

## Russia Again Calls For End To Atomic Tests

MOSCOW (U.P.)—The Supreme Soviet Friday called on the United States Congress and the British Parliament to work for immediate termination of nuclear weapons tests.

The Russian equivalent of a Parliament proposed establishment of a three-power parliamentary commission to exchange opinions and try to work out the best way to ban tests of hydrogen and atomic bombs.

As is usual in the Russian Parliament, the legislators adopted the resolution without a murmur after hearing Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko declare the Soviet Union would continue producing atomic and hydrogen bombs and guided missiles until the Western powers agree to discontinue their tests.

It was Gromyko's maiden speech in the Supreme Soviet as foreign minister.

"The United States and Britain would not object if the Soviet Union took the unilateral decision to stop tests," he said. "That is a little too much. That is impossible because it would jeopardize the security of the Soviet Union and increase the danger of atomic war. We want fair play."

Gromyko said it was premature to draw any conclusions about the outcome of disarmament talks in London, and that Russia was compelled to go on producing atomic weapons "because of the aggressive circles of certain countries."

The disciplined deputies also unanimously approved Communist Party chief Khrushchev's plan to decentralize the vast Soviet industrial administrative machine.

With the account of Beck and widow Leheny, the committee recessed its hearings for luncheon.

The story, as told by Hedlund, was that the Teamsters Union advanced the money to buy \$71,000 worth of mortgages. They were held by Beck and Hedlund for 10 months during which the mortgages were retired by about \$10,000 worth. They then were sold to the Leheny Memorial Fund for some \$71,000.

Hedlund said he and Beck realized a profit of some \$11,583.04 on the deal.

Kennedy did not develop as to just how—whether by discounts or other factors—the profit to Beck and Hedlund was run up to a total of \$11,583.04.

## Library Board Discusses How To Trim Budget

How to trim the proposed Douglas County Library budget without seriously jeopardizing service was the matter which occupied the library board at its regular meeting this week.

A proposed budget of \$107,412.82 was recently presented to the county court.

At that time, Library Board Chairman Gordon Carlson was advised that the budget would have to be trimmed because receipts of funds for county expenditure were expected to be smaller in the 1957-58 fiscal year.

Circulation figures compiled show that for the month of April a total of 10,975 books had been borrowed from the bookmobile—the largest monthly circulation since the unit was installed a year ago.

The Myrtle Creek Public Library lent 1,400 for the month, the largest number from any of the community libraries.

Also noted was a big increase in services of the Yoncalla Community Library, which totaled 1,146 books for the month, ranking it second among the small libraries.

The Yoncalla Woman's Club recently voted to donate its \$100 U.S. Savings Bond to the library.

For the entire county, circulation in April was 21,370 books.

On May 2, Mrs. Jack Randall of Drann, library board member, was the county's representative at the second annual Institute for Library Trustees and Citizens held in Portland.

County Librarian Carol Trimble and other staff members attended the Oregon Library Assn.'s meeting held simultaneously in Portland.

The Senate also sent to the governor a bill to provide safety regulations for boats under 26 feet long. Larger boats are regulated by the Coast Guard.

The Senate sent to the House a bill that would let the state Board of Control close either the Eastern Oregon Tuberculosis Hospital at The Dalles or the University Tuberculosis Hospital at Portland, or use them for some other purpose. The measure would be referred to the people.

Hemphill's talk will be given during an afternoon session. During the morning, school principals will present a program on custodial instruction and talk on pupil-teacher relations. There will be a potluck lunch at noon.

## Central Oregon Area Returning To Normal

MADRAS (U.P.)—A Central Oregon area north of here is returning to normal after being struck by a flash flood Tuesday.

Highway 97 was closed in two places by the sudden rush of water, which cut and bridge and clogged another spot with debris. Also washed out was the rail line four miles north of Gateway in the Deschutes Gorge.

Four cows on the Tumalo Canyon ranch were killed by lightning that accompanied the storm, and two cars were swept off the highway.

