Miss Altman, who suffered lacerations and had three teeth knocked out, was cited for reckless driving. Fisher was given a ticket for not having a driver's license in his possession. Kerr was not cited and was unhurt.

Operations And Functions Of Small Business Program Explained At C Of C Meet

"Small Business Administration business loans in Oregon, accumulative through April 8, have totaled \$4,911,000," John G. Barnett, branch manager of the SBA office at Portland, told persons at the weekly Roseburg Chamber of Commerce noon luncheon forum Monday.

Barnett explained the functions and operations of the SBA. "SBA assistance is not provided as a specialized service, but as part of the agency's overall program of service to industry and the public. The agency was created because it is realized that small firms have problems which are peculiar to them simply because they are small, and that an independent agency of the government is needed to help with these problems and to act as a spokesman and advocate for small business in the national administration," Barnett said.

He pointed out three principal responsibilities of the administration. He listed these as: To help small firms gain access to adequate credit on reasonable terms; to help them obtain a fair share of the government's orders and contracts; and to assist small firms with their managerial and technical production problems.

"Losses in the lending program are at a minimum. As of Feb. 28, 1957, only \$70,224 in principal balance of business loans had been charged off by the SBA as uncollectible, and thus as losses, as compared with \$175,638,000 in total business loans disbursed," Barnett said.

SBA loans are granted for financing business construction, conversion or expansion, purchase of equipment, facilities, machinery, supplies or materials and for working capital. Requirements for obtaining loans were described by Barnett. "Applicants must be of good character, show evidence of ability to operate his business successfully, and have enough capital so that he can operate on a sound financial basis," he said.

Barnett went on to say that the SBA has several different types of loans with different interest rates, maturities and uses. On business loans the interest rate is usually six per cent with maximum maturity of ten years and maximum loan or exposure of \$250,000.

The SBA was created in 1953. The act under which the agency was created states that no financial assistance shall be extended unless the financial assistance requested is not otherwise available on reasonable terms. No direct loan may be made unless it is shown that a participation with a bank or other lending institution is not available, Barnett said.

"In order to aid small firms in improving their managerial techniques, the SBA co-sponsors administrative management courses with colleges and other interested organizations. The agency publishes a series of management and technical production publications," Barnett added.

Porter Favors Crash Program Against H-Bomb

Rep. Charles O. Porter Monday said he was in favor of launching a \$10 billion "crash" program of underground shelters against the effects of the hydrogen bomb.

He said his feelings on the subject were solidified with his recent visit with a Congressional delegation to Ft. Benning Ga. He said he was told a hydrogen bomb had been perfected, a single one of which carried more explosive power than all the bombs exploded previously in the history of the world.

He indicated efforts should be made immediately to prepare a defense against explosion and radiation by building underground shelters for the entire population of the United States. "Now we have no place to hide," he said.

He said such action would only be taken "if I had my way." Meanwhile, he said he and Sen. Richard Neuberger are working on a plan for legislation which would bring about a research program to determine an effective defense to the bomb and its effects.
