Southern Baptists Schedule Revival

The First Southern Baptist Church, Roseburg, will hold a one-week revival from April 28 to May 5.

The Rev. J. T. Howard, Roseburg, will preach and Rev. B. A. Millard, area missionary, will be in charge of the music. Mrs. Millard will play the piano. Weekday services will be held each evening at 7:30 p.m. Sunday services will be held at 11 a.m. and 7:30 p.m. on April 28 and at 10:40 a.m. and 7:30 p.m. on May 5. Southern Baptists of the United States, Canada and Alaska, comprising 31,000 churches and nine million members, are launching the simultaneous revival campaign. The Cascade Assn., composed of churches at Roseburg, Drain, Eugene and Springfield, will be cooperating in the campaign.

American Flagship Enters Suez Canal

SUEZ, Egypt — The President Jackson, first American flagship to enter the Suez Canal since it was blocked last fall, started through the waterway today from the southern end.

The ship's agents said the \$10,235 toll for movement through the 102-mile canal was paid in U. S. dollars — as required by Egypt's new canal regulations — but under protest. The U. S. State Department previously had suggested such procedure for American vessels using the canal.

NEW YORK — Schoolboy science wizard Robert Strom reluctantly retired from TV quiz show competition last night with a record \$192,000 in winnings. Two Women Say Signed Affidavits Were False

prostitution and of using narcotics. He had denied that under oath before the committee.

Both Mrs. Weeks and Mrs. Childress denied in testimony Wednesday the truth of the affidavit. Mrs. Weeks said she had met Elkins only once and had no knowledge that he had accepted the profits of prostitutes or taken narcotics. In the sequence of Wednesday's hearing, Minelli swore as the first witness that the affidavit was given him voluntarily by the women. They then testified that what they had said in the affidavit was untrue and only given under threats of being jailed.

Minelli, brought back to the stand, was asked by Chairman McClellan (D-Ark) if he had any comment on the women's sworn testimony.

After denouncing their testimony as "hoax," Minelli said "I stand on my record and my testimony."

Mrs. Childress told the committee she merely had signed Mrs. Weeks' affidavit as a witness. She said she did not know whether the statements made were true. She also said she didn't know Elkins and had no knowledge of any of his activities.

Mrs. Childress described herself as "unemployed and a housewife." "I am married," she said. "I am not a prostitute."

Under questioning by committee counsel Robert Kennedy, however, she said she had been arrested for prostitution in 1933.

"It was just once," she said. "She supported Minelli's story," she said.

Mrs. Weeks had testified earlier that she and Mrs. Childress were extradited from Mexico City to Portland in connection with a burglary at the residence of Ray Clark, an aide to Elkins, which she said had occurred "about August, 1936."

Mrs. Weeks told the senators "my profession is, I'm a known prostitute."

The 25-year-old woman showed no trace of embarrassment as she stated "I got a \$10 a week" and launched into her testimony.

She wore a white dress that hung low on her narrow shoulders. The dress clung tightly to her body as she swished up to the witness stand.

She said Minelli took her and Mrs. Childress into custody in Laredo, Tex., when Mexican police expelled her across the international border. She did not state the date.

She said that on the way back to Portland Minelli "let us know that if we didn't want to cooperate he would make it very hard on us."

Later, during the questioning at the Multnomah County (Portland) Court House when she signed the affidavit, "they made it very plain that if I didn't give expected answers I would be in jail for six months," she said.

Miss Weeks said she feared that "I possibly would go to prison for something I didn't do" or wind up "in Salem" which she said was a hospital for the insane in Oregon because, she said, she was a narcotics addict herself then.

"For every question he (Minelli) would have the answer at the same time," she said.

Miss Weeks said she was never prosecuted on the robbery charge involved in the extradition, and that her bail was reduced from \$3,000 to \$1,000 after she made the "false affidavit."

She said Minelli offered to buy her and Miss Childress "some clothes" but never did, although, she said, the doctor (sheriff) gave her money at times.

"He'd give us \$20 one time, then he might give us \$10, then it was \$20 at another time," Miss Weeks said.

"He told us if we would play ball with him he'd play ball with us."

Jacob George Robbins, 69, well-known resident of Camas Valley, died at his home Tuesday.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of Long & Orr Mortuary, Thursday at 2 p.m. with Dr. Eugene Gerlitz of the First Baptist Church officiating. Military services under the auspices of the Veterans of World War I and burial will follow in the Ten-mile Cemetery.

U. N. Truce Observer Reports On Minefield

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. — The U.N.'s top Palestine truce observer said today he had found an illegal marked minefield in a demilitarized zone on Israel's side of her armistice line with Syria and was "taking steps to have any existing mines removed."

U.S. Col. Byron V. Leary, acting chief of staff of the U.N. truce supervision organization, added, however, he had discovered nothing to support a Syrian charge that Israel was "building military fortifications" in the zone in violation of the 1949 armistice agreement.

He turned down a Syrian request that he ask Israel to take away a 120-foot steel bridge in the same area spanning the Jordan River at an outlet of Lake Huleh north of the Sea of Galilee.

Roseburg High Class Of 1932 Slates Reunion

Roseburg High School's class of 1932 will hold a reunion on about the 25th anniversary of their graduation June 22, announced Floyd Wilson, who has been making arrangements.

