

Ouster Of Beck Said Asked By Teamster Union Heads

WASHINGTON — The Teamsters Union's public relations advisers were reported Tuesday to have recommended ouster of the union president, Dave Beck. The recommendations were before a union committee in session Tuesday.

Tony Smith, head of the union's news bureau, said his public relations firm, Allied Public Relations Associates, has submitted a report to the union which "makes specific recommendations of what we feel is best for the union from a public relations standpoint."

Smith would not give details. But the report was understood to include a recommendation that Beck's fellow Teamsters officials make a solid demand that Beck quit the helm of the 1½-million member Teamsters organization.

Beck's present five-year term as Teamsters president ends later this year. He has said he will be a candidate for re-election.

The public relations recommendations were being considered by a special five-man committee of the Teamsters General Executive Board. The committee was named

Delay In Trial Of Mayor Schunk Said Probable

PORTLAND — There may be a delay before the trial of the next principal in the Portland vice investigation comes up.

The next trial is scheduled to be that of Mayor Terry Schunk on a charge of lying when he denied that he had accepted a \$500 bribe from a gambler. It is scheduled for May 22.

His attorney, Edwin D. Hicks, indicated in state circuit court Monday that he will ask that trial be set back while he moves for dismissal of that and other charges against the mayor.

Both Hicks and an attorney for Brad Williams, Oregon Journal reporter, argued in court Monday for dismissal of indictments accusing Schunk and Williams of obtaining wiretapped information illegally.

That charge stems from a raid on the residence of Raymond Clark, where tape recordings were seized. The raid later was held in a state court to be illegal. The recordings were used in evidence, however, in the trial of Clark and Elkins on wiretap charges in U.S. District Court.

Convicted, Elkins and Clark face possible sentences of seven years and possible fines of \$70,000.

Williams' attorney, Manley B. Strayer, attacked the work of the grand jury, which returned indictments against Schunk and Williams. He said it had undermined "all the good work which was done by the previous grand jury."

Strayer said the grand jury had been "misled" by the attorney general's assistants, added that the grand jury had ignored the advice of Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton, and that Thornton had received "the double cross."

The grand jury returned 69 indictments and issued a report in which Thornton was criticized at length.

Strayer called for Thornton to resubmit the cases to another grand jury to get "calm appraisal in the proper atmosphere."

Contempt Trial Of Playwright Gets Under Way

WASHINGTON — Playwright Arthur Miller, husband of actress Marilyn Monroe, went on trial Tuesday on contempt of Congress charges.

Miller's attorneys waived a jury trial and the case will be decided by U.S. Dist. Judge Charles F. McLaughlin.

As the trial got under way, the judge said the issues have been clarified by his rulings on pre-trial motions.

This, he said, left only one issue — whether the questions Miller refused to answer before the House Committee on Un-American Activities last June 21 were pertinent to an inquiry the committee was conducting.

The prosecutor, Asst. U.S. Atty. William Hitz, said pertinency was the principal issue and Joseph L. Rauh Jr., one of Miller's attorneys, agreed with this. But Rauh said he intended to raise other legal issues, including constitutionality of the indictment.

Miller, 41, flanked by his attorneys, arrived at the courthouse half an hour early. Miss Monroe remained in New York.

In a two-hour opening statement, Hitz said the House committee had information that Miller had been a member of the Communist Party from 1943 to 1947.

He said that as far as he knows Miller has never denied "in so many words" past party membership, but Rauh disagreed.

Rauh said that in reply to a question as to whether he was issued a Communist Party membership card in Brooklyn in 1943, Miller replied that he "would deny it."

Rauh said Miller balked at answering only two committee questions which the defense attorney said had no relevance to past party or legislation in that field.

Lone Candidate Files For Post On Rural Board

One candidate has filed for the only position open on the Douglas County Rural School Board, and County School Supt. Kenneth Barnburg said candidates have until Friday evening to file nominating petitions.

Frank White, Reedsport, is a nominee from the area serving the Elkton, Reedsport, Gardiner and Ash school districts. He now is a member of the Reedsport Union High School Board and has been active in the Oregon School Board Assn.

