Administration Policies Blamed For Oregon Ills

WASHINGTON — Oregon's economic ills were attributed Monday by Rep. Porter (D-Ore) to the Eisenhower administration's fiscal policies.

Republican members of the House Small Business Committee, before which Porter testified, called his statement partisan. The committee is looking into financing problems of small business.

Referring to the troubles of Oregon's lumber industry because of the slackoff in home construction, Porter told the committee: "After a lot of reflection, I have come to the opinion the tight money policy is effecting a concerted squeeze upon the little businessman and is discriminating against an entire industry which is largely made up of relatively small concerns."

Unless some change is made, he said, "we can expect a continuation of the upward trend in small business failures and bankruptcies and in the eradication of independent business by mergers into ever larger and larger establishments."

Porter said Oregon has need for more pulp mills but that such plants cannot be financed under the present \$250,000 loan ceiling of the Small Business Administration. He said he favors, and is preparing an amendment to effect, a return to a lending program similar to that of the now-defunct Reconstruction Finance Corp.

Mrs. George Aker was presented with a past presidents pin, and Mrs. Tom Bailey was installed as two-year trustee.

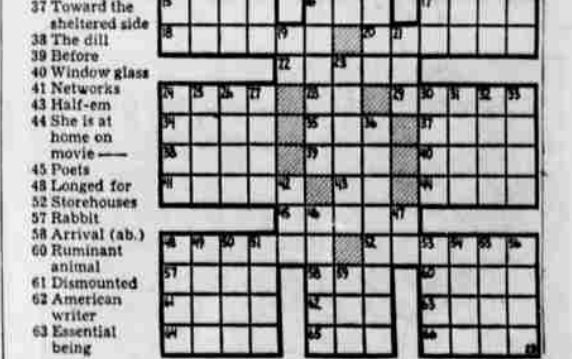
New Correspondent
