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Effects Of Mill Wastes On Fish, Other Aquatic Life Being Studied

Effects of pulp and paper mill wastes on fish and other aquatic life are being studied at Oregon State College in an effort to determine how much of these wastes can be dumped into streams and rivers without lowering the value of fishery and other water resources.

Both fresh water and marine life are being checked in the study, conducted by the OSC department of fish and game management, in cooperation with U.S. public health fisheries biologists. The work is supported by grants of nearly \$10,000 from the National Council of Stream Improvement, New York.

The fresh water studies are under the direction of Charles E. Warren, agricultural experiment station fisheries biologist. Work is being done in the station's fish-

eries laboratory on the Mary's River near Corvallis. In the laboratory, troughs containing entire stream communities — including crayfish, insect larvae, algae, and other aquatic life, as well as fish — have been set up so effects of the wastes under nearly natural conditions can be studied.

Marine work is at the OSC marine laboratory on Yaquina Bay. This project, under the direction of R. E. Dimick, fish and game department head, will study effects of the mill wastes on oysters and other marine organisms found in surrounding bays, coves, and other coastal waters.

Research is aimed at supplying basic information needed to help set possible water pollution control standards in the state. The fish and game scientists say such standards may be necessary in the future to protect Oregon's water resources as population increases and industry expands.

Slayer-Robber Kills Policeman, Takes Own Life

SUFFIELD, Conn. — An accused wife slayer and payroll bandit Thursday killed an FBI agent who exchanged shots with him from the inky blackness of a cellar of a house in a quiet residential area. The killer then blew out his own brains with a shotgun.

The fugitive, Francis Kolakowski, fought a gun battle with officers at the home of his sister, Mrs. Wanda Slater. She had summoned police when the brother appeared Thursday morning.

Kolakowski and FBI agent Richard P. Horan exchanged shots inside the house. Kolakowski fired from the kitchen down a cellar stairway after Horan and State Police Capt. Philip Schwartz entered the basement through a rear entrance.

Kolakowski's first shot, apparently fired more or less at random into the dark cellar, hit Horan in the chest. Horan fired an answering shot before collapsing. Schwartz said. Schwartz himself took refuge under the stairway, drawing the dying Horan with him.

Seconds later another shot rang out upstairs. Schwartz and other officers subsequently found Kolakowski dead on the kitchen floor from a shotgun blast in the head.

Kolakowski had been sought for the March 29 slaying of his wife at Hartford. He also was wanted as a prime suspect in the long-man payroll robbery of \$66,573 from the Hartford Machine Screw Co. at Windsor a week ago.

When Kolakowski showed up early Thursday behind his sister's home, she dashed out the front and drove to the police station.

Alsburys Winner Of Economy Run

SUN VALLEY, Idaho — Twenty-seven-year-old Melburn K. Alsbury Jr., Inglewood, Calif., became the first man in Mobilgas Economy Run history Thursday to win the run's sweepstakes event two years in succession.

He led a fleet of Chrysler Corp. cars that nailed down first place in all four divisions of the run—the first time in run history a single maker hit sweepstakes.

Alsbury took his Chrysler-built Imperial Crown over the 1568.3-mile distance from Los Angeles at an average of 29.9465 actual miles a gallon. Converted to the all-important ton-mile figure, obtained by multiplying gas mileage by the car's weight in tons, Alsbury came in with the sweepstakes-winning figure of 64.5153.

His mother placed second in the high-priced class and in the sweepstakes in a second Imperial Crown.

The winners in the other classes:

Upper-medium price bracket: George Alsbury (Mel's brother), in a Chrysler Saratoga, 29.7032 actual and 56.7267 ton-miles per gallon.

Lower-medium: William J. Losher in a Dodge Coronet "500," 22.0047 actual and 55.8929 ton-miles per gallon.

Low-price: Plymouth Belvedere "8," driven by Mary Davis at 21.3907 actual and 52.6211 ton-miles per gallon.

Surgery Authorized For Siamese Twin Boys

HOLLYWOOD — Surgery will be performed soon at Children's Hospital in an effort to separate Siamese twins Terry and Larry Powell.

Neurosurgeons said several operations may be necessary. Doctors have said the twins will have only a slight chance of surviving surgery if they have common brain tissue. But Mr. and Mrs. Jack Powell, parents of the babies, have consented to the surgery.

Terry and Larry, born March 10, are joined by a skull fusion 3 1/2 inches wide. Tests have shown they have major vein connections.

Gibbons Claims He's Not Likely To Succeed Beck

ST. LOUIS — Harold J. Gibbons, boss of the Teamsters Union in the St. Louis area, ridiculed reports he might become international president of the union if Dave Beck steps down or is ousted.

He also reported there is no sentiment to withdraw the Teamsters Union from the CIO-AFL among top Teamsters officers who attended a strategy conference Tuesday at Galveston, Tex.

Gibbons made his statements Thursday at a news conference. Gibbons devoted most of his discussion to a defense of the system of putting locals of the Teamsters Union under trusteeship.

He said this is done only as a last resort after complaints by rank-and-file members in the locals.

The Teamsters Union released a survey in Washington earlier this week showing five high officers of the union control 47 locals through trusteeships. Gibbons holds seven of the trusteeships.

"It is certainly not a question of 'seizing power,'" he said. "Each of these locals has been regularly polled by me as to their wishes regarding removal of trusteeship."

"Membership conditions in all have been substantially improved. All are under standing instructions to request removal of trusteeship as soon as conditions warrant — just as soon as responsible trade union leadership has developed and they are in a position to render proper service and representation to the membership."

"When you are appointed trustee, you inherit nothing but a lot of headaches."

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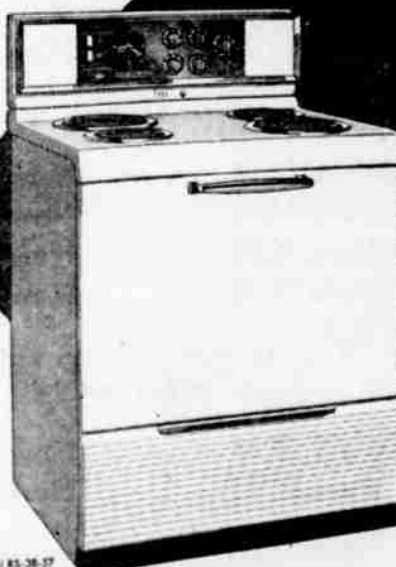
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The mistake of Mike Regan