The present board representative from that area, Norman B. Weatherly, Elkton, has signified he doesn't intend to run again. Barnburg said. The term is three years.

Candidates for the Non-High School Board have until May 31 in which to file nominating petitions, Barnburg said.

The present chairman of the non-high board, Mrs. Opal Munson of Umpqua, has been renominated. One other position on the board — that from Tillamook — is open this year, but no candidates have stepped forward. The vacancy was created by the resignation of Verlon C. Powell.

Election of members of each board comes June 17, the date this year for the annual school meeting.

On that date, directors in local districts also will be elected, but their names may be placed in nomination until seven days before the election. The union high school district elections come a week later, and the same rules apply in filing of nominating petitions.

In the cases of the rural and non-high boards, nominating petitions must include the names of at least 25 legal voters. Candidates' acceptance must be filed in the county school office by June 1.

The vote came at 10:15 p.m., at the end of a night session, the first at which the Senate has transacted business since the Legislature met 121 days ago. Even at that, the upper house didn't get to consider the remaining 19 measures on its heavy calendar.

Other action by the Senate included:

Passed 18-12 the bill that might compel school districts to consolidate with other districts if they are so directed by countywide committees. This goes back to the House for consideration of many Senate amendments.

Voted 24 to 8 to increase maximum weekly unemployment compensation benefits from \$35 to \$40, and to boost the employers' payroll tax from 17 million dollars a year to 24 millions. This goes to the House.

Approved a House bill to appropriate \$400,000 to launch the state or a program of inspecting all meat that isn't inspected by the federal government.

Passed a House measure to compel employers of 10 or more persons to give leaves of absence during legislative sessions to workers who are members of the Legislature.

In contrast to the jammed Senate calendar, the House was almost at the end of the long road toward final adjournment.

The House passed and sent to the Senate an amended Senate bill that provides gross negligence with the proven before a person can be convicted of negligent homicide for killing a person in an automobile accident. Now, such convictions can be obtained merely by proving simple negligence.

The House also passed three Senate measures. One bill would let cities create off-street parking districts, and a resolution would create an interim committee to study retardation of children and adults.

The third, a proposed constitutional amendment, would permit the Board of Control to use the tuberculosis hospitals at The

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cial purposes. This was read but was not included in the motion to acknowledge receipt of the letter and file it.

Issue Aired

The question of museum vs. parking lot was given plenty of airing before the council took its vote.

Leading off for the museum supporters was Mrs. Christina Miceli, staunch member of the Historical Society, who said the group "finds to its astonishment that the museum plan is not acceptable to the planning commission and retail merchants association."

She outlined the position of the Historical Society and plans to utilize the Lillie Moore property for a museum if it is given to the city by the federal government. The three downtown lots with the 100-year-old Moore family home were given to the government by Lillie Moore in her will.

She said the society hopes to restore the old house and retain it as an example of a pioneer home and to build a multi-purpose building for museum. Financial goals for such a project have been promised, she said. She punctuated her stand with the declaration, "I assure you we have great strength in this council."

Mrs. Miceli said other property could be obtained for parking and cited the value of a museum to a community and the number of visitors similar museums attract.

T. H. Fargeter, Chamber of Commerce president, said he believes the chamber's position was clearly stated in his letter and that the question had been discussed "with over 300 people." He said there were no objections to a parking lot but "lots" to a museum.

Emil Ramberg, Hotel Umpqua operator, said he was speaking also as chairman of the tourist and traffic committee of the C of C when he said he would not oppose anything which might bring tourists to the city but that he felt "we would be selfish if we didn't look at other businesses and to the future."

He said he and a group of businessmen have been negotiating with the General Services Administration in an effort to buy the property and turn it over to the city for a parking lot. Introduction of a bill by Rep. Charles O. Porter calling for transfer of the property to the city stopped negotiations, he said.

Ramberg said he feels the city council should work with local people to acquire the property for parking and to obtain other property suitable for a museum.

