

**Three Children Perish When Fire Sweeps Home**  
ST. ALBANS, Vt. — Three young children perished early Friday when fire swept three rooms of their home.  
Killed were Anthony Aratare, 6, and his brothers Kirk, 4, and Bruce 2.  
They were the children of Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Aratare. Police said the blaze, which apparently started in the kitchen, swept that room, a dining room and the bedroom where the boys slept.

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## Cost Of Living At New Record Level In April

WASHINGTON — The government reported Friday that living costs rose to another new record level in April for the eighth straight month. A sharp rise in food prices was a major factor.  
The Bureau of Labor Statistics said its index increased from March to April by three-tenths of 1 per cent.  
This was enough to give automatic pay boosts of two cents an hour to 1,400,000 workers in the auto, electrical and farm equipment manufacturing industries.  
In addition to the rise in food costs, prices of most other major groups of consumer goods and services also rose in April. Clothing was the only major group showing a decline for the month, apparently due to the post-Easter price declines.  
Food alone rose 1/2 of 1 per cent with meats, fresh fruits and vegetables all showing increases.  
The over-all living cost index rose to 119.3 per cent of the 1947-49 average. This is 3.8 per cent higher than April 1956. The new living cost level means that it now costs about \$1.20 to buy what could be bought with a dollar in the 1947-49 era.

## Eisenhower Asks Authority For Selective Veto

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower Friday challenged the Democratic-controlled Congress to give him authority for selective veto of appropriation items. He said that with such power "I could easily do some serious cost cutting."  
The President set forth the challenge in a telephoned message to a Republican Party rally at Trenton, N.J.  
The rally is the sixth and last of a series held around the country to whip up party enthusiasm for the battle to take control of Congress from the Democrats in next year's elections.  
On that score, Eisenhower said that when the White House is controlled by one party and Congress by another—as is the case at present—"there is a confused political situation that leads to partisan bickering and inefficiency in the public business." Then he said: "So — Let's have a Republican Congress in '58."  
The President again defended his \$71,800,000,000 budget, and particularly the administration's \$3,865,000,000 foreign aid program.  
He also put in a new plug for his school construction program, and said again that he won't be for a tax cut so long as there is any possibility it would result in deficit spending.  
"We will not play politics with our people and blithely promise them a tax cut at the expense of our national security," Eisenhower said. "We will not return to deficit financing. We will not stop payments on the national debt."

## British Plane Takes Off Again

FAIRBANKS, Alaska — A bomber streaked across the vast emptiness of the North Pacific Friday with its three-man crew still hopeful of cracking the London-Tokyo round trip flight time record.  
Despite a delay of more than 20 1/2 hours because of mechanical trouble, the bomber's crew was confident it could beat the old record of 94 hours set 20 years ago by a Japanese plane.  
The Royal Air Force bomber, left here at 3:33 a.m. (5:33 a.m. PST) for Tokyo, where another crew will take over for the return trip to London over the top of the world.  
Wing Cmdr. Rod Harman, the crew commander, said he expected to make the 3,600 mile run to Tokyo in a little less than eight hours.  
The Canberra, making the flight for navigational experience, flew here Thursday from London in 9 hours and 7 minutes. After a 50 minute stopover, the bomber took off for Tokyo, but was forced back by a faulty fuel pump.