## George Fiedler Rites Scheduled For Monday

Officiating will be the Rev. Ellisworth Tilton of the First Methodist Church. Concluding services and vault interment will follow in Roseburg Memorial Gardens.

Fiedler, a 45-year-old resident of Tenmile, died Wednesday in a local hospital. He had been injured while working Tuesday morning in an accident at the Paul B. Hult Lumber Co. at Dillard.

He was born at Boise, Idaho, April 4, 1912 and moved to Portland and his parents when he was four years of age. He came to Roseburg about 10 years ago and for the last two years had made his home at Tenmile. He was a member of the Lumber and Sawmill Workers, Local 2949, AFL.

Surviving are his wife, Shirley C. three children, Chrystal Ann Claypool and Sheri Jean Claypool, and Robert Louis Fiedler, all of Tenmile; his mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Fiedler, a brother, Willard K. Fiedler, and a sister, Mrs. Dorothy A. Farmer, all of Portland.

The left front tire on a car driven by Troy Dio Jones, Myrtle Creek, apparently blew out, sending the car across the center line of Winston Section Road and into a tank trailer being pulled behind a truck driven by Clarence Wayne Carroll, Portland. The truck and trailer were registered to Pacific Cooperative Supply, Walla Walla, Wash.

Two passengers were in the Jones car, which was heavily damaged.

The downed crewmen were "all uninjured and in good condition," the submarine radioed.

## Yoncalla Approves Union High Budget

Yoncalla citizens approved by a 61-26 vote \$23,244 outside the 6 per cent limitation for the union high school district at an election Thursday.

Budget expenditures set by the Yoncalla district total \$101,514. The \$23,244 figure is the amount outside the rural budget and has to be raised on a local level.

The amount necessary to balance the budget over and above the estimated receipts is \$68,906. The budget just voted on, which covers the year of July 1957 to June 30, 1958, is five mills under last year's budget. "The decrease is due to the fact that the district retired a serial and a special levy," Wayne C. Flynn, principal said.

## Colombian President Resigns Under Protest

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The armed forces continue in command of the country.

He announced a junta composed of Maj. Gen. Gabriel Paris, Maj. Gen. Deogracias Fonseca, Rear Adm. Ruben Piedrahita, Maj. Gen. Rafael Naves Pardo, and Brig. Gen. Luis A. Ordonez.

Rojas said this junta would have "the mission of calling popular elections."

Thousands of deliriously joyful people swarmed into the streets of this capital high in the Andes shouting demands for a civilian as president.

"Liberty!" they cried. From Cali, southwest of Bogota, correspondents were permitted by censor to report for the first time Friday that an estimated 100 persons were killed and more than 200 injured there during a week-long series of anti-government riots. Earlier, a government spokesman had announced 11 persons killed throughout the country in these demonstrations, where students have been in the forefront.

Censorship was relaxed soon after Rojas relinquished power. The president's abdication signalled the end of a general strike which had paralyzed Cali for five days.

Just two days ago Rojas had maneuvered himself into a second term as president, due to start next year. This action crystallized the opposition to the former chief of Colombia's army.

Only a few hours before Rojas fell, his government had threatened criminal action to crush a series of business strikes paralyzing Colombia's major cities.

dous. It would set sustained yield back for a generation."

Hansell, saying that the quarrel over the jet district bill prompted him to introduce the new measure, said his bill would "equalize school opportunities in counties getting O & C funds."

He denied "that this is a raid on O & C money, because not a dollar of it would leave the counties. However, certain basic school money wouldn't go to those counties."

Sever denied it would result in equalization. The bill, he said, would result in an increase in the Douglas County school levy from \$10 per year per child to \$70, while in Multnomah County it would go up only from \$10 to \$11.

"That would be complete inequality," he said.

County Judge Raymond Lathrop of Josephine County said his county is spending one million dollars a year on roads, but that the Hansell-Goad bill would force the county to abandon this road program.

He said that residents of Josephine County already are paying high taxes, despite the O & C money.
