Members of the English Settlement Circle served a luncheon.

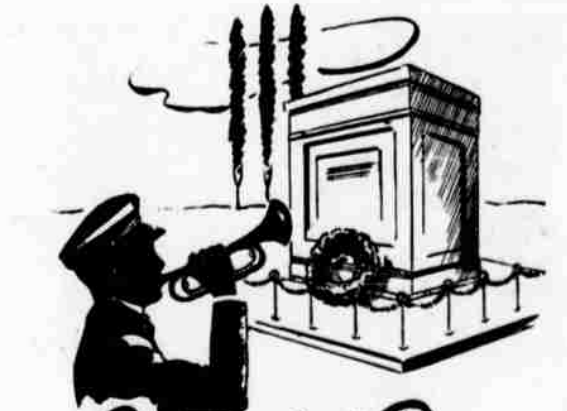
Lions Auxiliary Group At Canyonville Elects
