

Nearly Normal Postal Service Resumed Here

Nearly normal postal service at the Roseburg post office has been resumed, Postmaster Clyde W. Carstens announced today.

The curtailment of services ordered by the postmaster general has been rescinded with the exception that window service will be limited to eight and one-half hours per day, Carstens said.

Window service at the post office will remain on the present schedule, 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, Saturdays, windows will open at 8:30 and close at 12 noon.

City and rural carriers will deliver mail on Saturdays, Carstens announced.

2 Tigers Stage Battle To Death In Arena

NEW YORK — Two tigers staged a jungle-style fight to the death before 15,000 spectators in the circus arena at Madison Square Garden Thursday.

A 7-year-old female Royal Bengal tiger named Ila — valued at nearly \$5,000 — was killed by a 4-year-old male named Rajah. The fight lasted three minutes.

The two first cuffed and snarled at each other during their act, in which they were part of a team of 12 tigers handled by trainer Trevor Bale.

Bale apparently managed to pacify them but at the end of the act, as the tigers were being herded into a runway to leave the ring, Rajah pounced on Ila and the mauling, clawing death battle ensued.

Roustabouts of the Ringling Brothers-Barnum & Bailey Circus, armed with steel bars, finally separated the two tigers and got them out of the arena. Ila bled to death while a veterinarian worked over her.

Rajah suffered only a few scratches and will stay with the act.

Mt. Etna Continuing To Pour Out Hot Lava

CATANIA, Sicily — Mt. Etna continued to erupt today, spilling a stream of lava slowly down a barren side of the 10,738-foot mountain.

The current eruption is in the same areas as that of 1950 which sent millions of tons of lava pouring down the ancient peak to the 900-foot level. That eruption destroyed and damaged roads and cultivated fields.

Eisenhower Leaves For Augusta Vacation

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower left by plane Thursday for a golf-work vacation at Augusta, Ga.

Accompanied by Mrs. Eisenhower, the President expected to spend about 10 days at his cottage on the Augusta National Golf course.

This is Eisenhower's 15th trip to the Augusta golf club since his election to the presidency in 1952.

Pearson Maintains Report On Norman Proved Unfounded

OTTAWA — Foreign Minister Lester Pearson said last night a Canadian secret agent's report which later proved to be unfounded was used by a U.S. Senate subcommittee in charging Canadian Diplomat Herbert Norman with having been a Communist.

Pearson said the Royal Canadian Mounted Police in October 1950 forwarded to U.S. security agencies a report from a secret agent that Norman was a member of the Canadian Communist Party in 1940.

The foreign minister said this "no doubt" was the basis of the statement by Robert Morris, counsel of the U.S. Senate Internal Security subcommittee, last month that "Norman was identified in the Communist Party."

But Pearson said the RCMP in December 1950 had sent the U.S. security agencies this report:

"We have made extensive inquiries concerning the information (on Norman) originally supplied by our secret agent, and have arrived at the decision that the information given is one of either mistaken identity or unfounded rumor by an unidentified sub-source. Of the numerous points supplied at the time, the majority have been absolutely determined to be in error, the remaining few have not been confirmed nor does there appear to be any answer to them."

Hussein Accepts Resignation Of Chief Of Staff

JERUSALEM, Jordan (AP) — Official sources said today King Hussein has accepted the forced resignation of Maj. Gen. Ali Abu Nuwar as chief of staff of Jordan's army.

Nuwar's ouster, reported without confirmation several times since last weekend, would further cement Hussein's control of the army, whose support kept him on his throne through the political storm that erupted last week.

The monarch appointed Maj. Gen. Ali Hayari to succeed Nuwar, the sources said.

Spanish-American War Veteran Dies

William C. Bryant, 85, died Tuesday in the Roseburg Veterans Hospital.

He was born July 19, 1871, in St. Louis, Mo. He was a Spanish-American War veteran and resident of Newberg.

Surviving are his wife, Anna, of Newberg; two sons, Claude of Albany and Avery of Rainier, Ore.; and five daughters, Mrs. Eva B. Wright of Westport, Mrs. Clara Barnes of Portland, Mrs. Alice Everman, Mrs. Esther Perren and Mrs. Irene Ryan, all of Rainier. The body has been removed to the Chapel of the Roses and will be shipped to the Willamette National Cemetery in Portland for funeral service and interment.

Langley Granted Temporary Stay Of Sentencing

PORTLAND — Dist. Atty. William Langley, facing ouster from office because a jury found him guilty of failing to prosecute gamblers, Wednesday won a delay until at least April 26.

Circuit Judge Frank J. Loneragan in a brief in-chambers hearing set that date for pronouncing sentence. Sentence on the conviction in removal from office and possibly a fine of from \$50 to \$500.

