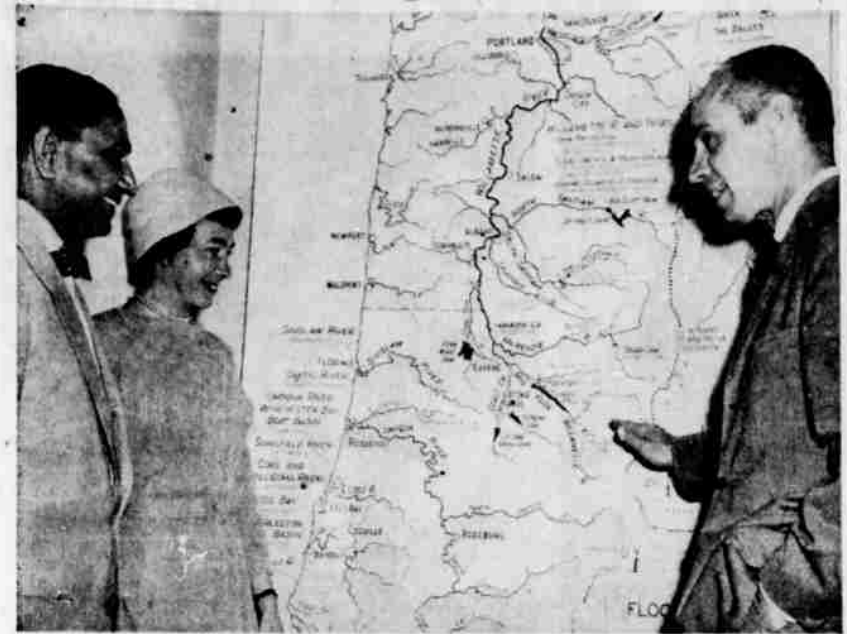


Miss Chandler Meets With Pakistan Representative

A West Pakistan legislator met a former Douglas County home extension agent in a Washington, D. C., congressional office last week. Middle East and U.S.A. got along fine.

The meeting between Helen Chandler, recently appointed by the International Cooperation Administration to spend two years in West Pakistan, and Mian Mohammed Shafi of Lahore was arranged by Rep. Charles O. Porter (D-Ore.).

Legislator Shafi is in the United States as a guest of the State Department under the foreign leader exchange program. A slight, energetic balding man, Shafi is editor of "Iqdam," a weekly Urdu newspaper. He will be in the States for about 45 days and already has begun a tour of the

country. He will go to all areas of the nation with the possible exception of the Northwest.

Fluent in English, the 43-year-old independent politician had a variety of information to give Miss Chandler. Obviously impressed by her earnestness and interest, he told her and Porter that his country would welcome the home economist.

"There is a very great respect within my country for people of your nation," he observed, adding that "America is a great ally."

He then advised Miss Chandler to contact the "lady principal" of the girls' school in Lyallpur, where she is to be headquartered, in order to learn the language of the area. Lyallpur is about 85 miles from Lahore.

Lots of simple political know-how were forthcoming from Shafi who has been jailed twice for political agitation — once by the British and more recently by his own government. He describes himself as the son of a poor farmer who has been "chiseled out of a lump of clay." Shafi attended school over the protestations of his father, who preferred that he remain on the tiny acreage and help care for the oxen.

Quickly adapting to classwork, Shafi won scholarships with ease and soon established a reputation for brilliance. Today, as he "always has," he represents the poor class of his constituency. He campaigns on foot and bicycle and as a legislator earns the equivalent of 10 American dollars as a monthly salary.
