

Girls' Car Club Slates Driving Event For Sunday

Members of the Winston Road Queens, a girls' car club, will hold a safe driving event entitled "Go-Whoa" Sunday at 2 p.m. on Lookingglass Road.

Permission has been granted by the county court for the club to hold the event on a one-tenth of a mile stretch of highway on Lookingglass Road. Finish line for the program will be in front of the Lookingglass School. Traffic passing through that area during the afternoon will be controlled by the Douglas County Sheriff's Dept.

First, second and third place trophies will be awarded to the winners. Object of the event is to start a car from a dead stop, drive the tenth of a mile and stop on a line without spinning the car wheels when starting or stopping.

Spectators will be admitted to the "Go-Whoa" free, but there is a \$1 entrance fee for participants. Janabel Hiatt, club president said. The organization was formed Dec. 6, 1950, and has 18 charter members. This is the first event the club has sponsored, Miss Hiatt said.

The Winston Road Queens is the first girls' hot rod club to be organized in the state of Oregon. B. F. Scheele, Winston chief of police, said.

Roseburg Traffic Ordinance Revision Held Up Monday After Council Consideration

A new Roseburg traffic ordinance which would bring up to date and put in one package the city's traffic laws failed to gain passage last night.

Instead, after several attempts to amend it, the ordinance was referred to the city manager and chief of police for clarification and filling in of blank spaces calling for fees and other figures.

Two provisions of the proposed ordinance were questioned by Councilman Ross Myers. One was a portion outlawing parking of "any truck on any street between the hours of 9 p.m. and 6 a.m. of the following day in front of or adjacent to any residence, a court, or apartment house or within — feet of any hotel."

Myers felt that the provision would discriminate against owners of pickup trucks. Others said they believed it would work a hardship on other trucks.

Myers' motion to strike the paragraph was defeated eight to three. Voting with him were Rudie Ritzman and Kenneth Ellison. However, this portion of the ordinance is to be studied by the city manager and police chief for report at the next meeting.

Myers also tried to have a section stricken prohibiting the moving of any vehicle within a block in order to extend the time of parking. This motion brought a tie vote which was broken by Mayor Arlo Jacklin voting "no."

The council passed an ordinance advertising \$850,000 in bonds to be sold to pay for the sewer improvement project. Bids on the sale of bonds will be opened May 27. Bids for construction are to be opened May 20.

An ordinance which would repeal two obsolete ones as part of the recodification program was given first reading.

A request by the Roseburg Junior Chamber of Commerce to have June 22 proclaimed a legal holi-

day as the start of the annual rodeo met with considerable disfavor and was referred to the city manager. He is to confer with the Jaycees to determine if the group means for all business houses to close that day.

Approved was a renewal of a beer license for The Club. The application stated that the place would be moved from 624 Cass to 809 SE. Cass St.

An application to start a shopping news was approved. Applying for a license were W. R. Graham and Dean F. Fogel.

The low bid of the San Jose Steel Co. for furnishing and installing chain link fence on two sides of the sewage disposal plant property was accepted. The firm offered to do the job for \$4,325. Other bidders were Colorado Fuel and Iron, \$4,584 and Cyclone Fence Division of U. S. Steel, \$4,640.

Policy of the council in handling liquor license applications was questioned by Ritzman who said he felt that such applications should be turned over to the police chief for report. Most of his fellow councilmen were of the opinion that it would be a time consuming task and is being done quite well by the state liquor commission.

Councilman Sid Moon said he believes the method of handling bids should be altered to have them opened at council meetings. Presently, they are opened at the city hall after the deadline is reached and compiled for council action.

Councilman Jim Knudsen disagreed and said a change would result in "a terrible waste of time." However, upon his motion, it was decided to refer the question to the city attorney for study and recommendation.

Explorer Finds Snowman's Tracks

NEW DELHI, India — Texas oilman Tom Slick said here Tuesday he considered the "abominable snowman" a vital missing link in the theory of evolution of man.

Slick and his party flew in Tuesday at the end of their reconnaissance to the Barun Valley in eastern Nepal in search of the snowman.

Slick said he came across and photographed two kinds of footprints — one resembling footprints found by British Himalayan climber Eric Shipton, and the other bearing a greater resemblance to human footprints such as his fellow investigator Australian journalist Peter Byrnes saw in Sikkim last year.

He said he is convinced there are two kinds of snowmen — one smaller and the other bigger sized but both belonging to the same family.

He plans to return to the Himalayas again in September "with a larger, more expert team with greater equipment and longer time to complete an inquiry into this vital link."

Photographer Records Fatal Tower Plunge

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. — A 38-year-old steelworker fell to his death Monday from a 175-foot church tower while a Birmingham news photographer recorded the dramatic plunge.

J. B. Standridge of Bangor, Ala., was killed when a "gin" pole being used to hoist a steeple into place atop the tower broke.

Standridge was one of three workmen atop the tower. He was helping to work the steeple into position when the pole, or boom, broke and the steeple toppled over, dragging him to his death.

Ed Jones, the photographer, had been assigned to make a series of feature pictures as the steeple neared completion at the Hunter Street Baptist Church in the Central Park residential area.

Stevenson Calls Again For Nuclear Tests' Ban

CHICAGO — Adlai E. Stevenson has called again for curbs on the testing of large nuclear weapons.

He made the request in a statement to newsmen Monday after conferring with Dr. Masatoshi Matsushita, a representative of Japanese Prime Minister Kishi, who is sounding out Western leaders on a possible ban on the tests.

Stevenson, the 1952 and 1956 Democratic nominee for president, had declared during his 1956 campaign that the United States should take the lead in stopping further hydrogen bomb tests.

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Mikoyan Says Russia Wants To Be Friendly

VIENNA — Soviet Deputy Premier A. I. Mikoyan declared here Tuesday his country wants "friendly relations with independent and neutral Austria on the basis of mutual friendship for the welfare of our two peoples." He made the statement upon arrival for a five-day visit and talks with Austrian officials. Mikoyan is expected to take up both political and commercial subjects with the Austrians, who are reported seeking a reduction in reparations this country still delivers to the Soviet Union under terms of the Austrian independence agreement.
