

Sideline

A compilation of national wildlife statistics has recently been received, entitled appropriately enough, "National Survey of Hunting and Fishing."

It was mailed here by the office of the U.S. Representative from this part of the country, Charles O. Porter. It was not a political sampling; all about fish and game.

For example, the layout includes such information as the fact that 17 per cent of the population of the three Pacific Coast states, from ages 12 and above, fished last year. The sampling also shows that eight per cent on the Pacific Coast went hunting.

Strangely enough, this is below the national average and both averages are below those of most other geographical sections of the country. The Midwest area leads in fishing tabs with 25 per cent and is second in hunting with 17 per cent.

The Rocky Mountain country is one-two the other way around, leading in hunting with 18 per cent and second in fishing with 25.

Little has been spared in com-

paring the survey. It includes breakdowns by population, city and town, by age groups, to determine the fishing and hunting effort. Also it includes such statistics as the number of days spent and the amount of money spent in various phases of the wildlife.

The book says that \$2,850,979.900 was spent for fishing and hunting in 1955 in the nation, including most of the items purchasable in outdoor stores, food and automobile expense, etc.

Information from the Oregon State Game Commission shows that \$19,763 individual sales for fishing and hunting licenses were made in 1955. Resident hunters totaled 167,868 of this number and resident anglers 171,363.

Deer tag sales totaled around 243,000 regular and special tags with a harvest of 125,800 deer taken by some 233,842 hunters in the 1955 season.

The deer-kill was 8,267 fewer than the record kill of 134,087 in 1935.

The 1956 over-all total shows a kill of 77,408 buck deer and 51,392 antlerless animals taken during the general and controlled hunts.

Archery took 129 deer, of which 35 were bucks.

Klamath County was again the leader in total take with 10,227 reported. Grants County had 10,160, Lane 9,845 and Lake 9,120. Multnomah was low with 90 deer taken by 426 hunters.

Closer to home, Douglas County ranked eighth in total number of hunters with 9,066 and was 14th in total kill with 3,474—all of them bucks. This figures to a 38.3 percentage of hunters successful and 0.7 deer harvest per square mile.

The leader in total number of hunters, incidentally, was Deschutes with 16,369. Baker County was first in success with 71 per cent.

A study of elk-deer forest damage is now underway by the state's game department. The study is being made in conjunction with the State Board of Forestry and private timber operators, sportsmen's groups and other agencies are taking part at invitation.

Ground forage on cut and burned-over timberlands are favorite haunts of elk and deer alike.

Spring Chinook Fish Movement

Above Average At Winchester

Fish migrations over the Game Commission counting board at the Winchester dam in the North Umpqua River picked up tempo during the last half of April. Bill Pitney, field agent, reporting from the commission's regional office at Roseburg, said that spring chinook movement during the last two weeks of the month was above average and that the total for the

date of April 30 is second highest of record.

Slow movement had been reported for the first two weeks of the month because of unfavorable temperature and water conditions.

The total number of steelhead recorded is above average but has not reached the highs of some previous years.
