New Hatchery Gets Approval At Port Orford

SALEM — A \$200,000 appropriation for a new fish hatchery on the Elk River near Port Orford was approved here by the legislative Joint Ways and Means Committee.

The proposed hatchery will replace a smaller hatchery on the Coos River that has been curtailed because of lack of water. The proposed facility will rear salmon for commercial and sports fishing interests, and will be capable of propagating about half a million salmon annually.

The Coos River hatchery has been producing about 150,000 fingerlings yearly.

The committee amended a Senate-approved bill to build a farm youth dormitory at the state fair grounds to further spread payment of the cost. The bill would take a percentage of racing revenues before distribution to the various county fairs.

The amended version would also skim off a percentage of the racing money that also goes to 10 special farm shows.

The \$300,000 dormitory will be financed by a loan from the public employes retirement fund. The average county fair loss under the new formula would be about 367 a year.

The committee tabled a Senate bill to put the state fair board under the Department of Agriculture, and approved an appropriation of \$25,000 for a proposed state council to study recreational needs of the aged.

It approved for introduction a bill appropriating \$250,000 toward construction of a new armory in Salem. But it wrote in a provision that the money would be returned to the general fund if Marion County or the city of Salem failed to match the appropriation by local effort within two years.

Immunity Trade For Testimony Heard On Appeal

WASHINGTON — A 1954 law giving congressional committees limited right to trade immunity for testimony is getting its first full-scale judicial review.

The U.S. Court of Appeals is hearing the arguments on appeals of four unwilling witnesses. Instead of the usual three-judge panel, the court's nine judges are hearing the case.

There is no certainty, however, that in disposing of the appeals the court will act on constitutional questions. Such a ruling may not come until a witness, granted immunity from prosecution, refuses to testify and is charged with contempt of Congress.

The law limits the immunity grant to investigations involving national security.

The appeals grew out of efforts of the Senate Internal Security subcommittee to get testimony on communism from four men who in the past have invoked their Fifth Amendment privilege against possible self-incrimination.
