### Seaton Defends Gray's Tax Writeoff Decision

against issuance of the certificates and would do so again." Meanwhile, Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) accused the administration of "still playing a fast and loose game with the water resources of the Columbia River Basin."

Neuberger made the statement in a prepared Senate speech in which he said President Eisenhower had rejected as "prematuring" a request by seven Pacific Northwest Democratic senators for a personal conference to discuss water and power policy, including Hells Canyon Dam.

Neuberger said that in Eisenhower's reply to the request, "the incredible confusion of administrative policy for Columbia Basin power and flood control development was laid bare."

Neuberger said the meeting had been sought "as a last desperate plea to the President of our country to help us save the finest remaining water power site in North America." He urged Eisenhower to reconsider.

From ODM Wednesday came a report of new assurances by Idaho Power that the two dams under construction will be in operation by Dec. 31, 1958. That is the deadline which the Brownlee and Oxbow dams on the Snake must be completed to qualify for the fast tax writeoff.

Gray said he was told by President E. Roach of Idaho Power: "Our firm plans are to have both Brownlee and Oxbow on the line by the end of 1958."

The subcommittee resumed hearings amid speculation that Congress may be asked to invalidate the fast tax writeoff.

Sen. Bridges (R-NH) said the question of whether to offer legislation which would rescind the writeoff was discussed at two major Republican meetings Tuesday.

He said the topic came up at a conference between President Eisenhower and GOP congressional leaders, and also at a session of the Senate Republican Policy Committee. No decision was reached.

Adding to this new public-private power controversy, Sen. Morse (D-Ore.) charged in a Senate speech that the administration had "suppressed" a letter written by Secretary of the Interior Seaton, who recommended against the tax writeoff for Idaho Power.

The letter was addressed to Gordon Gray, head of the Office of Defense Mobilization and the official who approved the write-off. Gray issued certificates allowing the company to take large income tax deductions for depreciation over a five-year period.

In a Senate subcommittee hearing Monday, it was disclosed that Seaton had objected to the fast tax writeoff on March 11. Seaton's position was that the issuance of the certificate could mean the government would have to borrow money, and pay interest on it, which would not have to be borrowed if taxes were collected from the company on a normal basis.

Gray testified he had ignored Seaton's recommendation on the grounds it was an expression of opinion.

In attacking the writeoff, Morse said the case is "a shocking story of political immorality." He said White House staff and Gray decided to put the lid of secrecy on Seaton's letter.

He specifically named presidential aides Sherman Adams and Howard Pyle.

"We are building up another Dixey-Yates," Morse continued. "The President should start cleaning his house because the case lends right to his door. If he is not responsible for Adams, Pyle and Gray, who is?"

As to the Seaton letter, Gray said in his subcommittee appearance he had been advised previously that the communication was subject to "executive privilege" against disclosure of communications between government officials.

But he said he later was advised the letter could be submitted to Congress, and that he then turned it over to the subcommittee.

Sen. Kefauver (D-Tenn.) said he believed Gray had no intention of producing the Seaton letter "until you found out that this subcommittee had a copy from Interior."

### Sens. Morse And Capehart Exchange Verbal Brickbats

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senators Morse (D-Ore.) and Capehart (R-Ind.) called each other names last night in a bombastic exchange on the Senate floor.

But after the air cleared, they agreed to strike some of the remarks from the record. Under Senate rules, senators aren't supposed to insult each other.

However, in the final windup, Capehart let his remarks about Morse stand in the record, published Wednesday, as they were made. Morse expunged his reference to Capehart as "a cup of rancid ignorance." He had said Tuesday night he considered this "uncalled for."

Morse touched off the exchange in the empty chamber when he took the floor to protest the GOP assault on him last week. That came after he had said President Eisenhower and Teamster

### Gatherings Banned After Taipei Riot

TAIPEI (AP) — Unauthorized gatherings, demonstrations and strikes Wednesday were banned in Taipei in a further aftermath of the anti-American riots.

At the same time part of the three Nationalist army divisions rushed into the city Friday to restore peace and order were moved to the outskirts. Military authorities said they would be readily available if needed.

The new troop disposition reflected a distinct easing in the situation in the Nationalist capital, where rioters wrecked the U.S. embassy and information service building after an American Army court-martial acquitted a sergeant who killed a Chinese he said was peeping into his wife's bathroom.

Martial law and a midnight-to-dawn curfew were in force. But some quarters predicted the curfew would be lifted within a week or so if the present progress toward normality continued.

Nationalist troops continued to guard American establishments and homes. Similar protection was provided for other embassies and legations.

### Former Chaplain Dies In Portland Hospital

PORTLAND (AP) — Death came in a hospital here Tuesday to the Rev. Thomas M. Baxter, 65, of Woodburn, a former chaplain for state institutions in Marion County.

He retired as chaplain three years ago because of poor health, but after that aided the Rev. George H. Swift, rector of St. Paul's Church in Salem. He once served at several Episcopal churches in Portland.

The Rev. Mr. Baxter, a native of Chicago, came to Western Oregon in 1944, after seven years as rector at Baker.

Funeral services will be held Friday at Salem.

Survivors include the widow, Mrs. David of Portland and Harris of Minneapolis, and daughters Janet of Lakeview and Dorothy, a student at Lewis and Clark College.

Denmark Won't Accept Atomic Supplies Offer COPENHAGEN (AP) — Premier H. C. Hansen told Parliament Wednesday Denmark's new government would not accept an offer of atomic ammunition "under the present circumstances."

The Socialist premier did not rule out conventionally armed weapons, which could be fitted with nuclear warheads, the kind of modern weapons NATO members expect to get from the United States.
