Rotary International Names New President

L. J. ZERN, Switzerland, U.S. — Charles G. Tennent of Asheville, N.C., was formally confirmed Monday as president-elect of Rotary International. Thousands of delegates applauded him at the organization's 48th annual convention.

Tennent will take over his duties July 1 from the outgoing president, Italian exporter Gian Paolo Lang.

Tennent's formal election to Rotary's highest post means there will be an American to preside at next year's 49th convention in Dallas, Tex.

Lang said that, at last report, Rotary International numbered 9,373 clubs comprising 442,900 business and professional men in almost 100 countries.

President Eisenhower sent best wishes to the convention.

Amendment Crippling Civil Rights Bill Beaten

WASHINGTON — Backers of civil rights legislation defeated in the Senate Judiciary Committee Monday an amendment by Sen. Ervin (D-N.C.) they contended would have "emasculated" the bill.

The 6-4 vote, announced after a closed door meeting, marked the first actual voting test of strength in the weeks of jockeying which has bottled up the measure in the committee.

Ervin's amendment would have stricken from the bill all but its last section, which is designed to protect the voting rights of Negroes and other minority groups.

Chairman Eastland (D-Miss) said the next step in the running fight will be discussion and perhaps a vote on the even more hotly contested proposal of Sen. McClellan (D-Ark.) to hook a "right to work" amendment onto the measure.

8-Month Baby Dies In Sutherlin

Surviving are the baby's mother and father of Spokane; paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Priest, of Ashfork, Ark.; maternal grandparents, William R. Kronmeier of Valleyford, Wash., and Alta Kronmeier of Spokane. Cause of death has not been determined. An autopsy is scheduled tonight at Roseburg.

Family Of 3 Missing In Storm-Beset Plane

SEATTLE — A snowstorm over the Cascade Mountains Monday hampered the aerial search for a small plane, carrying a Canadian family of three, which disappeared Sunday on a flight from Ellensburg to Everett, Wash.

Despite the bad weather, five search planes were in the air Monday morning and others were poised to take off when conditions improve.

Aboard the missing plane were Warren Wall, 35, of Duncan, B.C., the pilot; his wife, Mary; and their 8-year-old son, Glenn.

Wall left Ellensburg at 11:14 a.m. en route for Everett over Stampede Pass. He failed to land at Everett.

AFL-CIO Ousts Beck As Officer Of Union

AFL-CIO headquarters building and sped away in an automobile, giving newsmen no chance to question him. He left before the council took its action, and Meany said he probably would advise Beck officially by letter.

During the half hour, Beck listened to a general summary of the charges against him and a dressing down by Meany.

The council's charges against the 62-year-old Teamster boss ran 45 pages, and asserted that Beck had brought the entire labor movement in disrepute.

In response to a question, Meany said he couldn't recall when any other labor leader had been ousted from membership of labor's top policymaking group.

Beck has been a member of the AFL-CIO council since August, 1953. About six months earlier, he had been elected president of the Teamsters Union.

Sen. McClellan (D-Ark.), chairman of the Senate subcommittee investigating the AFL-CIO council's action, said: "All good union people will heartily approve. So will all good citizens everywhere."

Beck invoked the Fifth Amendment more than 200 times before the Senate committee in refusing to answer committee charges that he "stole" more than \$300,000 of Teamsters funds. Beck has repaid the union about \$370,000 which he says he borrowed.

Separate ouster proceedings against the Teamsters Union itself, largely based on Beck's questioned activities, are due to be heard Friday by the AFL-CIO Ethical Practices Committee. However, this hearing may be postponed to give the Teamsters more time to prepare an answer.

ried at Portland at 8 p.m. and were northbound on their honeymoon. The State Patrol said evidence indicated the Taggart-Smith car was in the wrong lane on the four-lane highway when the collision occurred 14 miles north of Kelso.

The two cars burst into flames at the impact. The bodies of the three who died were burned beyond recognition.

At Centralia Saturday night, a train-auto collision claimed the lives of Ray Lair and Guy E. Davis, both in the mid-50s and both of Centralia.

The car, with Lair driving and Davis a passenger in the front seat, was struck by a Union Pacific freight train at a Centralia crossing. The engineer, John R. Steele of Centralia, said the car pulled up to the crossing, hesitated briefly and then rolled into the path of the train.

The train, traveling at about 33 miles per hour, carried the demolished car three blocks. The wives of the two victims, sitting in the back seat of the auto, escaped serious injury.

Michael John Spivak, 31-year-old Air Force technical sergeant stationed at McChord Air Force Base, was killed Saturday when the car in which he was riding hit the rear of another car near the base and rolled over. Spivak was from New York.

