Ford Quarterly Sales Best Yet, Profits Sag

DETROIT — Ford Motor Co. says its sales for the first three months of 1957 totaled 318,200, the highest for any quarter in company history.

But both profits and the number of cars and trucks sold in the first quarter of 1957 were larger.

The year 1955 was a record one for both profits and sales for the auto industry.

Ford's net profits for 1957's first quarter were \$100,500,000, compared with \$73,700,000 in the same 1956 months, and \$102,500,000 in the first 1955 quarter.

Factory sales of Ford cars and trucks in the first quarter of 1957 were reported as 626,206 units, compared with 523,297 in the same 1956 period, and 637,711 units in the first three months of 1955.

John Day Dam Money Unlikely, Neuberger Says

PORTLAND —Prospects are slim in this session of Congress for money to start the construction of John Day Dam on the Columbia River, Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) said Sunday.

Neuberger said the President's budget did not include any money for the dam and added that it is ten times more difficult to add than to cut money out of the budget.

Nevertheless the dam is sorely needed by Oregon, he said.

"I don't think I can stress enough the serious economic situation confronting Oregon," he said in an interview after arriving home while Congress is in Easter recess.

He said the per capita income of Oregonians was \$302 above the national average in 1947, but now is \$13 below.

About the only way of halting this decline is to build up low-cost power supplies sufficient to attract new industries, he said.

erty. The effect would be to double the utility tax rate.

Hospital's Cuts Disliked
He expressed disappointment that the joint ways and means committee has cut \$200,000 from the budget recommendations for the state hospitals. But he said that "if those cuts had to be made, they probably were in the right places."

He added that if the committee has to reduce the program for construction of 20 million dollars worth of institution and higher education buildings, "I hope they won't be deep cuts or drastic cuts."

Taking note of a newspaper article that said that only two of his 26 recommendations have been approved by the legislature, Gov. Holmes said:

"But this is only the 6th or 7th inning. I think that when the session is over, my batting average will be good."

The governor also asserted that he hopes the legislature will permit an immediate start on construction of the proposed state reformatory at Salem.

Saudi Arabia Cited In Jewish Worker Ban

NEW YORK —The Arabian American Oil Co. Monday denied any discrimination against Jews in employment practices, but said it can't hire Jews to send to Saudi Arabia.

"We have to abide by the laws and practices of that country," an Aramco spokesman said. "If we were to hire a Jewish engineer or technician and apply for his visa to Saudi Arabia it would not be granted."

The comment came in reply to charges by the American Jewish Congress that the company discriminates against Jewish applicants for jobs with the firm in Saudi Arabia.

The company spokesman said Aramco has no discrimination policies.

Free Captive Nations, Dulles Tells Russia

tions are re-united and the captive nations are set free."

In describing the "pressures of liberty" which he said are rising within the Soviet bloc, Dulles said there is increasing demand for greater personal security, freedom and economic benefits within Russia; that international communism is beset with "doctrinal difficulties" and that the "crucial performance of Soviet communism in Hungary" had led many Communist Party members throughout the world to desert communism.

Satellites Show Revulsion
In the satellite countries, he said, Russia no longer has the "submissive source" of military strength. In fact, he asserted, "Soviet strength, both military and economic, has now to be expended to repress those who are showing their revulsion against Soviet rule."

Dulles also made these other major points:

1. International communism "is on the prowl to capture those nations whose leaders feel that newly acquired sovereign rights have to be displayed by flouting other independent nations."

He called the "suicidal sovereignty" and said the United States wants the independence of new nations "to be something better than a brief twilight preceding the black-out of communist despotism."

Dulles did not mention any country in this connection but he is known to feel that in its handling of the Suez Canal issue, Egypt has disregarded the rights of other countries which rely on the use of the canal.

U.S. Power Deters Soviet
2. The chief deterrent to Soviet aggression is the "mobile retaliatory power" of the United States but this country also needs strong allies.

This is the main argument for military aid. If the "forces and facilities" of allied nations were taken away from the common defense, the American defense budget would have to be "expanded vastly," he said.

3. The administration's policies governing promotion of international trade and economic assistance to foreign countries are vital to strengthen those countries against Communist pressures and to secure their belief in "the blessings of liberty."

"With the help of the Congress, and with the support of the American people," Dulles declared, "our trade and economic development policies can serve mightily to demonstrate that the peace of free men is not the doomed peace of human stagnation but a peace of such vitality that it will endure."

4. The United States considers "that controls and reduction of arms are possible, desirable, and, in the last reckoning, indispensable." The atomic arms race "is costly, sterile and dangerous" and "we shall not cease our striving to bring it to a dependable end."

5. History suggests that "a conflict as basic as that dividing the world of freedom and the world of international communism ultimately erupts in war" but the United States rejects the notion that war is inevitable and believes that it can be prevented.

Leonard Scott Remains In Jail; Bond Put High

DETROIT — Leonard Ewing Scott remained in jail here Friday, unable to make the \$100,000 bond set by federal District Judge Theodore Levin.

The judge ruled, however, that Scott, a dapper 60-year-old retired Los Angeles investment broker, could use for his defense \$1,500 which the state of California has accused him of stealing.

Scott is charged with mishandling his wealthy socialite wife's estate and murdering her. His wife, Mrs. Evelyn Thorsby Scott, 63, disappeared two years ago from her swanky home in Los Angeles. She has not been found.

