

PCC Retains \$100 Pay Ceiling; Stiffens GPA Entrance Requirements

SPOKANE — The Pacific Coast Conference ate a little of the pay ceiling but never got to the meat before clearing the tables on its annual spring meeting. The faculty chiefs who cook up the conference rules voted to give football and basketball players more time for studies and practice without a cut in pay.

This was accomplished by cutting the weekly work load in half and doubling salaries during the playing seasons. Through the fall football or winter basketball seasons, for example, a player will be limited to six hours of campus work at \$4 an hour.

At other times during the school term he will be paid \$2 per hour as in the past. The monthly limit remains at \$100.

California Schools
California, Stanford and UCLA dissented as this plan passed by a 6-3 vote. A rider was attached, ruling that an athlete taking advantage of the double-pay plan may not hold an off-campus job at the same time. Again the vote was 6-3, with Southern California, UCLA and California as dissenters.

A boy who takes part in both basketball and football will be allowed the double-pay, shorter hours advantage only in one sport. The arrangement does not hold.

Title Bout Talk Resumed Again

NEW YORK — A title defense by heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson against Tommy (Hurricane) Jackson, at the Polo Grounds in late July again was in the talking stage Friday.

Lippe Breidbart, Jackson's manager, said he was willing to accept 20 per cent of the overall gate, including an estimated \$175,000 for television with a local blackout.

However, Breidbart said his attorney had been informed by Emil Lence, independent promoter named by Patterson's manager to run the show, that Jackson would have to agree to a rematch if he should win the title. This latest demand and a request that part of Jackson's purse be held in escrow for a possible return was holding up the show pending further conferences.

One thing about Don Gross, the young Cincinnati left-hander, may not win 'em all, but he hasn't lost one for the Redlegs since 1955.

The 25-year-old southpaw has been the pitcher of record only eight times in his last 29 appearances in the majors — and each decision was a victory. He last lost one Sept. 8, 1953, to Philadelphia.

Gross was in 19 games last season and wound up with a 3-0 record. Last night, he made it 4-0 for '57.

Minoso Has Unenviable Record Of Being HBP

NEW YORK — Minnie Minoso holds one record he would be glad to give up. It is the American League all time high — 23 — for most times hit by a pitched ball in one season.

The 33-year-old Cuban has been plunked 100 times in a big league career that stretches over parts of seven seasons.

Opposing pitchers and their managers sometimes say Minnie doesn't try to get out of the way. They claim Minoso will let a stray pitch nick his bat or graze his elbow if the Chicago White Sox are desperate for a base runner.

Minoso doesn't like that sort of talk.

"Some people pick up ball quick when I leave pitcher's hand," he said when the Sox were at Yankee Stadium. "Me, I pick up ball four-five feet away."

"They pitch me tight," said Minnie. "I hit close to the plate. Very close. I crowd. Sometimes I guess, like when Whitey Ford pitched the other night. I guess, expect a slow curve with two strikes. He throw fast ball inside."

Minoso is having a good year with the speedy White Sox. He is hitting .318, has driven in 20 runs and has stolen three bases.

The majors have a new rule this season that if a batter is hit by a pitched ball in the strike zone, the umpires shall rule "strike" and make the batter stay at the plate. Minoso says that wasn't meant for him.

"I never was hit by pitch that was a strike," he said. "Nobody gets hit on purpose."

NAIA Track Meet Draws Seven Schools

PORTLAND — The District 2 NAIA track meet will be held here Friday, with seven colleges taking part.

The district committee permitted Linfield to enter after the McMinnville school agreed not to use Bill Lapp, a two-miler. Lapp had not taken the required number of classroom hours.