Langley won hope for still further delay when the judge gave him until April 22 to file motion for a new trial and set arguments on that for April 24. The April 26 sentencing date is presumably would be canceled if the new trial were granted.

While this action was taking place in the county courthouse, selection of a federal district court jury to try gambler Big Jim Elkins and his aide, Raymond Clark, continued in the federal courtroom.

Soft Nosed Bullet Killed Policeman

EUGENE — A soft-nosed "dum-dum" bullet killed state police officer Charles Sanders, ballistics expert Ralph Prouty testified Wednesday at the first degree murder trial of Albert L. Wachsmuth, 45.

Wachsmuth is accused of killing Sanders who, with other law officers, was summoned to Wachsmuth's home in a Eugene suburb on Feb. 22.

Lane County Sheriff Edward Elder said that officers had been called to the home by Wachsmuth's wife. Elder said the officers waited about an hour before approaching the house thinking Wachsmuth might have shot himself.

As Sanders moved up and stood on the porch he was shot and killed. Defense attorneys in opening statements suggested fellow policemen may have killed Sanders as they shot into the Wachsmuth home.

Bohlen Enplanes From Moscow

MOSCOW — U.S. Ambassador Charles E. Bohlen left Moscow Thursday on a plane so big it made the Russians gasp. He is flying to the United States en route to a new assignment as ambassador to the Philippines.

Moscow's diplomatic corps overflowed the airport building in a farewell tribute to Bohlen's acknowledged leadership of the Western diplomatic colony during his four years as ambassador.

A giant U.S. Air Force C124 Globemaster — the United States' biggest troop transport plane — came from Germany to pick up Bohlen, his family, and eight other embassy officials. The plane can carry more than 200 troops.

It was the first trip of a Globemaster to the Soviet capital. The Russians had never seen a plane as big as the 90-ton, double-deck monster, and their eyes popped. Just to bring its size home to the gaping onlookers, an embassy official backed a fully loaded truck up the ramp into the plane's belly.

27 British Servicemen Killed In Air Crash

NICOSIA — An official announcement Thursday said 27 British servicemen were killed in the crash of a Royal Air Force Valetta transport plane Wednesday at Aqaba, isolated British base in Jordan.

House Taxation Group Lists New Tax Plan

line with Washington and California.

The new rates on taxable income would be:

Under \$500 a year, 4 per cent; \$500 to \$1,000, 5 per cent; \$1,000 to \$1,500, 6 per cent; \$1,500 to \$2,000, 7 per cent; \$2,000 to \$3,000, 8 per cent; \$3,000 to \$4,000, 9 per cent; \$4,000 to \$8,000, 10 1/2 per cent; over \$8,000, 11 1/2 per cent.

Rep. Clarence Burton (D), Co. quille, chairman of the committee, said the plan was digested from about 30 different proposals. He said the bills to carry out the program would be introduced Friday, and that the House probably could act on them next week.

The program will support the budget of about 270 million dollars that the Democratic leaders said is their objective.

The Senate voted 17-13 and sent to the House a proposed constitutional amendment to extend the two-year terms of House members to four years. Senators now have four-year terms.

In a test vote Wednesday on a companion measure, the Senate had voted 15-15 on the issue.

Democrats Thursday supported the measure 8 to 7, and Republicans favored it 9 to 6.

It would be placed on the November, 1958, general election ballot. If the people favored it, then the representatives would draw lots to decide who should serve two years and who should serve four years immediately after the measure became effective.

Supporters argued the measure would provide more experienced House members and stop the big turnover which occurs in the House each session. Opponents claimed it would take the government farther away from the people.

The House sent to the Senate a bill to permit distressed school districts to increase their bonding limits in order to construct new buildings.

The Senate wiped out its 15-14 vote to take from the Multnomah County delegation the bill to require the governor to suspend indicted state and local officials.

This had been a party line vote, with the Republicans voting to take it from the delegation that had tabled it. Democrats voted to leave it in the delegation.

The Republicans were successful on the first vote because Sen. Andrew J. Naterlin, Newport Democrat, was absent from the morning session.

At the afternoon session, with everybody present, the Republicans moved to reconsider the vote. This action left the bill in the delegation.

Republicans moved to reconsider because they didn't want to be put in the position of taking advantage of an absent Democrat. They feared that sometime a Republican might be absent, and it would work the other way.

The House also had an attempt to take a bill from committee, and the move failed, 45-13.

The bill is the one to give the labor commissioner authority to examine financial records of labor unions.

Rep. Graham Killam (R), Portland, made the motion to take the bill from the labor and industries committee. The committee chairman, Rep. Robert Klemens, St. Helens, said the committee had other bills to consider first.

The Senate completed legislative action on the bill appropriating \$100,000 for planning the proposed highway bridge across the Columbia River at Astoria.

