

Texas Senator Continues Try At Filibuster

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — Sen. Henry Gonzalez of San Antonio went in to pinch-hit for Sen. Abraham Kazen Jr. Thursday in their joint filibuster to block passage of a key segregation bill.

The filibuster, kicked off at 11:15 a.m. Wednesday, and with the exception of a two-hour break for lunch, has moved steadily into its second day.

Kazen, 37, a solidly-built citizen of Larado, held the floor for 15 hours and 4 minutes until Gonzalez came in to relieve him at 3 a.m. Kazen's voice was still strong.

Kazen was aided during the night by lengthy questions from Gonzalez and Sen. Charles Herring of Austin and Hubert Hudson of Brownsville.

He leaned on his desk, or threw his leg across his plush red-leather seat during the night. He had to remain on his feet, however, to retain the floor.

Air Force Cuts Funds To Build Atomic Plane

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Air Force was disclosed today to have cut by nearly two-thirds the funds earmarked for development work next year on an atomic plane.

Testimony by Pentagon officials before a House Military Appropriations subcommittee disclosed the original figure of \$90 to \$100 million dollars had been pared to 213 millions. The testimony, given in secret some time ago, was made public today.

Donald Quarles, then Air Force secretary, testified that by a higher annual expenditure than now planned it might have been possible to build a simple "flying reactor" without too much regard to its military usefulness at some earlier date.

"We abandoned that program on the ground it was a luxury we could not afford," he said. It would not contribute to our military potential and therefore we would not attempt to do it."

What the Air Force wants, said Quarles, is a nuclear-powered bomber of "unlimited range, high altitude and supersonic speed over the target."

5 Sons Of Late Pasha Kidnaped

RABAT, Morocco (AP) — Five sons of the late Thami el Glaoui, once powerful Pasha of Marrakech, were kidnaped Wednesday. Their vast, rich palace was taken over by soldiers of the irregular Moroccan Army of Liberation.

The kidnaping and invasion of the palace brought to the surface again long simmering resentment between loyal followers of Sultan Mohammed V and El Glaoui's friends.

The irregular Army of Liberation is a guerrilla force which harassed the French until the independence of Morocco was recognized last year. It has been officially superseded by the Royal Moroccan Army, but it continues to operate in some places.

Reports from Marrakech said one of El Glaoui's sons, Abdallah, 39, was kidnaped Wednesday morning in the Medina, or old quarter, of Marrakech. Later the other four sons were whisked off by armed men who seized their car as it left the palace grounds.

Rep. Norblad Would Cut Foreign Aid Budget

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Norblad (R-Ore.) believes that the four billion dollar foreign aid budget asked for by President Eisenhower should be cut in two.

He said proposed aid of five million dollars to both Brazil and Siam and three million dollars to Ethiopia "can be materially reduced or eliminated."

The congressman said that while he supported the foreign aid program after World War II "to aid stricken areas of Europe to prevent their joining the Communist orbit," the program now "seems to be growing rather than diminishing."

McCarthy Still Serious
WASHINGTON (AP) — Bethesda Naval Hospital said Thursday the condition of Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) continues serious, and his temperature has risen.

"Little improvement has been noted during the past 12 hours," the hospital said.

McCarthy was admitted last Sunday. His illness has been diagnosed as acute hepatitis, inflammation of the liver.

Sen. Jackson Asks Monetary Policies Probe By Senate

WASHINGTON (AP) — A hearing by the Senate Finance Committee in Washington State on the nation's monetary policies was proposed Wednesday by Sen. Jackson (D-Wash.) in a letter to Sen. Byrd (D-Va.), committee chairman.

"Nowhere are the harmful effects of hard money so clear as in the lumber and wood products industry of my own and other Pacific Northwest states," Jackson told Byrd.

Jackson said the "thing primarily responsible for the recession in the industry is high interest and its impact upon new housing construction."

The Washington Democrat told Byrd Pacific Northwest employment in the lumber industry has fallen by 8,700 workers since February, 1950, the postwar peak.

In addition, Jackson said, the average work week in the lumber industry has been cut by four hours.

Jackson also said the lumber industry's action in stockpiling above levels necessary to meet orders will have a serious effect on lumber production this year unless there is an unexpected upturn in home construction.

"It is apparent," Jackson said, "that without a relaxation of the tight credit policy, the downward trend in housing starts will continue with an even more severe impact on employment and production in the lumber, construction and related industries."

A public vs. private power fight opened before a Joint Ways and Means Subcommittee. The bill would put the state into the power business so it could take power from federal dams and resell it to power companies.

Sen. Walter J. Pearson (D), Portland, and Rep. Richard E. Byrd (D), Eugene, argued that their bill would give the state a preference under the federal law that gives public power agencies the first call on federal power.

Spokesmen for the power companies claimed it would not give the state any federal preference, and that the bill might lead to state competition with private power.

In Wednesday's Senate debate, eight Democrats voted for the doubled utility tax and exemption for homes occupied by their owners. Opposing it were 15 Republicans and seven Democrats.

Sen. Dan Dimech (D), Roseburg, led the fight for the bill. He argued it was needed because the 1955 Legislature gave utilities a "windfall" by cutting their property taxes.

Before that, he said, utilities were taxed at double the rate of other classes of property, but the 1955 session cut the ratio so that it would equal other classes.

Dimech also argued that homes must have relief. The opposition was headed by Sen. Lee Ohmart (R), Salem, who feared that the bill would deprive the state of funds in order to benefit local governments.

He said the homebased exemption would result in tax increases on business property, and keep business from locating in Oregon.

"This bill," he said, "would open up a Pandora's Box that would lead to demands that taxes be changed on other classes of property."

Voting for the bill were Sens. Brady, Chapman, Dimech, Gleason, Hopkins, Musa, Pearson and Sweetland.

Sending the key district bill back to committee was accomplished by supporters of the original key district bill, which would hurt Portland and Eastern Oregon districts badly. It had passed the Senate in this original form.

The House Education Committee had compromised the bill so that nobody would get hurt very much. Now the committee has to do some more work on this hot issue.

The House-passed bill to revise personal income taxes was sent to the Senate Taxation Committee, which will begin to work on it Friday. But Sen. Walter J. Pearson (D), Portland, chairman of the committee, announced that no public hearings would be held on it.

Singer planned to question Brown about the slaying of Miss Mary Cheever, a Gary schoolteacher who was beaten to death in an alley near her home eight years ago. The case had been considered robbery, or possibly a revenge killing.
