The Angels will go with Ron Neasey, who has one win against two losses for the season. Briggs' record is 1-1.

Angel rookie Dick Hanlin collected his third straight victory

by holding the Beavers scoreless in all innings but the fifth. Frank Carswell singled and shortstop Jack Littrell followed with a homer for Portland's only tallies.

The Angels had iced the game with three runs before then, one in the fourth and two in the top of the fifth when Bob Jenkins doubled after George Anderson had doubled, Jim Baxes had singled and Steve Bilko had walked to fill the bases.

San Diego's Padres jumped off to a two-run margin in the first inning against Seattle, adding the winning counter in the third and nipping a ninth frame Rainier rally.

## Khrushchev Calls For Big Changes In Russ Economy

MOSCOW — Nikita Khrushchev told a special session of the Supreme Soviet Tuesday his proposed sweeping economic reorganization plan must be put into effect "in the interest of further development of the economy."

The Communist Party boss told the legislators his plan would mean a "transfer of the center of gravity" in the Soviet Union to territorial and local management.

Khrushchev announced the abolition of over 20 industrial ministries and consolidation of several others.

He called for sweeping cuts in the Soviet Union's army of administrators and bureaucrats. Many of these will be moved from Moscow to the more sparsely populated areas of the growing industrial towns in the outer regions.

"We have so many supervisors checking on the output of neckties that the quality of our neckties is still pretty inferior," Khrushchev said.

He proposed the creation of 92 regional economic councils to run the economy. Of these, 68 will be in the Russian Republic, 11 in the Ukraine and one in each of the other 13 constituent republics making up the U. S. S. R.

**Committee Would Study Fish, Game Problems**

WASHINGTON — The House Postoffice and Civil Service Committee Tuesday voted in favor of raising the postal rate on first class, or letter mail, from 3 cents to 4 cents.

The action approved a section of a bill calling for general increases in postal rates. There was no final action on the bill.

The committee will meet again Wednesday to consider proposed increases on second class mail which includes magazines and newspapers.

In addition to hiking letter mail to 4 cents, the section approved by the committee would boost the mailing charge for post cards from 2 cents to 3 cents, of air mail letters from 6 cents to 7 cents, and of air mail cards from 4 cents to 5 cents.

## Small Flooding Now Predicted

PORTLAND — The Weather Bureau River Forecast Center said Tuesday only small flooding would result this spring from the about average runoff in the Columbia River.

Hydrologist Anthony Polos said the river should reach a peak of from 18 to 22 feet in the Portland-Vancouver, Wash., area. The estimate is virtually unchanged from that made a month earlier.

Water at that level probably would flood only pasture land.

The May report issued by Polos said dikes would protect Bonners Ferry, Idaho, where the Kootenai River is expected to crest at from 30 to 34 feet.

Polos said the Northern part of the Columbia Basin received less than normal precipitation in April, but added it already had ample water.

The water-shy southern portion of the basin got above average rain, he said.

**Superior Court Hearing On Union Probe Delayed**

SPOKANE — A Supreme Court hearing on the "revolt" within the Spokane local of the Teamsters union was ordered delayed Monday until May 20 at the request of attorneys for incumbent officers.

Samuel B. Bassett of Seattle, an attorney for the officers, said he has been subpoenaed to appear before the Senate committee on racketeering in labor and industry in Washington and would be unable to be here May 9.

That was the date set by incumbent officers to show cause why they should not be restrained from carrying on business of the local and why a rival slate of officers should not be recognized.

Last night, for the third game in succession, Tebbetts found a pitcher who could go nine innings. As a result the Redlegs have an eight-game winning streak, long-

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est in the majors.

Hal Jeffcoat triumphed 9-2 over Brooklyn, putting Cincinnati half a game behind the second-place Dodgers.

The National League - leading Milwaukee Braves dropped an 8-4 decision to the Philadelphia Phillies as Robin Roberts stopped them with six hits. The New York Giants whipped the St. Louis Cardinals 8-5 and the Chicago Cubs took a 14-inning, 10-8 decision from Pittsburgh.

The Cleveland Indians nipped New York 2-1 to snap the Yankees' six-game winning streak but lost the services of Herb Score for an indefinite period. The prize soupbaw was struck in the right eye by a hard-hit liner off the bat of Gil McDougald in the first inning.

The Yankees retained their half-game, first-place lead over the Chicago White Sox, who were beaten by the Boston Red Sox 4-3. Ted Williams drove in three runs with a single and his sixth home run.

Kansas City beat Baltimore 3-2 in 10 innings. Vic Power hit home runs on the first and last pitches of the Orioles' Hector Brown.

Detroit spoiled Cookie Lavagetto's managerial debut with Washington, defeating the Senators 5-3 behind the three-hit pitching of Paul Foytack.

## National Amateur Golfing Champ Finds Bizarre Spot

NEW YORK — Harvie Ward Jr., national amateur golf champion the past two years, Wednesday found himself in a bizarre situation over his expenses.

He could be declared a non-amateur, but reinstated immediately.

Here is his situation: His San Francisco employer, Edward E. Lowery, said he testified before a grand jury investigating his income tax returns, that he paid Ward's expenses to the U.S. and Canadian amateur championships in 1954.

A U.S. Golf Assn. official said if reports of Lowery's statements to the grand jury are accurate, Ward "appears" to have broken the rule which forbids an employer from paying an employee's expenses to a tournament.

The rule states that a golfer penalized for breaking this rule must undergo two years' probation after which he is eligible for reinstatement. The punishment "kicks" from the time of the infraction. In this case 1954. More than two years' already have passed.

Therefore, if Ward is found guilty, he could be reinstated immediately.

Ward, for his part, denied ac-

cepting expense money from Lowery.

"I borrowed \$11,000," he said. "But it was strictly a loan. I have paid some of it back. I don't think I've breached the amateur code and I don't think I have a lot to worry about."
