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Itinerary Of Mobile X-Ray Set For Three-Month Visit

Persons from the age of 15 up will have the opportunity to receive free chest X-rays April 24 to June 29 when two mobile X-ray units will be in Douglas County. The mobile units were in the county during 1951 and 1954. The 1954 survey revealed 239 cases of tuberculosis, lung cancer or heart trouble out of a total of 19,108 adults. The 239 persons were referred to private physicians for further diagnoses and treatment.

Christine Ling, health education consultant with the Oregon State Board of Health office at Portland, said at a recent meeting that there were 23 active cases of tuberculosis discovered in Douglas County last year and 17 the previous year.

Four agencies are sponsoring the appearance of the units in the county. The agencies are the State Board of Health, County Health Department, Douglas County Tuberculosis and Health Assn. and the County Medical Society.

Warning, Hope In Nuclear Age Voiced By Pope

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Pope Pius XII has warned that the world has entered a nuclear age which could "unexpectedly become engulfed in storm."

But—his words carrying strong overtones—St. Peter's Square—the pontiff also promised in his annual Easter message there was hope for the development of a mighty nuclear era dedicated to peace. More than 300,000 pilgrims, largest throng ever to listen to a papal Easter message, gave a tremendous cheer as the frail, 81-year-old head of the Roman Catholic Church finished speaking from St. Peter's Basilica.

In an emotion-filled voice, the Pope said: "Many already are beginning to perceive—and admit it—that this night of the world has come about because Christ has been arrested; they wished to exclude Him from family, cultural and social life; because the people have risen up against Him, because He has been crucified, and rendered voiceless and motionless."

"Meanwhile, in the world, under Providence, there are about to be multiplied methods for the fuller and freer development of life. While the discoveries of science broaden the horizon of human possibilities, technical developments and organization render such conquests effective by putting them at the immediate service of man."

Navy Takes Limelight In Wednesday Movies
