Russians Said Shifting Bases For Big Warships

OSLO (AP)—Authoritative Norwegian sources said Tuesday the Soviet Union is shifting warships from the Baltic Sea because it fears the vessels could be bottled up there easily in the event of war.

The Reds also were said to feel their big Baltic naval bases might be too vulnerable to attack-bombers.

The informants, who refused to be identified, gave this summary of the Russian naval position: The Russian navy is made up of four main fleets—the Pacific, the Black Sea, the Arctic and the Baltic—with the Baltic force formerly the biggest.

Recently there have been indications that ships from the Baltic and probably the Arctic Fleets are being moved to the Pacific. The reported moves appeared based on Soviet belief that the Pacific would be the main battle area in any war with the United States and that blocking of the Danish Straits and Kattegat area between Denmark and Sweden would seal off the Baltic.

The Russians recently had 7 cruisers, 80 destroyers, 150 submarines, 200 mine sweepers, 250 motor torpedo boats and 400 auxiliary vessels in the Baltic. At least one cruiser and probably a number of other ships have been moved out. The Soviets were reported moving ships from their Arctic Fleet to the Pacific by way of the Northeast Passage, where intensive research is going on to destroy ice barriers and extend the period when sailings are possible.

Eisenhower To Seek Support For Budget

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower plans to go directly to the people in an effort to rally support for his bogged-down legislative program. But the White House said Tuesday there has been no decision yet on the manner and timing of the appeal.

Press secretary James C. Hagerty told a news conference a decision probably will be deferred until after the President confers Thursday with congressional leaders on the administration's foreign aid program. He added that he does not look for Eisenhower to make any such address this week.

Ice Harbor Job To Be Halted

PASCO, Wash. (AP)—The construction firm building Ice Harbor Dam on the Snake River said Monday work on the project will be halted Friday because federal funds for the present fiscal year have been exhausted.

H. O. Montag, president and general manager of Montag, Halvorson, Austin and Associates, said the decision to halt work was reached at a Portland meeting during the weekend.

Col. Myron E. Page Jr., Walla Walla district federal engineer, confirmed that federal funds for Ice Harbor had been exhausted. The Army Engineers have asked for an 18½ million dollar appropriation for construction during the next fiscal year but Congress has taken no action thus far. In any event, the funds would not become available until July 1.

Page said he has appealed to the chief of Army Engineers for emergency funds to keep con-

struction work going on the 155-million-dollar, multipurpose project nine miles upstream from the mouth of the Snake.

Montag said the decision to halt work on the dam would mean a layoff of some 400 workers.

Foresters Slate Tour Of Weyerhaeuser Works

A tour of the Weyerhaeuser Timber Co.'s Sutherlin and Cottage Grove operations has been scheduled for the last meeting of the Umpqua-Coquille chapter of the Society of American Foresters.

The tour will start at the camp 17 miles east of Sutherlin at 10 a.m. Saturday. The meeting also will be the last of the year for the S.A.F.
