Bulldogs Tip Glendale, 5-3

Eagle Point, with triple winner Jack Greb leading the way, nabbed first place in the District 6-A-2 track and field meet held in Ashland Saturday with a total of 91 points outscoring second place Myrtle Creek with 86 and third place Douglas with 81.

Behind in fourth place was Phoenix with 50, Sutherland with 41, Glendale 27, Illinois Valley 26, Brookings 18, Henley nine and Oakland three.

Viks Qualify Four
Eagle Point and Myrtle Creek each placed four men in the state meet to be held in Corvallis Saturday. Myrtle Creek had four men in six events and Eagle Point four men in seven events. Douglas's placed third in qualifiers with three men in four events and a relay team. Myrtle Creek also placed a relay team.

In fourth place in the number of qualifiers were Sutherland, Glendale and Phoenix with two men in two events. Brookings and Illinois Valley each have one man in one event.

Top winner for the day was Greb with firsts in the 100 and 200 yard dashes and a tie for first in the high jump. The only other double winners were Cliff Thompson of Douglas in the 880 and mile runs and Wayne Bartley in the high and low hurdles.

This possibly should be Luis Marquez day in Portland.

The powerful outfielder belted the Beavers to their third straight Pacific Coast League victory over Los Angeles 3-1 before they lost the nightcap of a Sunday doubleheader, 7-2.

Marquez homered and singled, driving in all three Beaver runs in the first game triumph. A grand slam homer by the sturdy Marquez, who hit .344 for Portland last year, started a rally Friday that produced the first of Portland's three victories and pulled the Beavers out of the PCL basement.

The losses dropped the Angels, who open a series Tuesday with third-place San Francisco, to second place, one-half game behind Hollywood. The Stars shut out Sacramento, 3-0 and 2-0, and dumped the Solons into the cellar.

Vancouver pitcher Mel Field was hit on the left knee by a line drive from the bat of San Francisco's Bert Thielen and sent to the hospital. San Francisco went on to win, 6-2. The Seals also led, 4-2, in a second game, which was called because of the curfew and will be continued in August.

Seattle's Rainiers dropped a notch to fifth place as they split with San Diego — the Padres winning the first, 3-2, and then losing 4-1.

Red Adams started Los Angeles' six-run nightcap scoring spree in the fifth when he doubled home Bill Caro. Bob Jenkins singled across two other runs, Gale Wade singled in one more, still another scored on an error and Herb Olson got a sixth with a sacrifice fly. Jack Littrell drove in Portland's two runs with a single in the first and a home run in the sixth.

Curt Raydon pitched two-hit ball for Hollywood's first victory. In the second, R. C. Stevens' smash homer over the left field fence gave the Stars the two runs as Bernie Daniels spaced the six hits he allowed the Solons.

Earl Averill's two-run homer and Steve Locklin's single scored the Padres' winning runs in the first clash. Locklin didn't connect safely in the nightcap, ending a streak of safe hits in 17 consecutive games.

Seattle broke a fifth inning nightcap tie when pitcher Charlie Rabe, who hurled a one-hitter, singled. He went to second on a balk by Padre hurler Gene Lary and scored on Maury Wills' ground single to center. The final Seattle tallies came on Bill Glynn's first homer of the season, two singles and a walk.

Steve Bilko, the slugging Los Angeles first baseman, may be out of the lineup indefinitely. He injured his shoulder muscles in the first game against Portland when he swung hard in popping up a fly in the ninth inning.
