closed on Monday, filed its application. This was submitted to the council that night and was referred to the city manager and police chief for study and report. This will include checking their meters for accuracy by both city officials and is scheduled to be done today.

Roseburg Cab has operated in the city for several years and asked for a license renewal last December. They paid the city \$250 to cover three cab stands and six taxis.

Ellis made his first payment to the city last November when he applied for a license and sent a check for \$50. After the new ordinance was passed, he paid an additional \$25 for three cabs.

Wednesday, Ellis asked the city attorney if he could continue to operate. "I told him he could not," Geddes said this morning. He went on to state that Ellis had asked if he could operate free and that the answer was "yes."

According to Geddes, this means that Ellis' drivers may not accept tips. No money can change hands — if it does it makes it a business for profit, the city attorney pointed out.

Ellis says he has two new cabs ordered and has been informed that delivery will be made by June 15. These cars, equipped with meters and radios, and a budget apparently are all that stand between Ellis and his final getting a license.

problems were bound to arise," Benson went on.

On the subject he had planned originally to discuss, Benson renewed assertions that the present formulas governing farm production controls and price supports are "obsolete."

As he told the Senate Agriculture Committee Wednesday, Benson again said controls are not effective in reducing overall agricultural production, and that farm surpluses are likely to continue under present farm law.

Wednesday's House vote was sparked by Democratic foes of the Eisenhower administration's farm policies. But it found Republicans as well as Democrats blaming Benson for what they called waste and mismanagement in the effort to reduce farm surpluses.

**President Counts
Only 14 Senators
Favoring Budget**

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower counted only 14 Republican senators on his side today in the first Senate test of his nationwide appeal against sharp cuts in his budget.

Twenty-three Senate Republicans, including the top four party leaders, joined with 38 Democrats last night in slashing appropriations for the U. S. Information Agency \$53,800,000 under his request.

One Democrat, Sen. Neuberger of Oregon, supported Eisenhower, who a few hours earlier followed up his TV-radio speech Tuesday night with a new defense of his budget at a news conference. Eisenhower said it would be a "mistake" to cut USIA heavily.

The Senate went on from that 61-15 defeat for the administration to pass by a 74-0 roll call vote a State-Justice Department money bill slashed a total of \$102,564,000 under the Eisenhower budget estimates. It was \$714,500 under House allowances. The money is for use in the fiscal year starting July 1.

Adopted by voice vote was an amendment, recommended by Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson (D-Tex.), Senate majority leader, which would deny use of any USIA funds for any overseas information service in competition with press associations or other private news agencies.

The bill went back to the House for adjustment of differences with a unanimous Appropriations subcommittee recommendation that the USIA be turned back to the State Department through separate legislation.

**Martha Raye Rushed
To New York Hospital**

NEW YORK — Comedienne Martha Raye was rushed to a hospital from her home early Thursday and given emergency treatment for an undisclosed ailment.

Friends said the 40-year-old entertainer had simply gone to the hospital for a few days rest, but two newspapers, The New York Post and The New York Journal-American said they had learned she had suffered a heart attack.

Miss Raye was carried on a stretcher from her suite in the Park Sheraton Hotel about 5 a.m. and taken by private ambulance to Doctors Hospital.

**Additional Funds
Asked To Further
Ice Harbor Dam**

WASHINGTON — The Senate and House Appropriations Committees Thursday were asked to approve additional funds to maintain the construction schedule on Ice Harbor Dam on the Snake River during the balance of the present fiscal year.

In a letter to the committees, Dewey Short, assistant secretary of the Army for civil and military affairs, requested that \$1,200,000 additional be transferred from Army Corps of Engineers funds for Ice Harbor construction.

Sens. Magnuson and Jackson of Washington, reporting Short's move, said the additional funds would be sufficient to carry construction on the project through June 30, the end of the fiscal year.

On July 1, funds from the 1958 fiscal budget will become available.

The Senate and House Appropriations committees earlier had approved the transfer of \$925,000 from other corps funds to Ice Harbor after the contractor at the project said May 6 he would have to halt work May 10 because all available money had been used. The \$925,000 was sufficient to carry the work to May 24.

**Rights Of Planes
Tested In Court**

HILLSBORO — The question of whether a pilot is trespassing when he flies in the air above a house is at issue in a court suit here.

Eighteen householders have asked that the Beaverton airport either be closed or its use be limited because of the noise and vibrations they say result when planes take off. They contend the planes are trespassing.

Judge J. F. Bohannon, trying the unusual case, flew over the airport and the surrounding area Wednesday and went to the home of one of the plaintiffs to listen to the sounds of planes in the area.

