Carrier Pigeons Disposal Won't Balance Budget

WASHINGTON — Secretary of Defense Wilson has told a House Appropriations subcommittee, which wanted to know about disposition of obsolete equipment, that "we finally got rid of the carrier pigeons."

In testimony by Pentagon officials before the subcommittee, (R-Kan) commented that "we won't balance the budget with that particular item."

Wilson said he may have been a "little flippant" in his answer about the pigeons, then gave the committee some detailed data about equipment. He said the Defense Department currently is disposing of about 1 1/2 billion dollars worth of surplus property a year.

During a three-year period ending last June 30, Wilson said, the Army disposed of about half its stock of 40mm antiaircraft guns, one-third of the 75mm guns, 32,000 of the 30 caliber machine guns, most of the older 105mm howitzers and a quantity of other outdated weapons.

During the same period, the Navy cut its inventory of older ships by 11 destroyers, 3 transports, 12 large infantry landing ships, 39 escort vessels, 103 mine sweepers and a number of other craft.

The Air Force dropped almost all of its World War II B29 bombers, most of its B17 bombers (leaving only 98 in inventory, used for personnel carriers), 675 F51 and F47 prop-driven fighters and a quantity of trainers.

Homemakers Hear Address On U.N.

Dr. Karl Capper-Johnson, professor of international relations and history at Lewis and Clark College, addressed the Douglas County Homemakers' Festival Thursday on the United Nations effect on world peace.

He said, "A cold war is a diplomatic contest between states, just verging on a hot war," in referring to the relationship of Russia and the United States. In connection with the British and French stand on the Suez Canal, he could see no other way a possible war could have been avoided, without the help of the U.N.

Out of the Eastern conflict comes an "Egypt to be reckoned with," he stated, and, "the world in which the U.N. exists is a new world and depends on peoples acceptance of change." He believes, "If we can discuss with people we can't agree with, we will have seen the last of the great world wars."

Earlier in the day, Dr. H. W. Schultz, head of food technology at Oregon State College, talked on standard methods of preserving foods.

Methods used are drying, salting, smoking, use of heat, cold, sugar and more recently, chemicals and antibiotics. He outlined the use of atomic rays to preserve foods in fresh form, just sterilizing them, uncooked, but they need not be refrigerated. He stated this method needs more research.

The emphasis is on added convenience for the homemaker and food technologists and manufacturers will soon produce pre-cooked dried foods.

Massachusetts Rights Wrong Of 265 Years Ago

BOSTON — The Massachusetts Legislature has righted a wrong committed 265 years ago.

The Senate passed and sent to the governor a measure to reverse the convictions of six women executed in Salem for "witchcraft" in 1692.

At first the Senate rejected the measure on grounds that Salem was a British colony at the time and it was up to the British Parliament to right the wrong.

The Senate acted in favor, however, after accepting an amendment to ban payment of damages to descendants of the women.

D'Ann Fullerton will perform a powder puff toe number for the program, held in the West Side school in Sutherlin.

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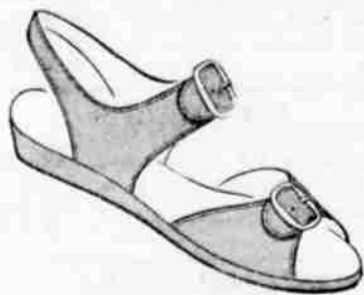
