

UCLA Followers Press Action To End Identification With Coast Conference

LOS ANGELES (AP) — University of California officials faced pressure from the Board of Regents Saturday for early action on a request that UCLA be permitted to leave the Pacific Coast Conference.

Although the board refused to go along with impatient Bruin followers Friday, chairman Edwin W. Pauley promised "drastic" action by the regents at their June 21 meeting if university officials still haven't made up their minds.

Officials of UCLA alumni groups made a powerful plea for immediate withdrawal of the school from the PCC, but lost out when the regents voted to put the

Cleveland's Indians may be the most overlooked second-place team in baseball as they have a long time to make off with the American League lead with a 10-game unbeaten streak and the New York Yankees played night games in a push to win 11 victories in 14 games, virtually unnoticed.

The Tribe finally caught the eye last night, knocking off the White Sox 4-3 to creep within two games of the lead in the opener of a four-game set at Cleveland.

Cleveland began the current ride by tripping the Yankees after the champs had won six in a row to gain first place.

Fight Pact Ends Challenge Hunt

NEW YORK (AP) — Tommy (Hurricane) Jackson, the "chop 'em up" man with the double uppercut, actually is going to fight for the world heavyweight championship as Floyd Patterson makes his first defense at the Polo Grounds in New York July 29 or July 30.

Finding the challenger has been the most difficult part of this independent promotion by Emanuel Lence, a dress manufacturer who used to run fights at Eastern Parkway Arena in Brooklyn.

Ever since Gus D'Amato, Patterson's manager, made his impassioned personal declaration of independence from the International Boxing Club, Lence has been trying to sign Jackson, the No. 1 contender.

Agree On Terms

Through the mediation of Julius Helfand, chairman of the New York State Athletic Commission, they finally got together on terms. Lence, Patterson's manager, agreed to 20 percent of "everything" including gate receipts and a guaranteed TV revenue of \$175,000. D'Amato will get 40 percent for the champion.

Helfand helped iron out a last minute hitch when Breidbreit finally agreed to a rematch in case Jackson won the title.

The IBC, already up to its ears in a hearing on how to break up its boxing monopoly, didn't appear overly concerned. Harry Markson, IBC's managing director, said:

Norris Urges Fight

"I am very glad Patterson is going to defend against a worthy challenger and I also am pleased that Lence Breidbreit is following the advice of Jim Norris (IBC president) who had urged him to take the fight."

It was Wertz and Colavito who delivered the pay off singles as the Tribe scored twice in the seventh to win last night after trailing 3-2.

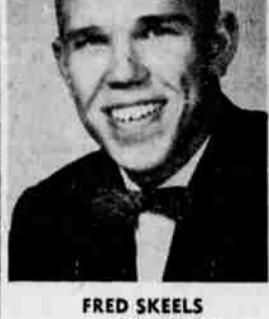

"Take last night's card. What kinda crowd you get with two guys brought in from the outside? Where's the local fighters?"

Carter had won a unanimous 10-round decision from Buddy McDonald of Edmonton, Alta.

"But we have to compete with television now. Who's going to pay to see a fight when he can tune one in at home free?" This from Jack Powers, former Spokane matchmaker and part-time manager of such fighters as Tiger Jack Fox, one-time heavyweight contender.

Ketchum: "All you need is a Tiger Fox — a good local boy. A Flanagan. An Aragon."

Hager: "I had the biggest gates in Idaho. All local boys."

Powers: "Tiger Jack Fox. Ketchum: "Sure. A town gets a Tiger Fox and suddenly boxing's not so unhealthy anymore."

Grandfather In Spotlight In Indianapolis Race Test

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (AP) — A possible Indianapolis motor speedway qualifying record by grandpa Paul Russo and his Novi Special was the major attraction today in a second session of time trials for the 41st 500-mile race on May 30.

Russo, of Canoga Park, Calif., a veteran of 10 Memorial Day races, turned in this year's fastest practice lap yesterday, 144.88 m.p.h.

Tony Bettenhausen, Tinley Park, Ill., another 10-time starter, did a 144 m.p.h. in a twin to Russo's Novi.

Tony Bonadies of New York hit a retaining wall yesterday in the 16th accident of this year's preliminary activity, but escaped with a cut finger.

Qualifying records are 145.056 m.p.h. for 10 miles and 146.056 m.p.h. for one lap, both set last year by winner Pat Flaherty of Chicago. He had a 270-cubic-inch engine and this year's rules have cut displacement about 10 per cent.

Pat O'Connor of North Vernon, Ind., fastest of the nine drivers who qualified between showers last Saturday, set the record of 143.948 for the smaller engine.

