Richard Wood Dies; Rites To Be Monday

SALEM — Now that the House Taxation Committee has announced its program, the Legislature thinks it can adjourn in about four more weeks.

This program—which keeps personal income taxes at the current level and boosts the taxes on corporations—is expected to get through the House with little trouble.

The stumbling block will be the Senate, where Republicans are taking pot shots at it. Some Democrats, especially those who want a 30 per cent increase in the basic school fund, are objecting that it won't raise enough money.

Of the 25 planks in Gov. Holmer's program, only two have been passed by both houses. They are: Congress to build John Day Dam, and set up a conciliation service to mediate labor disputes.

Four other planks have died in the Senate. They would have asked Congress to build Hells Canyon Dam, repealed the anti-picketing law, repealed the relative responsibility law, and abolished the state Fair Commission.

Eight others have been passed by one house. And 12 haven't been acted upon by either house.

Here is the status of the major legislation:

Basic school fund increase — No action, but the Democrats are expected to vote to boost the fund from \$80 per child to \$90. The governor wants \$120.

Annual Easter Assembly Is Held At Roseburg High

Wrapped in a dramatic cloak, the annual Easter assembly was presented again at Roseburg High School Friday by the Nu Delta Club with the aid of the high school a cappella choir.

Drama took over from the outset in the Good Friday event. It started in darkness except for a red cross which shown with black light, and the choir sang "Low in the Grave He Lay."

The spell of gloom was broken suddenly, however, with a flood of light as the choir sang "Up From the Grave He Arose."

Thus, began the theme of the program, "The Risen Christ for All Peoples."

This dramatic opening was followed by the appearance of the four featured guests on the program.

The first was a Japanese woman from Myrtle Creek, Mrs. Ronald Weaver. She told, as did the others, of what Christ meant to her people and to her personally. She said she had been raised as a Buddhist, but had never found peace of soul until she accepted Christ.

The next guest was E. E. Kirschman of Nebraska, who pointed out the fact that because Christ died and rose again, we have our churches, hospitals and schools and all the privileges of life. He followed this with a song, accompanied by Mrs. Vernon Klein.

The third guest was Russell Smith, a Negro graduate from Oregon State College. He was dressed as a tribal chief. He told briefly of the troubles of the African Negro in his striving for social justice and equality among nations. He pointed out, however, that if they gain all the advantages they seek, they will still be missing the mark if they don't find place with God for their souls.

Final guest on the program was an Indian woman from the Klamath Indian reservation, Mrs. June Potrait. She sang Jesus said come unto me and I will surely give you rest, to the melody of "Indian Love Call." She said the song expressed her love for her Saviour.

The presentations by the four guests were interspersed with renditions by the high school choir.

Oregon Legislature Hopeful Of Winding Up In 4 Weeks

Building program — Totaling 20 million dollars, this probably will be considered after the rest of the department budgets are approved.

Unemployment compensation benefits increase — No action, but the Senate Labor and Industries Committee will meet Monday night and Tuesday on it.

Twenty per cent industrial accident benefits increase — The House passed it this week, and now it's in the Senate Labor and Industries Committee.

Creating state development department — Approved by the joint Ways and Means Committee.

Relative responsibility law — The Senate voted to reduce the required payments. Now the bill is in House committee.

Capital punishment repeal — Passed by the House. The Senate State and Federal Affairs Committee approved it Friday.

Legislation to give the public utilities commissioner authority over minimum railroad freight rates and reduction of rail passenger service — No action, but the Senate will vote on them next week.

Election reform bill — The House Elections Committee has this bill almost ready for House action.

Bonds to construct Coast Highway in Curry County — The Senate voted for it Friday and sent it to the House.

Suburban problems — The Senate has voted to permit reduced city taxes in annexed areas. The House has voted for county home rule. The House voted against creating county service districts, reconsidered it, and now it's back in committee.

Requiring the governor to suspend indicted state and local officials — Passed by the House, it's now resting in the Senate Multnomah delegation.

(Informal sources in Damascus said Gen. Hayari has arrived in Syria and that the Syrian cabinet was called into special session to consider the events. Gen. Hayari conferred with high Syrian officials soon after his arrival, these informants said.)

Earlier, King Hussein appointed a five-officer council to revamp Jordan's military organization so as to diminish Egyptian influence in the army.

6 Deaths Blamed On Bad Weather Through South

Violent storms, with destructive winds heavy rainfall and tornadoes, struck sections of the South Plains and the Midwest last night and today as showery weather continued in wide areas of the nation.

More wet weather appeared in prospect for many parts of the country on Easter Sunday. Fairly mild temperatures, however, were indicated in most areas.

At least six persons were killed in the stormy weather which hit southern Wisconsin yesterday and continued during the night.

Texas was lashed with severe spring storms. Seven tornadoes skipped across the state Friday and one twister hit the ground in the Dallas area early today. Heavy thunderstorms swept the Dallas-Fort Worth region.

No injuries were reported in the Texas tornadoes. There were no immediate reports of heavy damage.

Small tornadoes struck near Culbertson, Nev., and St. John, Kan., yesterday but no injuries or damage were reported.

The violent weather occurred along the line separating the cool and warm air over the central part of the country. The heaviest shower activity was north of a low center in Nebraska.

Crippled Plane Landed Safely; No One Injured

DALLAS, Tex. — Ambulances moaned and fear froze in a thousand throats as a crippled and darkened airplane floated to a landing here last night.

Thirty-eight passengers, assailed by two hours of anxiety, buried their faces in pillows.

But all 41 persons aboard the Baniff Airways plane escaped injury as the trembling craft tilted on its nose and skidded the final few feet to safety.

The pilot, Capt. R. O. Mitten-dorf, wore a big smile as he emerged from the plane. Pretty Susie Brock, the hostess, wept with relief. And Bert Hathaway, a passenger from Oklahoma City, crowed: "Everybody's happy."

It was the most beautiful landing I've ever seen!
