Administration Given Fresh Rap By Sen. Morse

NEW YORK — Sen. Morse (D-Ore.) received the David L. Cienfuegos Award Saturday from the Workers Defense League, an organization dedicated to the defense of the rights of labor.

Then the senator lashed into the Eisenhower administration, repeating his charges of Republican give-aways in public power and other fields.

Morse described the administration as the "most anti-federalist... in the history of our nation."

"The so-called states' rights," he added, "applies the argument of the state's right issue to any federal legislation, even when it has no standing."

On Sunday Morse appeared on the ABC television program "Mike Wallace Interview," and accused the Eisenhower administration of giving away "millions of dollars of interest-free money" to big business.

He said that in this respect, the administration can be compared to Teamsters President Dave Beck's "dipping" into his union treasury for interest-free loans. There is "no difference in ethics" employed by the Eisenhower administration and Beck, Morse said.

The senator added that he had never made comparisons between Eisenhower and Beck on a personal basis.

BOMB KILLS STUDENTS

HAVANA, Cuba — Two students were killed and a third injured Sunday night when a bomb they were carrying in their car exploded in Santa Clara in central Cuba. The dead were identified as Agustin Gomez Urioste, 19, and Julio Pino Machado, 22, medical students at the University of Havana.

Situation Tense In Taipei After Anti-U. S. Riot

TAIPEI, Formosa — Uneasiness persisted in Taipei's American colony Monday despite outward appearance of calm.

Normal life was shattered in the wake of Friday's anti-American riots. Many persons feared that only the continued presence of Nationalist troops prevented a fresh outbreak.

In addition to Taipei, four other Formosan cities where Americans live have now been put under martial law. They are Taichung, Tainan, Chial and the port city of Keelung.

The English-language China News condemned the riots as uncivilized and disgraceful to the Chinese people. But other Formosan newspapers continued to urge the Nationalist government to press for an agreement giving it jurisdiction over criminal offenses committed in off-duty hours by U.S. military personnel.

Americans hesitated to drive their cars, fearing an angry mob might materialize if they were involved in an accident with a Chinese.

President Chiang Kai-shek directed police to intensify a hunt for agitators the authorities blamed for stirring up Friday's violent demonstrations.

CONTRACT AWARDED

PORTLAND — The Corps of Engineers Saturday awarded the R & P Contractors, Inc., of Shelton, Wash., a \$137,450 contract for clearing 475 acres at the Hills Creek Reservoir on the middle fork of the Willamette River. The project is five miles south-east of Oakridge.

NOTED ACTRESS DIES

LONDON — Julia Neilson-Terry, star of the London stage in the nineties and a member of one of Britain's great theatrical families, died Monday. She was 88. She had been seriously ill since falling at her London home last Tuesday.

New Marine Weapon Contracted By Navy

WASHINGTON — The Navy Monday announced award of a two-million-dollar contract for development of a new high-speed torpedo and guidance system designed to attack both submarines and surface ships.

The contract has been given to the Baltimore ordnance department of Westinghouse Electric Corp. Presumably, the torpedo is intended for use by atomic-powered submarines.

The announcement contained little detail, other than that the torpedo "is to be capable of destroying submarines as well as surface vessels."

EDINBURGH, Scotland — The General Assembly of the Church of Scotland Monday put part of the blame for juvenile delinquency on smoking. It said some young people with the addiction will steal to get cigarettes.

Lumber Slumps Eased With Better Weather

EUGENE — The downward pressure on lumber prices has eased somewhat as rains and soggy roads curtailed supplies of sawlogs, resulting in decreased production.

That was the report Saturday of Random Lengths, the weekly lumber market news letter.

The stud market was reported relatively quiet with most mills striving to keep production in line with limited sales.

The letter said the pine market is undergoing a downward trend generally, and only Idaho white pine and top grade ponderosa commons show any signs of strength.

A market increasing demand for plywood sheathing was reported, but the \$72 base price for sanded stock was holding fast.

645 STOLEN

Sixty-five dollars in currency was stolen Friday from his cabin in the South Roseburg Motel, Walter E. Thackeray complained to Roseburg police. He said Army papers also were stolen from a billfold which he had left in a dressing room.

Eisenhower's Budget Evokes GOP Criticism

TRENTON, N. J. — A five-state conference committee of Republican leaders Saturday disregarded word from the White House and criticized the size and presentation of the federal budget.

The criticism came in the face of a speech Friday night by Sherman Adams, President Eisenhower's right hand man. Adams told the conference that Republicans must rally behind the administration ballot, or go back on their word.

Republican National Chairman Meade Alcorn told a news conference ended this noon that the group criticized the size of the \$11.8 billion dollar budget recommended by Eisenhower.

But he said "the greatest amount of criticism was on the method of presentation. They (the committee) felt it could have been handled without controversy."

Alcorn said the conference—last in a series of six throughout the nation—was the first to specifically

criticize the way the budget was given out to the people. He explained that during the early stages after presentation of the budget "comments were made by high persons in both parties... and there was so much confusion." The majority of the committee, Alcorn said, also disagreed with the President by opposing further extension of federal aid to education and federal grants-in-aid.

Tranquilizing Drugs, Alcohol Will Not Mix

PITTSBURGH, — A physician warned Saturday that alcohol and certain tranquilizing drugs don't mix.

The combination produces "violent emotional disturbances," said Dr. Gilmore M. Sanes, an associate editor of the Allegheny County Medical Society Bulletin.

"The hazard of an individual driving an automobile under these conditions is beyond the stretch of imagination," Dr. Sanes wrote in a bulletin editorial.

Dr. Sanes denounced the excessive use of tranquilizers and said "one wonders whether or not we will become a nation of somber-faced, heavy-eyed individuals napping at voodipills and all of us having a somewhat dulled emotional level."

He criticized the sale of tranquilizers without prescription, permissible in some states. Persons who are fundamentally unstable, Dr. Sanes said, can "overdose themselves to the point of acute depression."

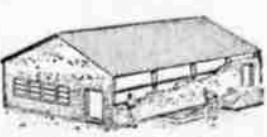
