Sutherlin Adopts Reduced City Budget; Vote Slated

Sutherlin city officials have settled on Tuesday, June 4, as the date in which a special budget levy of \$28,329.18 outside the 6 per cent limitation will be decided.

The City Budget Committee last week finished work on the proposed 1957-58 budget, and it's estimated that the tax levy will be whittled 7.7 mills from the current year's tax rate of 35.3 mills. It would be the lowest rate since the 1953-54 fiscal year.

City Manager C. Dean Smith said the budget-makers had the slump in business conditions fully in mind in cutting back budget expenditures to a minimum for next year. Of the \$241,426 total expenditures, only \$132,664 will go toward

operating expenses. The remaining \$108,762 will be used to retire water and sewer bonds.

The bond retirement program includes a \$50,000 cash reserve in the sewer department to be added to \$31,200 scheduled for bond retirement and interest. The \$50,000 had been built up in sewer assessments in the city's new disposal system.

The biggest cut from the current budget came in the engineering department, expenses of which were reduced from \$6,703 to \$382. A \$5,000 item for publication of a topographic map of the city which appeared in the 1956-57 budget isn't included, of course, in the 1957-58 budget.

Also, because the work of the building and sewer inspector decreased since completion of the sewer project, the salary was reduced in the engineering and sewer departments from a total \$5,500 to \$1,200.

Salary of one employee in the street department — that part covered in the general fund — was eliminated, effecting a \$3,714 reduction.

Also eliminated was a \$2,000 addition to the city hall building reserve, an amount which was put in the reserve in the current 1956-57 year. Smith explained that future plans are to add jail and library facilities to the two-year-old city hall, but the item was left off this year because of the economic slump shared by Sutherlin with most other cities in Western Oregon.

The budget of the sewer department was increased from \$41,550 to \$63,200, but as mentioned before, the accumulated \$50,000 cash balance from sewer assessments is being allotted to bond redemption, accounting for most of the difference. The salary of a sewage treatment plant operator has been added—\$4,680.

The sewer receipts will come to an estimated \$92,000. Smith said not quite matching expenditures. But the difference will be made up, and more, by the continuing sewer levy of \$2,000.

The water department budget balances out at \$92,002, with receipts, including \$7,002 out of the general tax levy, matching expenditures. Receipts other than through taxation come to \$55,000.

The city figures to receive \$17-

300 in state shared gasoline tax refunds, and the entire amount, as required by law, is ticketed for street expenses.

The budget recapitulation shows the total tax levy to be estimated at \$67,076. Of the amount, \$38,146.82 is within the 6 per cent limitation, leaving \$28,929.18 to be approved by vote of the people June 4.

A public hearing on the budget is set for May 20 at 8 p.m. in the city hall.

Douglas High Musicians Get Good Rating At SOC

Two Douglas High School music organizations entered the Southern District Music Contest held in Medford last Saturday. Both groups were rated high by the judges.

The Douglas High School choir, directed by Irene McLaughlin received a I (superior) rating and the band, directed by Dick Dorr, received a II (excellent) rating.

This marks the first year that the band had entered a contest as a high school band in class B. Last year they were entered as a class E, beginners' band.

Only two entries, in the large group contest, participated from Douglas County this year. They were the two groups from Douglas High and the Myrtle Creek Band.

SOC Choir To Visit Canyonville, Winston

The Southern Oregon College choir, under the direction of Oscar C. Bjorlie, is making preparations for its annual tour which will take place on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of this week.

The choir will sing at Canyonville and Winston on Wednesday in its only Douglas County appearance. Included in the choir are Connie Cleveland and Chuck Plummer of Roseburg.

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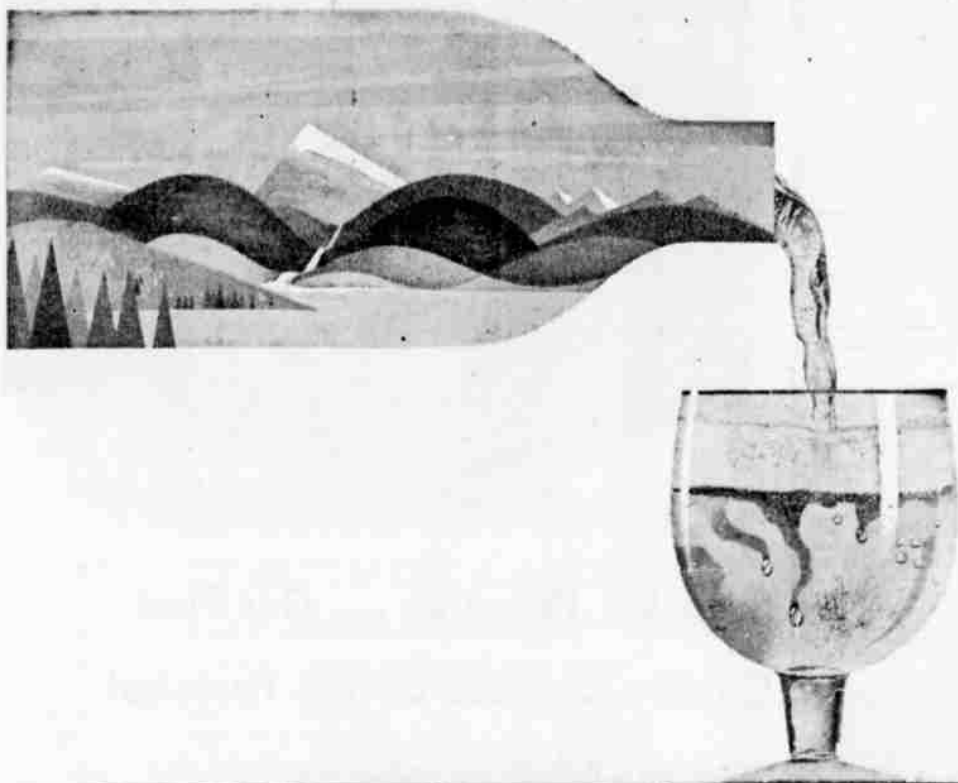
