

Two Attorneys Say Grand Juries' Investigating Plan Meets With Their Approval

SALEM — Two attorneys in the Multnomah County vice investigation told the Senate Judiciary Committee Wednesday night that Oregon's laws relating to grand juries don't need any revision. They were K. C. Tanner, counsel for Multnomah County District Attorney William Langley, convicted of failing to prosecute gamblers, and Charles E. Raymond, who said he represented several persons indicted by the grand jury. Only two other witnesses appeared at the committee's second hearing on bills proposing changes in grand jury procedures. They were Dist. Atty. Eugene Venn of Lane County and James Burns, Portland attorney and former Harney County district attorney.

Tanner characterized the Multnomah County grand jury report, which is being reviewed by Atty. Gen. Robert V. Thornton's handling of the vice probe, as a "curiosity."

He told the committee, "no grand jury has the right to function as an inquisitorial body."

Tanner said accusation of a crime was made against Thornton in the grand jury report, and he criticized the jury for failure to indict the attorney general in view of that.

He said he doubted that the last batch of indictments returned by the recently dismissed grand jury were valid and predicted those cases would have to be resubmitted to a new jury.

"The taxpayers are getting an awful beating," he said. "But we lawyers never had it so good."

Raymond said the grand jury's

final report was a "little out of bounds."

Raymond, former Multnomah County deputy district attorney, said the governor should be given power to appoint special prosecutors "if the attorney general hasn't the ability or means to do this job himself."

Venn offered two suggestions which he said would clarify the "ambiguous" grand jury laws.

They would give a prosecutor or an accused person the right to challenge a grand jury panel, and provide that evidence submitted to a grand jury should show conclusively a "probable cause" to indict.

Venn also recommended legislation that would permit only the names of witnesses who testified against an accused to appear on an indictment.

"A grand jury ought to be concerned with the guilt or innocence of a person, not whether the prosecutor will win or lose his case," Venn said.

Lumbermen, IWA Break Off Talks; No Wage Hike Seen

PORTLAND — Negotiations broke off Wednesday between lumber employers of the Pacific Northwest and the International Woodworkers of America.

An employer spokesman said that for the second consecutive year the employers could not afford a wage increase.

The present contract is to expire June 1. The employer spokesman said negotiations could resume before then if either party moves for it.

Union negotiators declined immediate comment. They said they might make a statement Friday, after conferring with their officials.

The union represents some 35,000 workers in the region.

They are under a two-year contract, which was opened last year for wage negotiations. No increase was granted, employers blaming a depressed lumber market. The same reason was advanced this time.

"Production has dropped 10 per cent in the first three months of 1957, and all segments of the lumber industry are depressed. Mill inventories were up 165,000,000 board feet at the end of March. We can find no way of assuring ourselves that the 1957 picture is going to be as good as 1956, let alone good enough to take on the wage increase," said L. Ted Thomas, employers' spokesman.

He said the union had asked what amounted to a 30-cent hourly package, including 15 cents for wages, plus an employer-paid pension plan and a three week vacation of employees with five years' seniority.

Mother Claims Run-Away Child

A little girl — her name still isn't known by police — Wednesday was claimed by her mother after she wandered away from home and was found standing in the middle of Stephens Street near the Airport Inn.

Leon Mulkey, Roseburg, told the sheriff's office he found the girl about 3 p.m. and delivered her to the Frank Morris home, 2241 NE Stephens because he knew Mrs. Morris did baby-sitting. He said he thought she wandered away from the Morris home.

So the lot — she was about 2 years old with blonde hair and "big, blue eyes" — was a guest in the Morris home for about an hour until the mother apparently heard a radio appeal for her to claim her infant.

Morris, who said he and his wife have "raised 10 of our own," related that the woman came to his house about 4 p.m. to get the girl.

"She didn't even give her name or say 'thank you,'" he said.

25 Homes Burned In New England

A forest fire near historic Plymouth, Mass., one of many such fires in the tinder-dry North-east, was reported raging out of control Thursday. Twenty-five summer cottages were destroyed at Lond Pond where the fire broke out Wednesday.

