Easier Timber Buying Method May Be Adopted

EUGENE — A liberalized procedure for purchasing national forest timber which would virtually eliminate the advance payment requirements may be adopted within a few weeks by the U. S. Forest Service.

Edward P. Cliff, assistant chief for national forest administration of the Forest Service, outlined Monday two new procedures which are under consideration by regional offices.

In a letter to Western Forest Industries Assn., Cliff detailed recent changes in present payment bond and refund procedures and said regional offices have been asked to report by May 6 on two other proposals which would have a far-reaching effect on timber purchasing in this area.

Cliff said the Forest Service has authorized acceptance of payment bonds "in any amount above the minimum size of cash payment specified in the timber sale contract." In effect, this greatly reduces the amount of the bond.

Refunding Permitted
A second change, authorized April 18, would permit regional foresters to refund overpayments on timber sale contracts in many cases, even though the sale contract has not been completely closed.

Still being studied is a proposal which would permit timber purchasers, in some instances, to increase the size of their performance bonds and would authorize cutting without advance payments up to the amount of this bond.

The second change still being considered would permit purchasers to post a blanket bond, portions of which the Forest Service could assign to several different sales.

New Treatment Of Neurotic Patients Told

DALLAS — A new technique of treating neurotic patients, by putting them into a deep sleep for as long as 60 days and using recordings to restore their confidence was described yesterday by a Canadian psychiatrist.

The patient is put to sleep with barbiturates and tranquilizers for 30 to 60 days. He is awakened only long enough for three meals a day and electric shock treatments, said Dr. D. Ewen Cameron, chairman of the psychiatry department of McGill University at Montreal, Canada.

Dr. Cameron calls his new sleep-and-verbal-repetition treatment "psychic driving" — the theory being that new and improved behavior patterns are driven into a patient by repeating recorded verbal signals.

Record Playing Included
The long nap is followed by a powerful dose of positive thinking. The patient listens to a record playing two or three affirmative statements over and over of 15 hours a day, perhaps for a week.

Depending on the individual's needs, the recording says different things, but an example might be: "I do have confidence. I can make decisions. People do like me."

After six or seven days of this, the patient is put back to sleep for 5 to 10 days while the new attitudes driven into his consciousness by the recorded voice sink deeper and become apart of his personality, at least for the time being.

In some patients, he said the change lasts only a few days, in others for weeks or months and in a few, it has lasted as long as a year.

Dr. Cameron made the report at the annual meeting of the Texas Neuropsychiatric Assn. He is a past president of the American Psychiatric Assn.

Carrell said the order follows a finding that one - car accidents have accounted for 20 of the state's 79 traffic victims this year.

Those persons halted at roadblocks and found to have driven long distances without sleep will be advised to stop and exercise or take a coffee break.
