Space Flight May Eliminate War On Earth

DENVER (AP) — Space flight may be the thing which will eliminate war on earth, particularly if a threat of some extra-terrestrial enemy should develop, says a Navy commander who has worked on space projects.

The idea was advanced by Cmdr. George W. Hoover of the Office of Naval Research during a space travel symposium which concluded the Aero Medical Assn.'s 28th annual meeting Wednesday.

Hoover said the world might forget differences to join against any threat from outer space.

Launching of the earth satellite, he said, will open up a new era and space travel "will no longer be science fiction."

"Eventually we will build one big enough to put a man in," Hoover predicted, saying the time depends upon the strength of public opinion for money to support the research.

Mars was termed the planet most likely for man to land upon by Dr. Hubertus Strughold, chief of the Department of Space Medicine at the School of Aviation Medicine at Randolph Air Force Base, Tex.

Negro Singer Given Support

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — Eight Texas lawmakers and calypso singer Harry Belafonte Friday voiced support for the 19-year-old coed who removed from an under-the-ground opera production at the University of Texas because she is a Negro.

The coed, Barbara Louise Smith of Pittsburg, Tex., has said she would attend Friday night's or Saturday's performance of the opera "Dido and Aeneas," from which she was removed by the university administration after some legislators complained.

Belafonte's press agent said Belafonte Foundation Inc. offered to aid Miss Smith to continue her education at Texas or elsewhere.

The lawmakers signing a letter to the coed have fought the segregation-bill bills in the capitol. They were Reps. Maurice Pipkin, Menton Murray, Malcolm McGregor, W. M. Woolsey, Bob Wheeler, Oscar Latorre, Bob Mullen and Eligio de la Garza.

"You are to be highly commended on 'keeping your head' when others about you are losing theirs, and on accepting the decision of the university at such a high personal sacrifice to yourself," the letter said.

Public Power Attorneys Ask Decision Review

WASHINGTON (AP) — Attorneys for public power groups Thursday petitioned the Supreme Court for a review of the Hells Canyon Dam case because of a recent federal tax ruling in behalf of the Idaho Power Co.

In a supplement to a petition for a rehearing of their request for a Supreme Court review of the legality of Idaho Power's construction license for dams on the Snake River, attorneys Evelyn Cooper and Lucien Hilmer said the tax ruling "constitutes a separate and distinct basis" for the review.

The Office of Defense Mobilization recently granted two accelerated amortization certificates for Idaho Power in connection with Brownlee and Oxbow Dams. The certificates would permit the company to make larger than normal tax deductions as depreciation during the first five years and smaller than normal deductions in later years.

Idaho Power has been granted a Federal Power Commission license to construct three dams in the Hells Canyon reach of the Snake, including Oxbow and Brownlee.

Bill Removes Thornton's Right To Name Attorneys

SALEM (AP) — The Senate passed and sent to the House Saturday a bill to remove Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton's right to name the attorneys for the state Highway Commission. The vote was 21-8.

Sponsors argued that the Highway Commission should have the right to pick its own lawyers.

Several weeks ago, the Senate approved a bill to permit time to state agencies, including the Highway Commission, to name their lawyers.

The present law provides that the attorney general shall appoint attorneys for all state agencies.

The latter bill, the Senate was told, has been killed by the House Judiciary Committee.

Morse Charges Administration With Practicing 'Hypocrisy'

WYNE MORSE (D-Ore.) accused the administration Saturday of plundering the West and handing the public's resources over to monopoly. He cited Hells Canyon as an example.

"The hypocrisy of this administration's program staggers the imagination," Morse said in a speech to the Western States Water and Power Conference.

"It is so crass that many have not been able to believe it. The crusade has been a vast glittering generality distracting the public while their pockets are picked. And the people are wise to it. The west is being plundered, the public's resources handed over to monopoly."

