

Eugene Man Takes Overall Honors In PITA; Langlois Claims Laurels

Visiting gunners toted off the top prizes in the PITA registered trapshoot held at the Roseburg Rod and Gun Club over the weekend. A total of 90 entries took part. The scattergunners fired in four classes during the two-day event with Eugene Ballwe of Eugene taking high overall shoot honors with a total of 427 out of a possible 430. Runnerup was John Willener of Eugene with a 424 total.

Leading Class A shooter was Nelson Reed of Klamath Falls on a

423 total. Other class champions were John Roberts of Otis in Class B with 415, C. McCulley of Gold Beach in Class C with 403 and Glenn Kolkenhorst of Coos Bay in Class D with 391.

High woman for the shoot was Christal Hielman of Cottage Grove with a 70 total and runnerup was Mrs. Carl Bennett of Cottage Grove with 69. John Allen of Coos Bay was high junior with 88.

The "new shooter trophy" was taken by a local entry, George Langlois, on a 79 total.

Major League Attendance Up

NEW YORK — Major league baseball attendance is up 7 per cent, an Associated Press survey revealed today.

The National League shows a gain of 64,082 over 1956 and the American 59,968 for an over-all increase of 85,530.

The world champion New York Yankees head both circuits. They attracted 129,736 customers for five home dates, 39,197 ahead of last year.

The Milwaukee Braves top the National League with 127,064, a hike of 19,191 over 1956. However, Milwaukee is moving behind its 1954 figure when it set the league mark and pulled 151,697 paid through the gates after six games.

Only five teams show deficits. Detroit Tigers (21,609), St. Louis Cardinals (19,035), Kansas City A's (19,373), New York Giants (6,803) and Chicago White Sox (2,916).

Other sizable increases are being recorded by the Pittsburgh Pirates (25,637), Cincinnati Redlegs (22,291) and Philadelphia Phillies (22,160).

The Brooklyn Dodgers, who have been making threatening gestures in the direction of Los Angeles, are up 1,656. They have drawn 75,347 customers to Ebbets Field compared with 73,921 in five home dates a year ago.

Washington, which also considered moving its franchise last winter, is another team with attendance on the upswing. The Senators have played before 75,292 home fans and they had 69,789 in 1956.

Game Fish Begin Appearing In N. Umpqua Impoundments

(This is the second of a series on the fishery resource inventories of the Umpqua River compiled by William E. Pitney and William O. Salzman, Oregon Game Commission field agents for Douglas County.)

The fish population of the newly created hydroelectric impoundments in the upper reaches of the North Umpqua drainage were sampled in August. Twenty-two brown trout were taken in one gill net set from Toketee reservoir. The impoundment was created in 1949, and a substantial brown trout fishery has been enjoyed since 1953.

Lemolo reservoir, which was filled for the first time in 1954 produced 51 game fish in two net sets. Two small trout were caught, also. Eastern brook, brown and rainbow trout were represented in the catch.

The roach that were caught had dropped down from Diamond Lake before that body of water was chemically treated in September 1954. Coarse fish do not constitute a problem at this time, and any problem that may develop possibly will be many years in coming because of the large population of cannibalistic brown trout.

The Twin Lakes in the Calf Creek drainage of the upper North Umpqua were examined in October. Two gill nets in the larger lake produced only nine small fish, and the lesser lake appeared to be totally void of any fish life. Six of the nine fish caught were sexually mature and all five of the females were ready to spawn.

Saunders Lake contained a large population of yellow perch of fair size while the trout population appeared to be holding its own, although the small size of the sample does not warrant further comment.

Hall Lake was fished intensively with gill nets and catfish nets. Cutthroat trout were taken in satisfactory numbers and size. The fish were the result of fry plants and natural reproduction in the Clear Lake-Hall Lake area since ascent by anadromous forms was impossible because of a steep flume at the outlet of Hall Lake.

Marie Lake contained only cutthroat trout. An increasing number of anglers utilize this readily accessible lake each summer and the trout population appears to be maintaining itself.

More Anglers Needed
Three Mile Lake is of good size, but is the least accessible of the lakes examined and could stand additional angling pressure. The perch population has been practically untouched, and the trout sample indicated the average length of the resident fish to be nearly 12 inches. Lack of access to the lake greatly limits anglers' use at the present time.

A physical inspection of the tributaries of Smith River was initiated in the spring of 1956 to evaluate each according to spawning potential, species utilization, barriers and other information as is desirable for the proper management of the system.

Camp Creek, the principle tributary to Mill Creek, was examined for spawning areas and barriers in the early summer and later for effects from constructing a paralleling forest access road by the Bureau of Public Roads.