The reunion of the class, which originally numbered 106, will take place in the Hotel Linqua in the afternoon and evening, starting with a no-host luncheon.

Wilson said he has been having very good luck contacting his classmates. Only six haven't been reached, he said. Four of the class no longer are living.

Teen-Age White Youth Slays Negro In Feud

CHICAGO — A 17-year-old Negro youth was shot and killed and police said a white teenage boy admitted the slaying.

The fatal shooting of Curtis Bevan, 16, a Negro, followed a fresh outbreak of teen-age violence in Chicago. Bevan died in a hospital about an hour after he was wounded in the chest by a shotgun blast fired from a moving car containing two white youths and a 17-year-old girl.

Police said David Vandersteeg, 19, a laborer, admitted he fired the shotgun from the rear seat of the car, driven by Dennis Moffitt, 18, a factory worker. The girl, Eunice Miller, a high school junior, was in the front seat.

88 this year. Deller explained that he had rejected all requests for capital improvements. Some purchases will be made from bond money for buildings.

Economy Is Effected

Estimated maintenance and repair expenses would decrease from \$96,628.79 to \$87,373.07. The superintendent said the district has been able to effect some economy in purchasing, warehousing and better utilization of materials.

In the auxiliary agencies category of the budget, it will show \$208,762.50 budgeted last year, but only \$100,920 for the coming year. But again, the difference can be explained by the publication of the lunch program as a separate budget within the whole budget.

On the other side of the ledger, \$138,626.32 is expected to be spent for fixed charges — insurance, rent, etc. — more than the \$123,572.68 set down for the current year. The difference, according to Deller, is an increase of employee retirement contributions which the district is required to pay.

12 Classrooms Added

Expenses of operation of the school plant is up from \$215,325 to \$223,479, largely because of the addition of six classrooms in the new Eastwood School and six in the expansion of Huerfano School.

The outlay for instruction — largest of the categories — is up from \$1,318,420.19 to \$1,376,968.36, mostly because of hiring of more teachers to meet increased enrollments and adjusting of principals' salaries to come into line with other Oregon school districts.

Bond interest and sinking fund expenditures — they are irreducible — are up to \$288,556.25 from \$270,669.75, because of sale of bonds during the past year.

General control remains virtually the same — \$51,126 this year; \$50,647.60 next year.

Broken down the budget summary reads in this sort of prose:

Expenses Decreased

Total estimated expenditures are \$2,330,518.59. Subtract \$1,069,163.45 in estimated receipts and cash carryover to get a \$1,261,355.14 sum necessary to balance the budget.

But some people won't pay their taxes, so add \$161,133.51 for a \$1,422,490.65 necessary to tax in order to balance the budget. Of that, \$451,459.58 is within the 6 per cent limitation, leaving the \$971,031.07 outside the 6 per cent limitation necessary to vote on June 17.

When, or if, that is approved, the school budget committee will have made a five-year record.

Deller said Tuesday that the three meetings required were the least number in adopting a budget since he became superintendent.

A. G. McLain was chairman of the budget committee. Other lay members were Bert Young, Gordon Smith, Don Metzger and Gerald S. McCarthy. The other half of the 10-man committee was the school board: Harold Hoyt, Dudley C. Walton, Darley Ware, Wayne Crooch and Arthur Lamka.

U. S. Requests U. N. Meeting On Suez Crisis

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. — The United States asked Wednesday that the U.N. Security Council meet Thursday afternoon "or as soon thereafter as may be convenient" to take up the Suez Canal question again.

U. S. delegate Henry Cabot Lodge filed the request with the council president, Sir Pierson Dixon, in a letter made public by the U.S. delegation.

He asked that the council meet "for the purpose of resuming discussion" on the canal question, on which it adopted a resolution last Oct. 13 embodying six basic requirements for a settlement of the issue.

About the time the United States was requesting the council meeting Egypt disclosed in Cairo its plan for the canal calling for Egyptian collection of all tolls and the setting up of arbitration machinery for settling disputes.

The Egyptian government said the document constituted "an international instrument" and would be deposited and registered with the U.N. secretary general.

Local Man To Answer Charge Of Taking Car

Arraigned in district court this morning on two felony charges, Jackie Blansett, 20, of Roseburg, was ordered held to answer in circuit court.

Blansett was arrested in Klamath Falls last Thursday on charges of larceny by conditional tender. Complaining witness was Frances Gilley who charged that Blansett had taken a car from Douglas County without consent.

It also faces a count of obtaining property by false pretense. William R. True signed the complaint which alleges that Blansett gave a worthless \$118 check for a car.

Winston Resident Found Dead In House Trailer

Charles Henry Schroeder, 52, died this morning in his trailer house on Ronald street in Winston.

The Winston resident worked as a panel patcher for the Roseburg Lumber Co. He came to Roseburg about 3½ years ago and was living alone at the time of his death. He is survived by eight children, all living in Iowa.

The stoppage was reported as effective in other towns, particularly on the west bank of the Jordan, in Palestine territory Jordan occupied after the 1948 war. That sector is a leftist stronghold.

Jordan's latest crisis was touched off by charges that persons close to King Hussein were plotting with the British and Americans against the kingdom's independence. Khalidi denied the charges but the government radio in Egypt and Syria aired them over and over.
