

Burdette Wins Game Midst Clamor Of Spitball Charges

Here we go again. Lew Burdette says he doesn't throw a spitball. Birdie Tebbetts insists he does. "A cheating spitballer," says the Cincinnati manager. But Warren Giles says "you have to prove it to me."

Whatever Burdette, Milwaukee's shutout ace, does when he spins his stuff for the Braves, old Satch Paige had a term for it — "out-psychologizin' the hitter."

That's what Burdette had in mind when he said "It's the best pitch I've got — and I don't throw it," in reply to Tebbetts' renewed cry after the Redlegs lost to the big righthander 4-0 yesterday. It was the eighth successive time Burdette, who led the National League with six shutouts, pitched similar "spit" charges last season, has whipped Cincinnati, and Tebbetts is "pretty tired of him getting away with murder."

Burdette, who insists Burdette "went to his mouth before every pitch," chirped so loud his boss, General Manager Gabe Paul, asked Giles, the league president, for a clarification of rule 8.02, which states a pitcher cannot "apply a

foreign substance of any kind to the ball" under penalty of a 10-day suspension.

"Until someone — the umpires or someone — presents evidence that Burdette is using the spitball, I'll do nothing about it," said Giles, adding that "a lot of pitchers make a habit of thinking they're throwing a spitball, but there's nothing illegal about it."

Legal or not, Burdette's victory, fashioned on Hank Aaron's first home run of the year in the sixth inning off loser Jeffcoat, handed the winless Redlegs a second defeat and left the Braves and Brooklyn Dodgers the only unbeaten clubs in the league.

The Dodgers, with Sal Maglie throwing a four-hitter, knocked off Pittsburgh 6-1. The Chicago Cubs cracked 15 hits to defeat the St. Louis Cardinals 10-2. And the New York Giants kept Philadelphia winless 6-2.

In the American, the winless Detroit Tigers lost their third in a row, this time to Cleveland, 8-3 in 11 innings. The New York Yankees beat Boston 3-2. Chicago's White Sox handed Kansas City its first defeat, 6-2, behind Jack Harshman's four-hitter. And Washington finally became a winner with a 6-4 job on Ball more.

Holmes' Proposal To Create Parole Board Hits Snag

SALEM — Gov. Holmes' proposal to create a three-member, full-time paid parole board, replacing the present part-time commission, ran into legal barriers in the House of Representatives Thursday and was sent back to committee for more study.

Rep. Robert Duncan (D), Medford attorney, told the House that broad powers that would be given to the new board under the bill conflicted with existing laws dealing with murderers and habitual criminals.

Duncan reminded the House that the Legislature is considering approval of a bill to abolish the death penalty. That measure, passed several weeks ago by the House, would bar paroles for persons convicted of first-degree murder.

Rep. Winton Hunt (R), Woodburn, asserted the governor's proposal "crossed the jurisdiction line between the judicial and executive."

He explained one section would let the Parole Board suspend a pardon, which only the governor has traditionally controlled.

Hunt said also that the Parole Board could act on probationers, which are granted by courts.

Members of the State and Federal Affairs Committee said they would try to revise the bill and get it back to the floor quickly.

The governor asked for the full-time paid board in his inaugural message, but had favored abolishing the board.