The Washington Legislature also put up \$100,000 for the same purpose. So now only Gov. Holmes' signature is needed for a start in making plans for the 30-million dollar bridge.

Financing plans haven't been considered, and probably won't until the 1959 Legislature.

The Senate sent to the House a bill to boost the \$20,000 ceiling on damage suits for wrongful death to \$25,000. The House had voted to remove the limit entirely.

A bill approved by the House and sent to the Senate would have county commissioners in Lane and Multnomah counties run by numbered positions.

The House also sent to the Senate a memorial asking Congress to enact legislation to require federal courts to enforce payment of state taxes by persons who move out of the state in which the taxes are owed.

Scientists Reveal Inertial Guidance Secret Invention

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. — Scientists at Massachusetts Institute of Technology have unveiled a heretofore secret invention which they say can guide any craft or missile to any specified spot on earth, free from enemy interference.

The invention, called "Inertial Guidance," already has flown a B2 bomber from Boston to Los Angeles.

The MIT scientists said, in unveiling inertial guidance Wednesday, that it operates without magnetic compass, radio, or radar and without a glimpse of the earth, the sun or the stars. They said it needs no electronic signal or radar beam and therefore can't be jammed by enemy apparatus.

The developers explained that the heart of the system is a completely free-floating gyroscopic sealed in a little four-inch cylinder about the size of a tomato can. They added that the extremely complicated mechanism always remains aimed in a fixed position in relation to the universe independent of the earth's motion. They said it can't be affected by other natural phenomena such as weather, sunspots and magnetic influences or polar shifts.

The gyro wheel, spinning at 12,000 revolutions per minute, floats in a fluid and pivots on virtually frictionless sapphire bearings. The wheel is described as "a major breakthrough in the field of gyro technology." The scientist indicated it might be of very great importance in flight through outer space.

Mad Bomber Committed To Hospital For Insane

NEW YORK — Kings County Judge Samuel Liebowitz Thursday committed mad bomber George Metesky to Matteawan State Hospital for the criminal insane.

Judge Liebowitz ruled, however, that if Metesky should recover his sanity he must be returned to Brooklyn to stand trial on charges of attempted murder and other counts.

The merchant patrolman noticed that a restroom window had been broken and a signboard used as a ladder. He saw someone inside the place and radioed the state police. Meanwhile, the thieves departed through a rear door.

Taken by the burglars were 15 "fifths" of whiskey, seven of them equipped with pouring spouts. Also reported missing by the owner, Lewis F. Parsons, was a five dollar bill which had been removed from a picture frame.

One of the burglars evidently cut himself crawling through the broken window, investigating officers said, since blood was found on the window. State police and sheriff's deputies are investigating.

Winston Contractor Wins Dam Clearing Job

PORTLAND — The job of clearing for the Cougar Reservoir resulted in a \$30,520 contract for one firm Wednesday and heavy bidding for another project.

A contract to clear 140 acres went to F. and W. Construction Co., Winston, Ore.

Thirteen firms submitted bids for clearing another 156 acres. Army Engineers said the low bid was \$83,332, submitted by Mack Slate Jr., Albany. The government estimate for the work was \$122,300.

The proposed Cougar Dam is on the east fork of the McKenzie River, 19 miles south of the town of Blue River.

President Says Budget Can Be Cut \$2 Billion

and all interested parties. Projection of the costs for future years, and reappraisal of the necessity, before any unbudgeted programs are adopted.

Granting the President authority to veto individual items in appropriation bills. Various Presidents have advocated that. Now a President can veto only an entire bill.

Eisenhower noted that the House had called upon him in a special resolution to point out places in his \$71,800,000,000 spending budget where substantial cuts could be made.

The kind of reduction the House contemplated, Eisenhower said, "would weaken the nation's defenses, or cut back or eliminate programs now required by law or proposed in the public interest."

But he said that in the field of appropriations, as distinct from expenditures, "we find a more promising outlook."

Some requests for appropriations, he said, can be postponed without serious damage to the programs involved. Specifically he mentioned:

1. A 500 million dollar reduction in funds for the military aid part of the mutual security program.

2. A 200 million cut for military public works.

3. A 254 million dollar slash for the soil bank program—a cut he already had proposed to Congress.

4. A 50 million reduction in new spending authority for the Federal National Mortgage Assn.

5. A similar 25 million cut for the college housing program.

6. A reduction of 13 million for the Army Corps of Engineers.

In addition Eisenhower said, the House's appropriations bills originate there—might wish to take a look at the possibility of withholding 516 million for Army procurement and production. He said this would be at the expense of efficient programming, and merely would postpone the request for the sum for another year.

Eisenhower said another possible reduction of 300 million dollars could be made in the amount budgeted for unexpected expenses of the government.

All these items add up to the \$1,338,000,000.

Without the Army procurement and production item, the figure comes to \$1,342,000,000.
