

Good Citizenship Day Scheduled Here For Friday

Final plans have been completed for Friday's first Community Good Citizenship Day for Roseburg and vicinity.

Focal point of the day will be Mark Hatfield, Oregon secretary of state, who has been booked solid for the day with interviews, meetings and addresses.

The day has been planned by the Roseburg Council of United Church Women and the Central Junior High School Parent-Teachers Assn. The purpose is to call attention to the "benefits, privileges and opportunities enjoyed in our American way of life," according to General Chairman Mrs. Arthur Lamka. She said it is also designed to promote "good citizenship within the community."

Hatfield has been scheduled for two major speeches during the day, the first at the annual May Fellowship Day observance in the First Baptist Church at 10 a.m. and the other at 7:30 p.m. at Central Junior High School. The evening address will be part of a community-wide meeting.

Hatfield's afternoon will be packed with activities. He will be taken in tow by Mrs. Ray Doerner, Douglas County PTA regional vice president, and will be escorted to the two Roseburg junior highs and the senior high where Freedom Foundation posters will be presented to the students.

From 4 to 6 p.m., anyone having questions or problems involving state government will be able to discuss them with Hatfield in the county court auditorium in the Douglas County Courthouse.

Mrs. Lamka said if the day is well received, efforts will be made to stage the observance annually.

Weeks and Mary Childress—told in their appearance before the Senate committee.

It accuses Minelli and others of getting the women to sign affidavits saying they had seen Elkins use narcotics and take money from prostitutes and had seen Clark "alter and edit" wire and tape recordings of room and telephone conversations.

The indictment says the women were forced to sign the affidavits under the threat of being prosecuted for burglary and larceny, and of being committed to the state mental hospital as drug addicts.

The two women later repudiated the statements in their appearance before the grand jury here and before the U.S. Senate committee.

Meanwhile there were these other developments stemming from the vice investigation here. Langley, convicted last week of deliberate failure to prosecute gamblers, was denied a new trial but sentencing was postponed at least until Thursday. The penalty is removal from office and a possible fine.

Schrank spent all of Monday on the witness stand at the federal trial of Elkins and Clark in U.S. District Court. Elkins and Clark are accused of illegally tapping and recording a number of telephone conversations. Schrank told of his part in the raid on Clark's home in which a set of tape recordings were seized that were used as evidence in the federal indictment of Elkins and Clark.

Vacation Said Very Beneficial To Eisenhower

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP)—President Eisenhower made ready to head back to Washington Tuesday and his doctor reported the chief executive's Georgia vacation has been "very beneficial" to his health.

The White House physician, Maj. Gen. Howard M. Snyder, sent word to newsmen that the President gained two pounds during the last 15 days and the nagging cough he developed in January has been "virtually eliminated."

Facing tough international problems and the job of trying to push his legislative program through Congress, Eisenhower arranged to leave by plane for Washington in the afternoon.

During the morning Eisenhower got in a last round of golf at the Augusta National Club. That kept his record of 18 holes a day during the vacation intact.

Aerobee-Hi Rocket Soars To New World Record

WHITE SANDS PROVING GROUND, N.M. (AP)—An Aerobee-Hi rocket soared to a new world record altitude for single stage booster rockets Tuesday.

Officials here said the rocket reached a peak altitude of between 180 and 200 miles. The previous record for such missiles was 164 miles.

Tuesday's Aerobee-Hi carried no satellite instruments such as have been contained in some recent firings, but was intended strictly for height.

The radar failed when the rocket was 180 miles from the earth, a spokesman said. It was traveling at a speed of between 4,500 and 4,900 miles per hour.

Near East Traveler To Be Evangelist In Roseburg Church

Dr. White Heads For Beirut To Treat Premier

ROME (AP)—Dr. Paul Dudley White, President Eisenhower's heart specialist, changed his plans for a Middle East lecture tour Tuesday and rushed directly to Beirut to treat ailing Lebanese Premier Sami Solh.

Dr. White received an appeal from American officials in Beirut to go there as quickly as possible. The message reached him through State Department channels when his plane reached Paris, en route to Rome.

There were contradictory reports on the condition of the premier, who was taken to American University Hospital in Beirut Sunday. His illness first was attributed to a heart attack, and later to lung congestion.

American officials in Beirut had described Solh's condition as "worsening" and told Dr. White that to delay until "Wednesday" may be too late.

A medical bulletin in Beirut Tuesday, however, said the premier's condition was "improving rapidly."

Sen. McCarthy's Condition Better

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) was reported Tuesday to have spent a "fairly quiet night" at Bethesda Naval Hospital but was still in a serious condition from acute hepatitis.

Cmdr. John H. Gilpin, executive assistant to the hospital commandant, said McCarthy was "slightly improved" from his condition at the time he was admitted Sunday evening. His temperature was normal Tuesday.

McCarthy Monday night was taken out of an oxygen tent in which he was placed shortly after being admitted, Gilpin said.

"His condition is still considered serious," Gilpin said. "He has acute hepatitis. As a result of this, he is real weak, which is normal for this illness. It will be a few days before we can tell just how long he will be here."

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Marines Go Ashore In Mid-East War Games Now On

ABOARD USS MOUNT MCKINLEY, in Beirut (AP)—Marines of the U.S. 6th Fleet went ashore in the Middle East today wearing tropical dress uniforms rather than battle fatigues and grins instead of grenades.

While 50 other ships of the fleet conducted air defense maneuvers, six transports with 1,800 men of the 6th Marines' 2nd Battalion moved into Beirut harbor for a liberty party.

A two-pounder gun on this flagship of the amphibious force boomed separate 21-gun salutes for Lebanon and President Camille Chamoun as the force entered the harbor at 9 a.m.

As this correspondent flew over in a Navy transport plane Monday, the powerful 6th Fleet 7,500 feet below was four lines of slim gray shapes drawing white lines across the brilliant Mediterranean blue.

The supercarrier Forrestal, center of the fleet, steamed briskly into the wind as planes landed on its flight decks.

To the Forrestal's right were the heavy cruisers Des Moines and Salem, the latter the flagship of Vice Adm. Charles "Cat" Brown, the fleet commander.

Ahead, behind and to the sides rode nine destroyers in two lines. Further wispy stripes told of the presence of other warships, presumably the battleship Wisconsin, the carrier Lake Champlain and a dozen lesser vessels.

The great force was barely 100 miles off Beirut, and only scant minutes by jet plane from Jordan.

The first of the Dionne quintuplets to become engaged, Cecile said in a Montreal Herald interview she and radio technician Philippe Langlois, 26, probably will marry some time after she graduates from a nursing course here in August.

She reported her plans are approved by her parents Mr. and Mrs. Ovide Dionne of Callander, Ont.

The Dionne quint, four of whom are living, will be 23 May 28. Cecile and Yvonne are the same class of a nursing course at Notre Dame de l'Esperance Hospital in suburban St. Laurent.

Annette Dionne is studying music in Quebec City. Marie, after saving up to live in a flower shop named Emile, who died in 1954, is acting as housekeeper for Yvonne and Cecile.

ident's envoy, James P. Richards, to Jordan.

"But if it is a matter of combating communism, this we are doing," he declared. "The spread of communism is a threat to our national and spiritual well-being."

On the question of Israel, he said: "The problem is one facing the entire Arab world and not Jordan alone. Unless the right of people to live in their own country is to stay there, a restored state will be difficult for any kind of peace in this area."

The King alleged that more than a million persons have been expelled from Palestine "with brutal force."
