Legislature Hopes To End Lengthy Session Saturday

SALEM — The Oregon Legislature, hoping to wind up its longest session in history by next Saturday, still hasn't solved its two main problems—taxes and schools.

As to the Saturday adjournment, there is a strong possibility that the session will run longer than that.

Here is the way major legislation shapes up:

Tax program: The House has voted for the four-bill package to increase personal, corporate and inheritance taxes. It looks as though the Senate will vote for the corporation bill early next week, but the fate of the personal income tax measure is in doubt. The inheritance tax boost appears to be dead.

Basic school fund increase: This matter is in the Joint Ways and Means Committee, which is waiting to see what happens to the tax program. A subcommittee has voted a 10 million dollar increase in the basic school fund to the 40 million dollars asked by Gov. Holmes.

Key District bill to redistribute basic school funds: Both houses have passed it in different forms, and it's in conference committee. It looks as though the House version, which minimizes the effect on Portland and Eastern Oregon, will be the basis for settlement.

School building aid: A Ways and

Means Subcommittee has recommended a 5 million dollar appropriation to construct school buildings in districts which have reached their bonding limit. No action has been taken by the Ways and Means Committee.

School district reorganization: Passed by the House, and the Senate Education Committee, making many changes, has approved the bill.

Creating office of lieutenant governor: Passed by the House, but no action in the Senate.

Abolishing state boards: The Senate Agriculture Committee has voted to abolish the Fair Commission and transfer the fair to the Agriculture Department. The bill to abolish the Board of Control was passed this week by the House, but the Senate might kill it.

Building program of 20 million dollars: A subcommittee cut this to 12 millions, and both houses will vote on it next week. It allows 7 millions for higher education and 5 millions for state institutions.

Unemployment compensation benefits increase: No action in either house, but employers and labor are coming up with a compromise plan.

Industrial accident benefits increase of 20 per cent: Passed by the House, but no action in the Senate.

Creating state development department: Approved by the House and now in the Senate.

Providing authority over railroad passenger service reductions: Approved by both houses.

Major election reform bill: Passed by the House, now in the Senate.

Bonds to construct Coast Highway in Curry County: Approved by both houses.

Mediator Calls IWA, Employer Negotiations

PORTLAND — Federal Mediator George Walker said Friday he has called on the International Woodworkers of America and six major employer groups to meet with him next Wednesday.

Both have accepted, he said, and an effort will be made to get them together on contract terms.

At the break-up of a meeting of the same negotiators Wednesday, an employer spokesman said the business outlook is not good enough for the industry to "take on an added burden in wage increases."

The spokesman, L. Ted Thomas, said the IWA had asked a 15-cent an hour cash increase, plus other benefits from these employer groups, with some 35,000 employees: Columbia Basin Loggers, Columbia Basin Sawmills, Lumbermen's Industrial Relations Committee, Willamette Valley Lumber Operators, Timber Operators Assn. of Aberdeen, and the Plywood and Door Manufacturers Industrial Committee.

Last year, wage negotiations were gotten out of the way early. A January agreement in 1956, retroactive to Dec. 1, 1955 and extending to this spring, gave the IWA a 4 1/2 per cent increase.

The Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union, which also is re-opening its contract this spring, similarly had its last general pay boost Dec. 1, 1955, in the early settlement of talks which had been scheduled for some months later. The LSWU settlement then was described as 5 to 15 cents an hour, averaging 8 1/2 cents.