At least 24 unqualified cars at the track had turned in laps over 140 m.p.h. in practice and driver Elmer George, son-in-law of Speedway owner Tony Hulman, was sweating out last weekend's slowest qualifying speed of 140.725 m.p.h. If 33 go faster, he will be bumped from lineup.

L&C Qualifies Four Trackmen

PORTLAND (AP) — Lewis and Clark ran off with the district 2 NAIA track title Friday and qualified four men for the national NAIA meet at San Diego, June 7-8.

Five meet records were broken as Lewis and Clark rolled to its easy win, scoring 94 1/2 points, followed by Linfield, 72, Portland State 39 1/2, Oregon College of Education 37, University of Portland 29, and Southern Oregon 8.

Jim Senko of the University of Portland cracked two distance marks, running the mile in 4:23.3 minutes, and the two-mile in 9:47.6.

Linfield's Bill Machamer set a 440-yard record of 49 seconds and tied the 220-yard mark of 22.4 seconds.

Hiram Crane, also of Linfield, threw the javelin for a record 209 feet, 5 inches, and Loren Michel of Lewis and Clark set a discus record of 153 feet, 4 inches.

Boxing Gloves To See Baseball Deemed For Fan

CHICAGO (AP) — Edward Murphy who possesses a pair of the fastest hands in the country, has been trying all season to see the Chicago White Sox play baseball.

Six times he's taken himself out to Comiskey Park. Each time two burly fans have pitched him out.

But he's still trying. And next time — Monday night, when the league-leading Sox open a home stand against Kansas City — he's sure he'll get in.

He'll be wearing a pair of boxing gloves — 16-ouncers, tightly laced.

They're for protection — of the other fans.

Murphy, 70, is one of the finest "cannon" in the history of Chicago. That is by his own modest admission — and by that of some excellent authority, the Chicago Police Department.

He Picks Pockets

A cannon is a pickpocket.

Detectives John Hill and James Adams, who are detailed to Comiskey Park, are the gentlemen who have been denying Murphy admission.

However, they said yesterday they would relent — if Murphy donned the boxing gloves.

"There's no other way that I'll get to watch those red hot Sox," he told a reporter. "If I don't have those gloves on, those guys Hill and Adams, will have me in the police station instead of in the bleachers. I can't convince them that I am not working unless I wear the gloves."

I no sooner get off a streetcar at the park than those two guys are calling the wagon for me. So my lawyer, Isadore Goldstein, suggested I wear the gloves at the park."

Police Record Long

Detectives Hill and Adams displayed Murphy's police record — a two-page listing which shows arrests for picking pockets in almost every major city in the country.

However, Murphy says, "I've retired."

"He can go to the ball game," Hill said, "but we'll be there, too."

And remember, the detective added, pointing his heavy finger at light-fingered Murphy, "16-ounce gloves, nothing lighter, and keep them laced tight."

"Or in the wagon you go."

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Records Fall In Coliseum Relays At L.A.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — John Landy's world record in the mile run still is intact today and the 17th annual memorial Coliseum Relays came off like the 3-ring circus it was expected to be, with these results:

Merv Lincoln of Australia proved to be the best of a select cast of four sub-4-minute milers and captured the intriguing feature in a time of 4:01.0.

Half-mile Tom Courtney smashed the world 880-yard record, and in the process flattened arch rival Arnie Sowell, with a time of 1:46.8.

The University of Texas sprint relay teams broke the existing world records and approached their pending records in the 440 and 880 yard relays.

Occidental college's 4-man team set a new world record in the 2-mile relay, an event not too prominent in track and field meets.

Crowd Sees Event

A whopping crowd of 43,955 turned out in 60-degree weather. The miracle-mile held the spotlight — until Courtney cut loose anyhow — and while Landy's record of 3:58 was not threatened, nor was the 4-minute time barrier, the four runners from abroad gave the fans a great competitive race.

Lincoln won handily with a closing rush from 200 yards out that put England's Brian Hewson in second place, with a time of 4:01.4.

Laszlo Tabari, Hungary's great distance man, took third in 4:01.6, and Derek Ibbotson of England, the pre-race favorite, faded to third after using up his strength setting the pace for three and a half laps. His time was 4:02.1.

Americans Fade

America's challengers offered little competition, although Jerome Walters and Joe Villareal were in early contention.

"We all forgot about the clock. Everybody was just trying to win," Lincoln explained. "Running a mile in four minutes is a super-human effort, not something easy like buttering a piece of bread."

Courtney, formerly of Fordham and, like Sowell, now in the Army, broke the world mark of 1:47.5 set in 1955 by Lon Spurrier, ex-California runner.

Bobby Morrow of Abilene Christian easily whipped a mediocre field in the 100 yard dash with a time of 9.4.
