

County 'B' Track Meet Set Saturday

One of the local track season's highlights, the annual Douglas County Class B School Track Meet, brings together contestants from six schools Saturday starting at 10 a.m. on the Myrtle Creek High School track.

At least three of the schools, de-

fending champion Canyonville, Days Creek and Yoncalla, will enter full teams in the 14-event meet while three others, Elkton, Camas Valley and Riddle, will have smaller, but adequate, representation.

The three better represented schools are naturally expected to score the heaviest, and a three-way battle for top team honors leaves little to choose from on the basis of mid-season performances.

For Days Creek Coach Tom Mason, who has been molding the southern Douglas County school's track program for the past two years after developing powerhouses at Yoncalla for three years, this could be the realization of that effort with a championship.

Canyonville Strong
However, on the basis of events of the best individual efforts of the season so far, Canyonville could take enough first places to offset Days Creek's overall strength. Days Creek has three of the best individual performances so far, Yoncalla has a pair and Riddle and Camas Valley have one each.

The Wolves have a strong and veteran organization which took many places last season in placing second in the county meet and which also scored well in the state meet.

Like Yoncalla and Canyonville, the Wolves will enter three men in either all or almost all of the events and a pair of relay teams as well. Yoncalla goes into the meet with Harley Johnson at the helm and Canyonville is coached

On the basis of the mid-season performances, much record-breaking is in promise if athletes reach their top level. But much of the record-breaking, if any develops, can be expected to come from the schools with smaller contingents entered.

Elkton is Threat
Elkton, with defending state high hurdles champion Dick Johnson in the fold, is a threat at record-breaking as is Camas Valley with entry Bob Thrush in the pole vault. Johnson hasn't taken part in any meets officially this season, but Thrush has exceeded the pole vault record of 10-11 by half an inch.

Other records which have been exceeded include the 440-yard mark, the shot put and the javelin, while the broad jump record has been equaled.

Individual favorites on the basis of best performances so far this season include the sprinters, Lynn Ullam of Canyonville with times of 10.8 in the 100 and 25.1 in the 220, in the 440-yard dash, Stan Kinney of Canyonville with a time of 53.4 and in the hurdles, Leon Oaks of Canyonville with a time of 17.9 in the high and Bob Leary of Days Creek with a time of 22.6 in the low.

Parrot Best in Mile
Distance event favorite is Paul Parrot of Canyonville with times of 5:01 and 2:12 in the mile and 8:80, while the best 880-relay time has been a 1:43.2 by the Days Creek team.

In the field events in addition to Thrush's 10-11 pole vault, Yoncalla holds two of the bests in Everett Sweeney's 166-8 javelin throw and Frank Curtright's 19-10.

The meet will be scored on a 10-8-6-4-2-1 basis for the first six scorers in each event. The meet, open to schools of 200-students daily attendance or less, was open to 11 county schools this year.

Frosh Triumph In Track Meet

The Roseburg Frosh barely outscored the Joseph Lane and Central junior high track teams as the three squads took part in the first of two scheduled triangular track meets Thursday at Finlay Field.

Two city junior high records were broken one by an athlete from each school. Bill Friday of Joseph Lane ran the 660-yard event in 1:40.4 to break Sylvanus Hunt's 1956 mark of 1:41.9 for Joseph Lane. In the shot put, Joe Bailey of Central threw 44-2 to beat the 43-8 mark set by Joseph Lane's Smith in 1956.

The Frosh won seven of the 11 events in scoring 51 points to Joseph Lane's 45 1/2 and Central's 19 1/2. Lynn Baxter led the winners with firsts in the two sprint events and the broad jump.

Joseph Lane won the seventh grade meet 72-18 with 5-7, 135-pound Earl Dixon taking three firsts.

Are the Chicago White Sox just off on their usual spring sprint, or has new manager Al Lopez got them hustling to go the distance? Either way, nice-guy Lopez—the only manager who did not concede the

American League pennant to the New York Yankees in spring training—has the White Sox off and flying with a 6-1 record and a half-game edge over the Yankees for first place.

Lopez has mixed speed, great defense, youth and so far successful position shifts to win both the neat, close ones and the messy slugfests.

The Sox padded their slim lead with a 9-4 victory over the Detroit Tigers yesterday in a three-hour tussle that had 28 hits, 11 doubles and 25 stranded base runners. The Yankees were idle.

In the other AL games, Boston's Ted Williams—off to an unusually fast start—banged a two-run double and two singles for a 3-for-3 day as the Red Sox bagged Washington 12-7; and the Cleveland Indians unfrocked the Kansas City A's, who had won three in a row, 5-3.

Only one National League game was played with the Cincinnati Redlegs pairing six hits with four errors to defeat Chicago's Cubs 6-3 for their fourth consecutive victory.

Despite 16 hits, six of them doubles, the White Sox had some trouble. They finally got the job done with Nelson Fox chipping in two doubles and a single, Minnie Mino and Bubba Phillips each driving in a pair of runs, and Phillips and Jim Rivera both getting three hits, with a double for each.

Boat Laws Cited By Local Club

Officers of the newly formed Umpqua Boat Club met this week to work out information and recommendations for boat operators. President M. M. (Skip) Cairns pointed out since the boating and fishing seasons are here. He cited laws covering operation of boats in Oregon.

The laws listed were:
1. Speed limit of boats is 10 miles per hour within 100 feet of a dock or wading or swimming beach.
2. At all times, motor boats should be operated in a "careful and prudent manner," so as not to endanger property or life.
3. No boat should be operated when the operator is under the influence of intoxicating liquor.
4. Everyone operating a boat should inquire about speed restrictions or use of motor boats on particular lakes in which they wish to fish. For example, on Diamond Lake in eastern Douglas County, the motor boat speed limit is 10 miles per hour.

The committee of officers also pointed out that many fishermen were under the impression that use of boats above Winchester is now legal. Cairns said it is not. Although the Legislature has passed a law allowing use of boats above the dam, this law will not go into effect until 60 days after the close of the current Legislature. Waters closed to boats also include all lakes in the upper Umpqua basin.

The next regular meeting of the club is scheduled May 8 at 7:30 p.m. in the county court auditorium. A movie is on the agenda.

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