The Oregon senator said a bill pending in the Senate authorizing construction of a federal dam in the Hells Canyon reach of the Snake River, between Idaho and Oregon "probably will be the last chance to save this damsite for full development in the public interest."

"If Hells Canyon is lost to profit plunder," Morse said, "it will be a blow not only to my region, but at every place where the same issue exists."

"It is time," he said, "for the American people to demand of their government that it place the welfare of our boys and girls of the future ahead of the private profiteering interest of monopolies such as the Idaho Power Co., the Utah Power and Light Co. and other private utility monopolies which would place their profit interests above the public interest."

Morse told of his support for the 800-million-dollar Upper Colorado River storage project and asked: "Why should far less be denied for a superlative project like Hells Canyon Dam which is a more economic project?"

"If federal dams are good for Utah, Colorado and Arizona, why are they socialism — creeping, galloping or static — in Idaho, Oregon and Washington?"

But Sen. Arthur W. Watkins (R-Ill.), who addressed the conference earlier Saturday, said his opposition to the federal Hells Canyon Dam is compatible with his support of the Upper Colorado project. He said it didn't make sense to him to replace private dams being constructed at Hells Canyon with a federal one.

Idaho Power Co. has authorization from the Federal Power Commission to build three dams at Hells Canyon and two of its dams are under construction. The FPC decision was upheld by the Supreme Court.

Judge To Hear 'Rebel' Leaders' Control Demand

SPOKANE (AP) — A visiting judge will preside here May 20 at a Superior Court hearing on whether "rebel" leaders should gain control of Teamsters Local 650.

Superior Judge Hugh H. Evans said Wednesday that Judge Joseph Wickham Okanogan, who will preside when "regular" officers of the local appear to show cause why the rebels should not be recognized.

Dissident Teamsters here won temporary restraining orders last month against incumbent officers. Judge Evans appointed a bank as temporary custodian of the local's books and records until the dispute is settled.

His temporary order restrains the officers from concealing any records or removing them outside the jurisdiction of the Spokane County court.

Meanwhile, the regular officers also went to court. Their attorneys asked Wednesday that the restraining orders be dissolved, contending the restraining complaint was not duly verified and that the court has no jurisdiction in the dispute.

About 200 members of the union held their own meeting last month, elected temporary officers and called for an investigation of the incumbents, including A. J. Ruhl, veteran secretary-treasurer of the local.

Ruhl testified at a Senate committee hearing in Washington that he loaned union money to gambler and racketeer Charles "Doc" Barker and that with the approval of Frank Brewster, chairman of the Western Conference of Teamsters.

Diem Says Reds Can Be Stopped In SW Asia

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Ngo Dinh Diem of South Vietnam said Friday that with the aid of neighboring countries, communism in all of Southeast Asia can be stopped.

In a speech prepared for a National Press Club luncheon, he said Vietnam is also concerned about the problems of internal subversion.

"Their efforts combined with ours can stem international communism of which Red China is the active leader in all of Southeast Asia," he declared.

Diem apparently was referring to the neutral states of Cambodia, Laos and Burma, and to Thailand, which is a member of the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization (SEATO).

Diem's speech followed conferences presided by a waffle supper and Wilson and Deputy Secretary Donald Quarles on the possibility of military support against subversion.

As long as communism has not renounced world revolution, we cannot let ourselves be lulled by the siren song of peaceful co-existence," Diem said. "This is especially true since competitive co-existence has replaced peaceful co-existence as the war cry of the Communists."

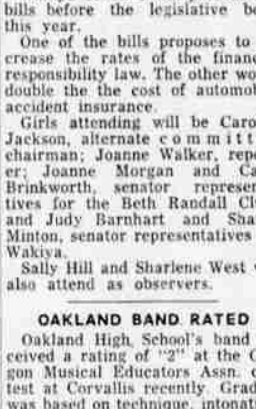
Six Glide High Girls Attend Hillsboro Meet
