

House Made Of Plastic Held Up By Air Pressure

NEW YORK — A house made of vinyl coated nylon fabric and held up by air pressure went on display at the International Home Exposition at New York's Coliseum Saturday.

The patented fabric is called "Fibertex" and was developed by the United States Rubber Co., which says it "is almost impossible to rip and resists punctures, flame, sunlight and weathering, oils and most acids."

Known as the "Frank Lloyd Wright Airhouse," the structure consists of two hemispheres. Both are anchored to the ground by a tube filled with sand bags extending around the base. A continuous stream of low pressure air gives the building its structural shape.

Irrving Air Chute Co. of Lexington, Ky., fabricated the house. The company said a consumer model will reach the market within two months.

Economy Minded GOP Members End Conference

Gunman Eludes Police Dragnet; Mob War Feared

NEW YORK — The gunman who shot and wounded gambler Frank Costello more than 30 hours ago still was at large Saturday despite a search by scores of detectives — and possibly other hunters.

Police have voiced concern that "friends" of Costello might get to the man before detectives do. It was possible that still a third faction was after him — his own underworld associates, angry that he had bungled the job.

The gunman, believed by police to be a professional killer, fled after the shooting Thursday night, possibly believing he had fatally wounded Costello, once known as the "boss of the racketeers."

Blood poured from Costello's head as a single pistol shot hit him from only 10 to 15 feet in the lobby of the Central Park West apartment house where Costello lives.

Actually the bullet barely grazed Costello's skull just above the left ear. Costello went to a hospital for first aid. Some police sources believed the attempt on Costello's life signaled a move by new underworld elements to take over from the "old guard" that has held sway since prohibition days.

Costello, though 65, ill, beset with court and deportation troubles, never appears to lack for funds. Besides his Central Park apartment he maintains an estate at Sands Point on Long Island. And, the cab driver who took him to the hospital said that while the fare only was 45 cents, Costello gave him a five dollar bill and told him to keep the change.

Missing Sons Of Pasha Said Back In Palace

MARRAKECH, Morocco. — The Pasha of Marrakech's five sons, who vanished in mysterious circumstances three days ago, were reported Saturday to be under heavy guard back in the palace of their late father.

Government sources have maintained complete silence since issuing a brief communique saying the five Glaoui brothers had been arrested for "antinationalist activities."

The five were reliably reported to have been kidnapped from the palace by heavily armed guerrillas of the National Liberation Army. The guerrilla force was instrumental in the fight for Morocco's liberation from French rule.

The kidnapping apparently caught the central government by surprise. Yet, 36 hours after the mysterious seizure, the government obviously sanctioned the move by accusing the five of anti-state activities.

Their father, the once powerful "Lion of the Atlas Mountains" died last year. He had been bitterly despised by Moroccan Nationalists because of his support of the French while they ruled Morocco.

Money may have been the motive for the kidnapping. It is said here the brothers were dividing their father's immense estate when they were seized.

Industrialist Dies Of Cancer

WASHINGTON — John Jay Hopkins, described as "one of the great builders" in American industry, died in a hospital last night of cancer. He was 63.

Hopkins was chairman of the board of General Dynamics Corp., one of the nation's largest industrial complexes which last year had net sales of more than one billion dollars.

Electric Boat Co., one of the divisions of General Dynamics, built the nation's first atomic submarine, the Nautilus. Hopkins himself took an interest in the project, and he actively worked to promote peacetime development of the atom.

Lewis L. Strauss, chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission, called Hopkins "one of the great builders in the history of American industry, a man of unsurpassed courage and vision."

Rep. Moss Blames Secrecy For Union Scandals Spawn

MINNEAPOLIS — Rep. Moss (D-Calif.) said Friday that "government secrecy" may well have spawned the Teamsters scandal.

Government financial reports showing loose and irregular handling of union funds have been on file for years," he said in a speech prepared for a conference of Upper Midwest News Executives.

"If union financial facts had been openly available," Moss continued, "union members would have had the public support necessary to clear up irregularities which breed in secrecy."

Moss is chairman of the House Government Information Subcommittee which has been probing official restriction of information.

Moss said the law now requires all unions to report their financial dealings to the Labor Department. But department officials, he said, "took it upon themselves" to interpret the law as meaning the reports should be kept confidential.

Federal Excise Tax Overhauled

WASHINGTON — The House Ways and Means Committee has given final approval to a major overhaul of the federal excise tax but has left the big revenue rates undisturbed.

Further action is expected later on proposals to slash rates on the principal levies, but hearings on that issue have not yet been set. The taxes now take a 10-billion-dollar bite out of the American pocketbook each year.

The overhaul bill approved by the committee Thursday is the product of nearly two years of study. It would have little effect on revenues—about 15 million dollars a year net loss to the government, according to estimates by rep. Forand (D-R.I.), who headed the study.

Nevertheless its application would have wide effect. For example, the present 10 per cent excise on radios, TV sets and phonographs would apply to tape and wire recorders.

Milk bars, patronized by the teen-age five set, would be exempted from the cabaret tax, while members of non profit community swimming pools would be exempted from the 20 per cent tax now levied on dues paid to "sporting clubs."

A major change would exempt parochial and private nonprofit schools, along with public schools, from excise taxes on such things as supplies and school buses, and on transportation and communication charges.
