# Will There Be An Allout War?

## !!! GAS WAR WE MEAN !!!

**To The Motoring Public —**

And we think that takes in everyone, which is our intention. Did you ever stop for a moment and consider the importance of petroleum to our daily lives? Imagine, if you can, what might happen if all motors using petroleum fuels were suddenly stilled. Explore this a little and you will be startled.

Think then, of the thousands of gasoline service stations at your disposal for your convenience. You can get free restroom service, free air and water, free battery service, a service man will call the highway department to advise you of road conditions, he will give you a choice of hotel or motel accommodations, furnish free road maps, give you a message from your wife to bring home a loaf of bread or pound of butter, mind the baby, help you home when you had one too many with the boys and so many other little courtesies it would take a great deal of space to enumerate them. Oil companies have provided credit cards for your convenience, in fact one credit card is honored by over 38,000 dealers across the country. The word "service station" is well taken.

Think again of these service stations. Most of them are operated as independent businesses by men who are a part of the community. Most of them are owned by the oil companies and are leased to the operators as few individuals can afford the cost of a modern service station. This is good because a man can get into business with a minimum of capital. Naturally the oil company owning the facility gives a conditional lease that insures the sale of its products through the leased unit, which is fair. Most operators are very loyal to their suppliers. In some instances though the supplier exerts rigid control of the operation through threat of lease cancellation and attempts to control prices although this is illegal by federal statute.

Such a situation exists in Roseburg today. The Shell Oil Company has caused to be posted at four of its leased stations in Roseburg large signs depicting the price of gasoline at a figure approximately three cents below the prevailing price at all major oil company service stations, including their own, prior to the sign posting.

This association would be happy to support a price reduction in gasoline if it were a reduction in wholesale price and would lower their prices a fair percentage in addition. However, the Shell Oil Company has caused their dealers to absorb this cut in price which, we feel, is unfair and very unwise. They defend their action, through their dealers' statements, possibly voluntary, that they are meeting competition, that there has been under-the-canopy cutting and "Big Saving" signs posted here and there.

We agree these conditions are true, but wish to inform you the stations posting 4c off signs are paying 4c less for their gasoline and are not giving away their profit margin. These dealers are, in most cases, selling un-branded or minor brand gasolines. If the Shell Oil Company or any other major oil company wants to compete with these minor brands they should lower their wholesale price to the same level. Why there should be such a difference in wholesale prices we are not prepared to say. As to under-the-canopy discounts (or cutting), it has been determined that one Shell dealer has cut up to 4c per gallon to a commercial account. We do not attempt to evaluate such an action and are aware that quite a few dealers do make some reduction for volume buying, so the under-the-canopy cutting charge is not denied but we feel such an excuse by a Shell Oil Company dealer is not justified when he participates in the same practice.

If these price signs in question are allowed to remain, there is no question but that a general price situation will result with all gasoline dealers suffering great losses and many of them being forced out of business while the Shell Oil Co. will be little affected. You people will find prices returning to present levels and will gain nothing.

There has been a great deal of protest about the high prices of gasoline. We defend the right of the producers to raise their prices in line with increased costs. We know the importance of exploration and research, to uncover new supplies of petroleum and develop methods to extract more and more from a gallon of crude oil. If we could enumerate the multitude of products derived from crude oil for our better living it would be amazing to you. Again, we point to the first paragraph of this report.

The actual cost of the best gasoline in Roseburg based on a price of 40c is 31c per gallon. The balance of 9c is tax, state and federal, and is used to build better highways for your convenience and enjoyment. We feel there is no commodity in our American market today that will do as much for you in accordance with the cost as a gallon of gasoline.

There are over 80 service stations in this area that will be vitally effected by a price war. The tourist season is just starting and thousands of gallons of gasoline will be purchased by out of state motorists. Do you want to see thousands of dollars lost to our community by a disastrous price war? We do not believe you do and are asking you to stand by your regular dealer in this crisis, the fellow who will get out of a warm bed in the middle of the night to bring you a battery or change a tire when car trouble strikes you.
