let the recordings be played to the people of Scranton in a radio broadcast and let them decide whether they were a hoax.

Miss Canfield said the tape recordings contain conversations of Munley and George Murphy—"they are the dynamite," she said both are Teamsters Union members.

She said Teamsters Union officials run the union to suit themselves. "If you're not a friend, you don't count," she said.

Munley was questioned intensively, but stuck to his story that only Bradshaw asked him to do the dynamiting.

Sen. Mundt asked what reason Bradshaw gave in asking Munley to blow up the construction job.

"I don't recall the reason he gave me," replied Munley, adding: "He didn't like scabs."

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Water Resources Meeting Slated For Tri-City

For the first time in its short history, the Douglas County Water Resources Advisory Committee has scheduled its monthly meeting outside Roseburg.

The April 22 meeting will be held at the Tri-City Elementary School three miles south of Myrtle Creek at 7:30 p.m.

The purpose is to make it easier for citizens of the southern part of the county to become better acquainted with the work of the committee in water control and conservation.

The May meeting (May 13) will give the same opportunity to persons in the northern part of the county. It will be held in Drain. Time and place has not yet been determined.

At the Myrtle Creek meeting, representatives of the state and federal agencies concerned with water control and conservation are expected to attend. Representatives of the State Water Resources Board, Corps of Engineers and Bureau of Reclamation will give 15 to 20 minute explanations of the functions and interests of their various agencies relating to water control in the Umpqua basin. Questions and discussion will follow. Technical advisers of the committee may also be questioned as to their interests in water and watershed management.

Teamsters Meet Rebuff In Try To Stall Hearing

WASHINGTON — Teamsters Union moves to delay or talk their way out of a showdown on AFL-CIO corruption charges seemed unlikely today to run into a solid rebuff from the federation.

Sources in the parent federation said trial procedures already set for Dave Beck, Teamsters Union president, and the huge trucking union itself are fair and "leave no room for negotiation."

AFL-CIO President George Meany was out of the city and not immediately available for comment.

The embattled Teamsters' Executive Board, meeting in Galveston, Tex. Tuesday, asked the AFL-CIO for negotiations as to charges against Beck and a bill of particulars as to charges that the union itself is under corrupt domination.

The board, contending the charges were not specific, said it would attend no hearings until "fundamentals of fair adjudication" are assured.

The AFL-CIO charges are based on Beck's invoking the Fifth Amendment in refusing to tell Senate racketeers investigators about his admitted personal use of union funds, and court indictments against other high officers of the union.

The committee turned down proposals that the supervision be placed in the hands of an independent officer who would be appointed by the governor or the Board of Control.

The action came during a review of the 160-page election reform bill.

Another action of the committee was to accept amendments by the county clerks that would remove a provision that the secretary of state would have power to make rules and regulations that would be binding upon the county clerks.

However, these amendments permit the secretary of state to issue instructions to the county clerks.

The committee also deleted from the bill a section which would create a state board of elections, consisting of the governor, treasurer, attorney general and labor commissioner. This board would handle appeals from decisions of the secretary of state.

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