In setting the unusually high bond, Judge Levin cited Scott's "bad record" of jumping \$25,000 bond in California last year.

Scott jumped the bond and fled California last May. He was free 11 months, the object of a police search in the United States and Canada, until he was caught Monday night at the Canadian end of the tunnel that connects Detroit and Windsor, Ont.

He told newsmen Wednesday that he believes his wife is alive, either a prisoner for profit or a victim of amnesia.

Chief Asst. U. S. Atty. George F. Woods argued against letting Scott use for legal fees any of the \$10,400 he had in a money belt around his waist when he was arrested. Woods contended the money may be part of the money he is accused of taking from his wife's bank account by forging her name.

Judge Levin denied Woods' plea, saying he believed withholding the money from Scott would "deprive him of effective assistance of counsel, deprive him of his constitutional rights."

Scott has said he will fight extradition to California. A hearing on his removal is scheduled for May 7.

Pursuit Of Gopher Puts Youth In Hospital

BEND — Two boys joined in eager pursuit of a gopher on a dairy farm near here Saturday. A 12-year-old boy was injured.

The boy thought the gopher ducked into a piece of irrigation pipe. So he hoisted the pipe to get the gopher out. The pipe touched an overhead power line, and the shock knocked Kim Douglas Ward, 12, unconscious.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. D. J. Ward, owners of the farm, was taken to a hospital with severe burns on his left foot and lesser burns on his back and legs.

The other boy, Phil Young, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. Allen Young, was wearing rubber-soled shoes and escaped with minor burns on his insteps. He did not need hospitalization.

What happened to the gopher was not determined.

Rail Workers Slated For Increases In Pay

WASHINGTON — Rail and other workers may get pay raises this week totaling \$5 million dollars a year based on increases in the current cost of living index.

The government is to announce tomorrow or Wednesday its newest index reflecting living costs as of March 15. The level has increased each month for the last six months.

Nearly a million railroad workers, whose pay is adjusted each six months based on the index, may get increases of 3 cents an hour. Smaller raises are expected for a couple hundred thousand others in aircraft and electrical manufacturing, whose wages are adjusted each three months.

Reuther Plans 'Clean' Union Of Teamsters

WASHINGTON — If the embattled Teamsters Union is ousted from the AFL-CIO, Walter Reuther is ready to push for a new truck drivers' union "that can be clean."

Reuther expressed hope here that the expulsion will not be necessary, but added that the AFL-CIO will have "no choice" unless the Teamsters' Union can "clean up from within."

Property Tax Ban Holds
Republicans failed 34-24 to take away from the House Taxation Committee a Senate-passed bill which would remove the state from the property tax field.

The bill would remove the provision that when state revenues are insufficient, a 6-mill state property levy is imposed. Oregon hasn't had a state property tax since 1940.

The House State and Federal Affairs Committee approved a Senate-passed measure to provide four-year terms for state representatives, who now serve two years. The same committee also voted for a bill to provide \$1,000 annual salaries for each member of the three-man Parole Board.

Two more segments of the Democratic tax program were introduced Monday. They increase the inheritance and gift taxes.

Centennial's Profit To Oregon Forecast

PORTLAND — Oregon would get six million dollars worth of publicity from a proposed Centennial Exposition and Trade Fair in 1939, advertising managers of the Oregon Newspaper Publishers Assn. said Saturday.

The managers, who want the fair held here, asked that the state appropriate \$1,100,000 to finance it.

The Oregon Centennial Exposition Commission estimates such an exposition would bring the state a profit of two million dollars.

Brownell States Views On Teaching Of Communism

LOS ANGELES — As U.S. Atty. Gen. Brownell sees it, there is no reason why courses about communism should not be offered in colleges and universities.

But there's no more reason, he says, to give communist teachers the "privileges of academic freedom."

Brownell, speaking before a University of Southern California law school alumni group, said Thursday night that there are "many people who believe that if a university furnishes courses about communism, it engages in indoctrination."

"This is not the case. How can we possibly overcome any malignant disease, whether it be cancer or communism, unless we master the facts about it?"

"How can we even hope to identify communists from those who are often unjustly accused of being communists unless we know the 'party line'?" We need fear communism only if we lack accurate knowledge of it."

On the other hand, Brownell said, a communist teacher "forfeits the privileges of academic freedom because his training, purpose and design are all at odds with it."

Referring to refusal of teachers to answer questions about alleged communist activity, Brownell said:

"The Communist Party is not a tea-drinking society but is by scheme and design a conspiratorial organization. The Congress, the colleges, the students and the public alike are entitled to know where on the campus the communist octopus is hidden."

He received an honorary degree of doctor of laws from USC.

B52 Production Level Off May Hit Economy

SEATTLE — Sen. Jackson (D-Wash.) said Thursday the economy of the Pacific Northwest may be affected seriously by the Air Force's decision to level off production of the B52 jet bomber and KC135 jet tanker made by the Boeing Airplane Co.

"I am gravely concerned over the serious impact this may have on the economy of the Pacific Northwest," Jackson told newsmen after the Air Force announced its decision.

"I hope, and will request, that as the Air Force tapers off the B52 it will increase the tanker program," Jackson said. "The Air Force is making a great mistake in leveling off the KC135 tanker program."