July 1 Deadline For Wheat Crop 1958 Allotments

July 1 is the last date for accepting applications for "new farm" allotments for the 1958 wheat crop, according to J. F. Bonebrake, chairman of the Douglas County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

To be considered for an allotment on a farm which had no wheat seeded for grain for any of the years, 1955, 1956 and 1957, but on which wheat will be seeded for grain for 1958, the farmer must apply in writing to his county ASC Committee. Application forms are available at the county office for use in filing such requests, Bonebrake said.

While an application form will be mailed to a farmer upon request, the farmer must complete the form and file it at the county ASC office on or before the closing date, July 1.

Factors to be considered by the county ASC committee is determining the eligibility of applicants for "new farm" wheat allotments will include the tillable acreage, type of soil, and topography of the farm, the operator's farming system, extent to which his livelihood depends on his farming operations, and the reason wheat has not been planted in any one of the three previous years.

Producers on farms which receive "new farm" wheat allotments will not be eligible for participation in the Soil Bank's Acreage Reserve program with respect to such "new farm" allotments. Bonebrake said no request for a new farm allotment will be considered unless it is made in writing on or before the closing date.

Doctor Beneficiary Of 3 Wills Facing 8 Charges

EASTBOURNE, England — The prosecution charged Monday that Dr. John Bodkin Adams received 2,500 pounds (\$7,000) in the wills of three patients but failed to mention the inheritance when he asked for permission to cremate them.

Prosecutor Malcolm Morris told a Magistrates Court that after the death of each of the three patients, the doctor did not indicate he knew he was going to benefit under the wills, as required by British law. Two legacies of 1,000 pounds (\$2,800) each and one of 500 pounds (\$1,400) were left to him by the patients, the prosecution said.

The court began hearings, expected to last three days, on 15 charges against the chubby society doctor.

Eight charges were brought under the Forgery Act, one under the Larceny Act three under the Cremation Act and three under the Dangerous Drugs Act.

Five Escape Injuries As Car Lands In Ditch

Injuries were escaped early this morning by five persons when their car went out of control and went into a ditch on Highway 99 at the foot of Mount Nebo.

State police reported that the car was driven by Angeline Epps, El Monte, Calif., and was headed south. In going around a turn she applied the brakes and lost control of the vehicle.

Higher Bond Limit For Oregon Counties Due For State Vote; Teeth Put Into Election Law

By PAUL W. HARVEY Jr. SALEM — The Oregon Senate Saturday completed legislative action on a proposed constitutional amendment that would permit counties to issue more bonds for general purposes.

The measure, approved with six dissenting votes, will be on the November, 1958, general election ballot.

Counties now are limited to \$5,000 worth of bonds, exclusive of road bonds.

The measure would remove the limit in the Constitution, but permit the Legislature, by law, to fix the limit.

Immediately after the Senate approved the amendment, it passed a companion bill which would go into effect if the people approve the higher bond limit. The bill would place the limit at 2 per cent of the true cash value of all property in a county. It goes to the governor.

package prepared by the Legislative Interim Committee, which studied county and city problems. No bonds could be issued in any county without a vote of the people.

Corrupt Practices Teeth

The Senate also sent to the governor a bill to put teeth into the corrupt practices law, which now is almost unenforceable.

This law restricts the spending by candidates for public office. The bill would permit any voter to bring a complaint against a candidate charging he disobeyed the law, and the secretary of state and attorney general would prosecute if there was a violation.

The bill also increases the restriction on spending by legislative candidates from \$100 to \$250 per election. Candidates who failed to file the required campaign expense statements would be fined \$25 for each day they were in default.

Another bill on which the Senate completed legislative action transfers from the labor commissioner to the fire marshals' the authority over storage and transportation of liquid petroleum gas. The bill sets up strict regulations, and gives the fire marshal power to make more rules.

The Senate also sent to the governor a bill providing penalties for employers who violate agreements to put money into union health and welfare funds.

mediate admission of Negroes to the Memphis State College.

The decision was given by the U. S. Circuit Court in Cincinnati in a case filed by five Negroes residing in Memphis. The Circuit Court ruled 2-1 a board plan for gradual desegregation of the college was not in step with the Supreme Court's decision that public school integration be accomplished with all deliberate speed.

The board plan called for immediate desegregation in graduate work and desegregation of other classes on the basis of one class a year. In ruling against the plan, the Circuit Court said the board could limit the number of admissions according to available physical facilities, but could not base the limitations on race or color.

Further, it said the plan put off for five years the admission of the five Negroes to the freshman class, while admitting white students who registered later than the Negroes. The Circuit Court called this "a clear discrimination."

Among its other actions, the tribunal granted a hearing to Herman Brittan, a Philadelphia school teacher fired after refusing to answer a question about membership in a Communist political association in 1944.
