Year's Last Class For Welders Set

The last welding class of the school year has been scheduled to start next Monday, according to Richard Boss, director of the vocational and adult education Dept. of the Roseburg public school system.

Anyone interested in taking the \$22.50 course may register either by calling Boss at OR 3-5152 or by attending the first session of the course Monday night at 7 in the Roseburg High School farm shop. Included in the content of the course are: Care and operation of oxy-acetylene equipment; care and use of cutting equipment; electric arc machines, brazing and cast iron welding; use of heating torch, arc welding of cast iron and alloys, ways and means of determining types of metals, hard - facing with arc.

Certain material will be necessary for the first night of class. More information on this may be secured by calling Boss. Also, students must furnish their own gloves and welding rod.
The length of the course is 30 hours. Classes will be conducted each Monday and Thursday nights at 7 until the end of the course.
