

Morey Leads Americans In British Meet

FORMBY, England (U.P.) — Dale Morey of Indianapolis, making his first appearance this year in the British amateur golf championship, breezed into the fourth round Tuesday with an easy second round victory and a default.

Morey, top favorite in the U.S. contingent, whipped Ernest Crimes, a little-known English player, 4 and 3, in the second round Tuesday with an easy second round victory and a default.

McHale, Strafaci and two American servicemen, Lt. Gene P. Eyler of Olean, N.Y., and Master Sgt. Harold B. Ridgeley of Havertown, Pa., won their second round matches Tuesday. Gene Andrews of Pacific Palisades, Calif., former U.S. public links champion, and John H. Selby of Rye, N.Y., were the late Monday winners.

Ridgeley, a 43-year-old Army man, shot some of the day's best golf with a 32 on the front nine of the seaside 6,800-yard Formby links as he defeated Peter Flaherty of England, 5 and 4.

This was one better than the 33 fired by Sandy Sinclair of Scotland enroute to a 4 and 2 victory over Bob Roos of San Francisco. And it was hardly less surprising than the defeat of 1953 champion Joe Carr of Ireland.

Carr, a top contender in this tournament every year since World War II, lost out to Gerald Micklem, British Walker Cup Captain, by a surprising 3 and 2 margin.

McHale played excellent golf in eliminating Lt. Col. W. J. B. Armstrong of England, 7 and 6. Strafaci scrambled to a 3 and 2 victory over Cecil Beamish of Ireland.

Eyler, who has made a good showing in previous British amateurs, defeated C. G. Moore of England, 3 and 1.

Local Guard Unit Wins Battalion

The 30-calibre rifle team of Roseburg's National Guard Co. D. outshot five other companies in the annual first battalion shoot of the regiment, held Sunday, to take the 1957 battalion championship here.

The championship is the second in two weeks for the local company. A week ago, a pistol team came in first in competition at Medford.

Cornell Seeks Husky Regatta Participation

NEW YORK (U.P.) — Cornell's Stork Sanford is only one victory away from his first unbeaten season in 21 games and he wants to complete the sweep the hard way — against Washington's all-winning Huskies in the Intercollegiate Rowing Assn. (IRA) championships, June 22.

"I certainly hope the NCAA will reconsider and let Washington come East, raise the towering coach, Washington alumnus, Tuesday. 'Without them it takes interest away from the IRA.'"

Cornell and Washington are the only remaining unbeaten eight in the country. Cornell has whipped all of the eastern IRA entrants, some several times. Washington has cleaned up the West Coast.

At the moment Washington, with its first powerhouse crew in several years, is banned from post-season events because of NCAA penalties stemming from the school's illegal payments to football players.

The NCAA Council meets in Chicago Friday and Saturday and is expected to hear a new Washington protest.

Although Washington has participated in the "Poughkeepsie" regatta — now held at Syracuse, N.Y. on Onondaga Lake — for about 50 years, the school is not a member of the IRA and has to be invited to compete — an almost automatic move.

Following the NCAA's ban, the IRA did not extend the invitation to Washington this year. But if the council lifts the bars on Washington, an invitation will be sent quickly, IRA sources indicated.

The pace-setting Vancouver Mounties take on the second place Hollywood Stars again Tuesday night with a full two games separating the Pacific Coast League's top contenders.

The Mounties, the league's tail-enders in 1956 who have won 11 of their last 13 games, sailed past the Stars 6-2 Monday night in the only PCL game scheduled.

George Bamberger went the distance for his seventh win against two losses and was never in serious trouble as his mates backed him with fine defensive play in the series opener.

The Canadians scored three runs — enough to win — in the first inning on two walks issued

by Curt Raydon, an error by Paul Pettit and singles by Jim Marshall and Joe Frazier.

Bamberger held the Stars scoreless until the ninth when Carlos Bernier and Joe Duham singled and Peter Smith tripled.

The triumph put Bamberger, a righthander, at the top of the league's batters with a .337 average. Ben Daniels has won six. At the end of the week Raydon, nicked for Monday night's loss, led the loop's pitchers with an earned run average of 1.53 and had the most strikeouts, 46.

Shortstop Carl (Buddy) Peterson of Vancouver paces the league's batters with a .337 average and 59 base hits in 175 times at bat. Seattle's Joe Taylor leads in home runs with 11 and runs batted in with 40.
