Alaskan Game Men Fret Over End Of Guide Law

JUNEAU, Alaska — One of the nation's prime trophy animals — the massive brown bear of Alaska — is coming out of its long winter hibernation early this year.

A mild winter and an early spring has resulted in an April influx of big game hunters from the states, eager to probe the southern Alaska woods for a kill before the short spring season closes in late June.

The early birds among the approximately 500 sportsmen who annually come to Alaska for a couple of weeks of hunting will arrive this year amid a controversy that has sent territorial sportsmen into an uncommon spin.

This year — so far, at least — non-resident hunters can buy a \$50 Alaska license and take to the woods on their own, without the company of a registered professional hunting guide.

Guides Formerly Required — For 25 years, non-resident hunters unfamiliar with Alaska's rugged terrain and likely to be awed by the abundance of game in the big territory, have been required to hire an Alaskan guide.

Until last Feb. 27 the requirement still was on the books. Then

the conduct of sportsmen in the field.

The six guides demanded redress, and were scheduled to appeal to a commission meeting in February. But before they could appear, the solicitor's opinion cast doubt on whether a guide could be forced to report a violation in which he was personally involved.

All Guide Laws Junked

The commission held the solicitor's opinion "took the heart out of the guide laws," and so junked them all.

Since then, the commission has proposed new legislation which would enable new regulations to be drafted to restore the guide requirements in proper legal form.
