

Two Go To Trial In Dynamiting Negro Churches

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP)—Trial of two young white men charged with dynamiting Negro churches in a wave of terrorism last January opens today in Circuit Court.

Police said the bombings, part of a series of seven and six shootings at city buses were intended to intimidate Negroes. They followed racial integration of city buses Dec. 21 on federal court order.

Raymond C. Britt Jr., 27, and Sonny Kyle Livingston Jr., 18, were indicted on charges that carry maximum sentences of 10 years imprisonment each.

Their attorneys were expected to ask for separate trials.

Two other white men, James D. York, 32, and Henry Alexander, 27, were indicted on the capital charge of dynamiting the home of the Rev. Ralph D. Abernathy while his wife and child slept in bed. No injuries were reported.

Boycott Head Figures

Abernathy is vice president of the Montgomery Improvement Assn., which conducted the year-long Negro bus boycott that ended with the federal ban on bus segregation.

York and Alexander pleaded innocent and asked separate trials on the charge.

Britt was indicted on counts of bombing Abernathy's church, the Negro First Baptist and the Hutchinson St. Baptist Church early Jan. 10, and a taxicab stand on the morning of Jan. 27. Livingston was indicted in connection with the Hutchinson St. Church dynamiting.

13 Of U. S. Legation Told To Quit Hungary

BUDAPEST (AP)—Hungary's Communist regime says 13 members of the U. S. legation in Budapest—more than a third of the staff—must leave within six weeks.

The order was sent to Charge d'Affaires N. Spencer Barnes. Diplomats had not attended any official Hungarian functions in six months—since Russian tanks intervened in last fall's rebellion.

The U. S. legation was singled out, although other Western diplomatic missions have also boycotted Hungarian government affairs.

One reason may be that the U. S. mission is the largest in Budapest of any country except Russia.

The U. S. staff includes 21 foreign service officers and 13 non-diplomatic personnel such as legation guards. Nine diplomats and four non-diplomats will have to leave.

Haiti Remains Tense Despite New President

PORT AU PRINCE, Haiti (AP)—Unofficial sources reported nearly 100 dead and wounded in the bitter weekend struggle for power in this Negro republic.

With a new provisional president in power, the third in two months, this strikebound capital struggled back to some semblance of normality. Hundreds of shops, stores and factories reopened upon appeals from Daniel Fignole, the new provisional president, and rival presidential candidate Louis Deliole to "remain calm and resume your normal work."

There still was an air of tension, however.

After taking the oath, Fignole issued a proclamation promising quick "free and honest" elections. He assailed dictatorships and promised to restore law and order and preserve good relations with the United States.

Two Killed, 7 Wounded In Pocket Line Battle

GUNTERSVILLE, Ala. (AP)—Two men were killed and seven others wounded Monday in a pocket line battle on a construction job here.

Police Chief Dock Morrow said apparently the shooting began when nonstriking workers sought to remove a barricade at the entrance to the Cotton Producers Assn. feed mill, being built by the Gulf States Construction Co., Atlanta.

The dead were William Clinton Haralson, 32, Albertville, Ala., and John Leroy Ward, Parsons, Kan.

Square Deal For Cons Urged By Pope Pius

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Pope Pius XII has advocated a Christian square deal for convicts, but warned against destroying the salutary effects of their punishment by excessive coddling.

The pontiff expressed his views at a special audience Sunday for Italian jurists and members of societies for the aid of convicts.

120 Deaths In Traffic Memorial Day Guess

CHICAGO (AP)—An estimated 120 Americans will die in traffic accidents Memorial Day, says the National Safety Council.

The council's estimate is for the 30-hour holiday period from 6 p.m. Wednesday until midnight Thursday.

"Unless the extra dangers of holiday traffic are met with extra care and caution, we estimate that 120 persons will be killed on the highways in the holiday period," the council said.

"This compares with an immediate death toll of 75 for a non-holiday Thursday at this time of the year."

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Scared Witnesses' Silence Stymies Acid-Hurling Case

NEW YORK (AP)—The Federal government Monday dropped immediate trial of its case against John (Johnny Dio) DiGiorgio and three others in the acid-blasting of labor writer Victor Riesel because key witnesses refused to testify.

U. S. Atty. Paul W. Williams, in asking that the case be removed from the trial calendar in U. S. District Court, said this "does not close the book" but is inviting an acquittal.

Williams told the court that the witnesses' refusal to talk "reflects the power of the underworld."

"May I say that it may be gangster ethics but it is not the kind of ethics the Department of Justice will tolerate," Williams told Judge William B. Herlands.

DiGiorgio sat in the courtroom, occasionally smiling slightly.

The two key witnesses, Gondolfo Miranti and Domenico Bando, previously convicted in one phase of the case, were given additional sentences for contempt in refusing to answer questions before a federal grand jury.

Riesel was blinded by acid thrown into his face as he walked out of Lindy's Broadway restaurant April 5, 1956. The assault apparently was intended to prevent him from testifying before a grand jury investigating racketeering.

The prosecution contended the acid was hurled by Abe Telvi, who later was slain, presumably to silence him.

Dio was charged with conspiring to obstruct justice by trying to prevent Riesel from testifying.

and entered the bedroom where his father lay dead.

It wasn't until he came out of the bedroom that he noticed the woman. Then he summoned the doctor and Winslow. The sheriff's office and state police were notified soon afterward.

Two guns were used.

Maupin's death was caused by a bullet from a .30 Savage rifle. The bullet entered his back and came out through the top of his chest and nicked his right arm. The bullet was found on the bed.

Mrs. Miller was wounded by a 22-caliber bullet fired from the top barrel of a .22-410 over-and-under pistol. She was shot through the upper chest. She was unconscious when found.

No Inquest Planned

Coroner L. L. Powers, after an autopsy Sunday afternoon, said Maupin could have lived only a few minutes after the bullet severed a major artery above the heart.

Powers said there will be no inquest.

Maupin was living in a house he had recently sold to Floyd Githens, an automobile dealer whose business is at the same intersection. He had planned to stay there until about July 1, his sons said.

The body was brought to Roseburg for the autopsy, then returned to Mills Funeral Home, Dr. Maupin also is survived by a sister and five brothers, whose names and addresses weren't learned immediately.

The sheriff's office was continuing the investigation today.

Road Dept. Employees Petition For Pay Boost

The Douglas County Court has been petitioned for a 15-cent basic wage raise for employees of the road department.

Leo Butts, Portland, business manager for the Oregon Public Employees Council, told The News-Review today that the road employees have asked a hearing on the matter. Butts said he sent a letter to the court Friday asking for the hearing.

He said the raise would bring the hourly wage rate for laborers up to \$2 an hour. He said that compared with the prevailing rate of \$2.35 in the construction field, but pointed out that other benefits derived from public employment would compensate for the difference.

Other classifications of employment in the road department would receive raises in about the same ratio, Butts said.

Road employees weren't given a raise in the recently completed 1957-58 budget. Butts said he thinks there is money enough to provide for the boost.