Gov. Foster Furcolo boarded a National Guard plane for a first-hand inspection of the flaming area in the Myles Standish State Forest. Afterward he issued an urgent appeal for additional volunteers.

There were 175 fire company units on hand and an appeal went out for an additional 50 to 100. Upward of 3,000 men were battling the flames.

One hundred families were ordered to evacuate their homes in Manomet, as a precaution.

Major forest fires in northern Ontario abated slightly after a rainfall but fires still were being battled in other parts of the province. Prior to the rain, fires in the Sudbury area destroyed 20 houses and left 88 persons homeless.

In Michigan, fire fighters kept an anxious eye on the state's tinder-dry sections after a winning fight over one of the worst timber blazes in years.

During the month long dry spell in New York state, 30 forest fires blackened almost 8,000 acres of woodland.

Stepovich Said Choice For Alaska Governor

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower Thursday nominated Michael Stepovich of Fairbanks to be governor of Alaska.

At the same time the President appointed Waino Hendrickson for a new term as secretary of the territory.

Stepovich, a 38-year-old Republican, now is a member of the Alaska Territorial Senate. He was named to succeed B. Frank Heinzelman, who resigned as governor early this year.

President Scales Down Foreign Aid Budget Proposal

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower scaled down his foreign aid program Thursday to \$3,880,000,000 and said further cuts would be a serious threat to world peace.

Senate Democratic leader Johnson of Texas said after a White House discussion of the program that the administration was asking for "sort of an international F.W.A." — a reference to the public works spending of early New Deal days.

The administration's formal decision to cut back its original request for \$4,400,000,000 was announced after Eisenhower had conferred for about 90 minutes with congressional leaders of both parties.

James C. Hagerty, White House press secretary, said after the session that Eisenhower told the leaders that without the money for loans of 500 million dollars during the 12 months beginning July 1, and then 750 million each in the following two fiscal years for foreign economic development.

"That would be two billion dollars for sort of an international F.W.A.," he said.

The revised foreign aid request was said to contemplate \$2,800,000,000 for arms assistance and \$1,080,000,000 for economic aid.

In advance of the White House discussion, Johnson had said the Democrats would support the program with the administration's foreign aid program.

Johnson said what he regards as an international Public Works Administration (PWA) would be authorized for loans of 500 million dollars during the 12 months beginning July 1, and then 750 million each in the following two fiscal years for foreign economic development.

"That would be two billion dollars for sort of an international F.W.A.," he said.

The revised foreign aid request was said to contemplate \$2,800,000,000 for arms assistance and \$1,080,000,000 for economic aid.

K.L.L. Distributing Co.—and keeping a finger in its business.

This information came from John L. Wilson of St. Louis, executive vice president of Anheuser-Busch, who said it was "apparent" his company gave favored treatment to Beck's son as the part owner of one of its beer distributorships.

The letters and memos taken from Anheuser-Busch files had repeated references to Dave Beck Sr., "riding" Irving J. Levine, a major owner of the K & L distributorship. Levine testified Wednesday that he since has bought out the interest of Dave Jr.

The memos told of efforts to get Dave Beck Jr. out of active participation in the business and of a final agreement that "Junior was not to go near the business" unless asked to do so by a company official.

One, written by Jay R. Rideout, an Anheuser-Busch official to John Flanagan, another company official, suggested that "you be well acquainted with His Majesty, the Wheel."

Dwight D. Ingamells, an attorney for the brewery, said at one point that the only inference he could draw was that the "beer distributorship because of the influence of his father."

Chairman McClellan (D-Ark) said it appeared to him that in later difficulties the brewery had apparently been "afraid" to exercise a contractual right to cut out the distributorship held by the K & L Distributing Co.

With Wilson in the witness chair, it was brought out that Anheuser-Busch offered in 1952 to buy K & L's Tacoma branch for \$80,000.