Attorneys for Charles Bernard, airport owner, argued that the air is public domain, just like a highway, and that everyone is entitled to use it.

L. S. White, chairman of the airport committee of the Port of Portland, supported this view. He said all airports could be closed under the ruling asked by the plaintiffs.

Lurid Magazine Writers Indicted

LOS ANGELES — Warrants are out for the arrest of "several persons" indicted by the county grand jury following the investigation of a criminal libel case against Confidential and other lurid magazines.

Dep. Dist. Atty. William Ritz used the phrase "several persons" when he was asked Thursday how many were named in the secret indictments. He said indictments also were returned against several corporations.

But—since none of the warrants had been served, and the indictments are supposed to remain secret until they are—he declined to reveal any names.

The grand jury's action, taken after a two-day hearing, culminated in a six-month investigation of Confidential and similar publications by the state attorney general's office.

The board approved two other contracts approved were: Connie Garey, third grade teacher at Green; Rosalie Houston, physical education teacher at a high school, and Juanita Spooner, business education teacher, also at the high school.

The board approved \$14,527.70 for lockers and their installation was accepted. Lowman and Hanford submitted the low bid. A Madden and Monroe bid totaling \$121 for padlocks was also accepted.

Roseburg schools will be represented at a University of Oregon curriculum workshop this summer. The board approved a recommendation allowing \$132.50 each be paid to two instructors who have been appointed chairmen by the State Department of Education for regional curriculum committees in the fields of language, arts and social studies. While at the workshop the teachers will help set up study guides which will be used in the Roseburg elementary schools. The teachers are Miss Ina Farnsworth and Mrs. Althea Lofland.

A recommendation stating teachers will be offered contracts before the close of school was accepted. Approximately 200 teachers have accepted contracts for the new school year. Current contracts terminate June 7. New contracts will be signed before school closes because many of the teachers will be leaving Roseburg and it is difficult to get the signed contracts returned, Deller said.

Members of the board will meet at Central Junior High School tonight at 6. They are scheduled to attend a regular meeting of the Douglas County School Board Assn. at Glendale. The meeting will begin with a dinner at 6:30.

Next school board meeting is May 29 at Central Junior High School. A public hearing on the school district budget will be held Monday at 7:30 p.m.

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**Bomarc Guided
Missile Contract
Let To Boeing**

SEATTLE — The semi-secret Bomarc guided missile, a ground-to-air interceptor weapon of supersonic speed and a 200 to 300 mile range, was ordered into production Thursday by the Air Force.

A joint announcement by Boeing Airplane Co. and the Air Force said the far-ranging missile can "shoot down enemy aircraft at a far greater distance than any other missile presently in use in air defense." Its altitude was listed only as "extreme."

Boeing was given a \$7,109,195 "initial production contract" but the Air Force in Washington said "quantity production" was planned.

The Bomarc, presumably capable of using either conventional or nuclear warheads, is believed to be the only interception missile capable of replacing a manned fighter plane.

The first Bomarc photograph was released. Heretofore, only an artist's conception of the missile has been published.

The 15,000-pound Bomarc is about 47 feet long—10 feet longer than the F86 Sabrejet fighter plane. The wing span is 18 feet 2 inches.

The announcement said the Bomarc had proved itself "an excellent interceptor weapon" in high altitude tests against drone planes over the Atlantic. Tests have been conducted at Patrick Air Force Base, Florida.

The company said the missile will be assembled in Seattle, with more than 70 per cent of the production work to be subcontracted.

many others suffered less severe hurts.

This stricken community is in the Texas Panhandle, 65 miles southeast of Amarillo.

National Guard units, nurses, doctors, Red Cross helpers and volunteers rescue workers converged here from almost every point nearby.

"There was destruction everywhere and the scene of death and devastation was made eerie by the wailing sirens, the flashing lights of police and ambulances, and lightning from the electrical storm," said Luron Brown of the Plainview Evening Herald, one of the first newsmen on the scene.

Seven persons in one family were killed in two adjoining houses. They were Mr. and Mrs. Veral Vaughn, Mr. and Mrs. Rance Stephens, and the three Stephens children. Mr. and Mrs. Vaughn were the parents of Mrs. Stephens.

Another family was wiped out by the twister. They were Mr. and Mrs. Domingo Rivas and their two children. Mrs. Rivas was an expectant mother.

Another victim was J. D. Bingham, about 65 or 70.

The body of an infant boy was picked up in the middle of a debris-strewn street. Another child, a 1-year-old American girl between 7 and 10 years, was not identified immediately.