"The Planning Commission's letter is the most contemptible thing that has happened in years," declared Victor Miceli. He charged that the commission which is "under the city council" is trying to dictate to the council, to the county court and to councils of small towns "telling them they don't know what they are doing."

Joseph Dent, planning commission member, noted that his wife is a petitioner for the historical society, and pointed out that "it is ridiculous to think people wouldn't drive a few blocks or miles if they come from foreign countries to see museums."

The Senate voted to reconsider the bill to permit counties to regulate businesses outside cities, and sent it back to its Local Government Committee. This bill was defeated 13-14 Saturday.

The Senate State and Federal Affairs Committee approved two House-passed bills requested by Gov. Holmes. Dalles Cites Disarmaments' Test Pitfalls

WASHINGTON — Secretary of State Dulles, rejecting any idea of a neutralized zone dividing Germany, said Tuesday it might be easier to set up a disarmament test with Russia in the arctic rather than in Europe.

Dulles told a news conference many problems and pitfalls are involved in working out a pilot agreement for an arms control system as applied to some European areas.

He said that State Department thinking now is primarily concerned with the arctic territory and other sparsely settled regions.

Furthermore, Dulles argued that such an area, if agreed on, could be very useful in relaxing tensions because inspection, including aerial photography, would cover regions from which atomic attacks might be launched by either of the great powers against the other.

Dulles made these other points in response to reporters' questions:

1. American newspapers and wire services might rely on foreigners to get information out of Red China for them. Dulles said the U.S. government, which has objected to visits to Red China by American newsmen, would have no responsibility for protecting foreign nationals.

2. The United States would not oppose Israel's announced intention to send a test ship to the Suez Canal and it would not approve any action by Egypt to keep the ship from using the canal.

By these two negatives, Dulles appeared to give tacit U.S. okay for the Israel test plan and to put the United States in opposition to any action against it by Egypt.

3. The United States is considering introduction of more modern weapons into South Korea. Dulles in effect said the armistice agreement barring replacements except when they are the same type as already in Korea is out of date and needs sensible interpretation. He also said the Red Chinese have been violating it by introducing jet planes into North Korea.

4. It would be a very great misfortune in the administration's view if the Senate refused approval of U.S. membership in the proposed international atomic-for-peace agency which President Eisenhower took the lead in forming.

ment of parking fines. In answer to a question, he said the police department is presently holding about 1,900 tickets which are more than four months old. These are being processed, the chief stated, as fast as possible.

No longer will jury duty and visits to a doctor's office be considered valid excuses for having parking tickets canceled.

Chief Rumpf asked the council for some guide as to its wishes in enforcing the traffic ordinance and said that the policy which he had inherited had called for recognizing many excuses. The practice is being abused, he declared, and indicated that doctors are being "victimized" by the number of excuses brought to the police department bearing physicians' names.

Excuses Limited

The only excuses to be considered in the future will be real emergencies and faulty meters and these must have approval of the municipal judge.

In other business the council: Received and referred to the city manager and city attorney a taxicab business application from Roseburg Cab Co. which had until May 13 to submit it. It is to be reported to the council at its next meeting.

Decided to ask the State Highway Commission to hold a public hearing on the proposed Rose-Stephens Street one-way couplet.

Accepted the low bids of the Roseburg Paving Co. for work on three streets. The only other bid was the J. R. McAllister Co. For the Kane Street project, Roseburg Paving bid \$8,622.93 to \$9,010.71 by McAllister. Union Street work brought a \$16,389.88 bid from Roseburg Paving and \$16,537.23 from McAllister. For West Maple Street, Roseburg Paving bid \$18,107.51 to \$19,465.67 by McAllister.

Changes Street Name

Passed an ordinance changing the name of Calkins Road to Keesey Street to eliminate confusion resulting from the same thoroughfare carrying two names.

Repealed and re-enacted an ordinance calling for sale of \$850,000 in bonds to finance sewer improvement work. City Attorney Paul Geddes said an error had appeared in published notices. The new ordinance calls for bond bids to be opened June 3 instead of May 27 and calls for par value of not less than 98 per cent instead of 100 per cent.
