Amateur Rose Growers To Vie Saturday For Sweepstakes Trophy In Local Show

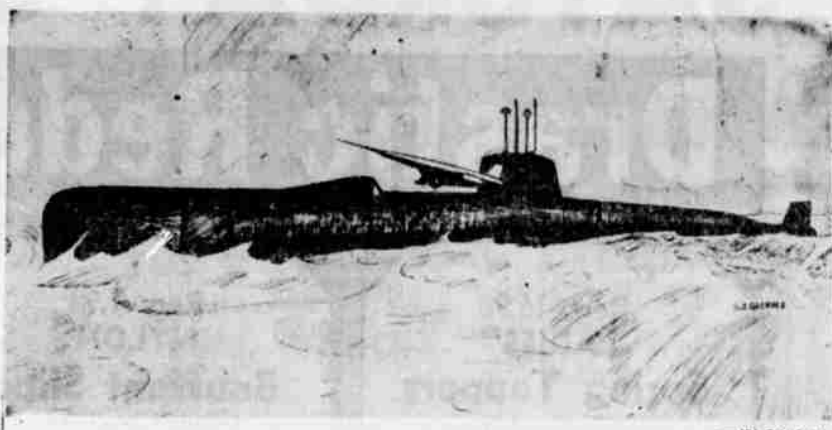
A sweepstakes trophy will be awarded in the second annual Roseburg Rose Society Show scheduled for Saturday at 10 a.m. in St. George's Parish hall.

The sweepstakes trophy will be awarded by a Roseburg jewelry store to the person whose rose is judged to be the finest in the first division. Winner of the trophy must put it up in competition next year. A silver trophy, replica of the sweepstakes trophy will also be presented to the winner.

Persons can start setting up their exhibits at 7, and the exhibits must be finished by 10 a.m. The event is open to all amateur rose growers. Roy K. Byrd, society president, said.

DIVISION I
Tess, hybrid, Class 2 — three roses of one variety.
Section A, white or near-white roses: Class 1 — one rose, Class 2 — three roses of one variety.
Section B, yellow or near-yellow roses: Class 1 — one rose, Class 2 — three roses of one variety.
Section C, red or near-red roses: Class 1 — one rose, Class 2 — three roses of one variety.
Section D, pink roses: Class 1 — one rose, Class 2 — three roses of one variety.
Section E, multi-colored roses: Class 1 — one rose, Class 2 — three roses of one variety.

DIVISION II
Section A, Polyantha and Floribunda, one flower cluster to be considered as an individual, side buds permissible, stems to be of current season's growth: Class 1 — one cluster red roses, one variety, Class 2 — three clusters red roses, one variety, Class 3 — three clusters red roses, one variety, Class 4 — three clusters red roses, one variety.
Section B, grandiflora: Class 1 — one cluster of any one variety, Class 2 — three clusters of any one variety.
Section C, single and semi-double species and moss roses, one cluster or a single flower to be considered as an individual, side buds permissible, stems to be of current season's growth: Class 1 — one cluster of one bloom, Class 2 — three clusters or three individual roses of one variety.
Section D, double-flowered climbing or pillar roses, side buds permissible, stems to be of current season's growth: Class 1 — small-flowered climbers, one cluster, Class 2 — large-flowered climbers, one cluster, Class 3 — small-flowered climbers, one bloom lateral, Class 4 — large-flowered climbers, one bloom lateral.
DIVISION III
Decorative arrangements, open to all amateurs actively engaged in floral art, floral arrangements work; plant materials must have been grown outdoors and arrangements made without professional assistance; to be exhibited in own containers; accessories permissible; arrangements made with roses predominating.
Section A, Miniature, not to exceed three inches.
Section B, Living room arrangements, 10-18 inches high.
Section C, Coffee table arrangements, 10-18 inches high.
Section D, Dining table arrangements, free standing, to be judged from all sides.
DIVISION IV
Irwin Bessell Trophy
Section A, Three full-blown roses, hybrid teas, any one variety.
DIVISION V
Junior Division
This is a special division created for the benefit and encouragement of exhibitors of grade and high school age. Exhibitors may be made by individual or classroom as a whole.
Section A, Class 1 — arrangement of miniature roses; Class 2 — arrangement of hybrid tea or floribunda roses.
DIVISION VI
Rose Paintings
Section A, student: Class 1 — rose painting done in oil, Class 2 — rose painting or drawing other than in oil.
Section B, adult: Class 1 — rose painting done in oil, Class 2 — rose painting or drawing other than in oil.
DIVISION VII
Old Rose Division
This division for Rose Society members and their immediate families only; special awards by Will Robinson, rose specialist, Watsonville, Calif.
Section A, Class 1 — bouquet of eight or more blooms of any named varieties. An old rose is considered to be one introduced prior to 1900.

Differences Of Opinion Given On Nuclear Fallout

WASHINGTON (AP) — A bone specialist told Congress Wednesday man may already be on the verge of overloading the atmosphere with nuclear weapon offshoots which can cause cancer.

He was Dr. William F. Neuman of the University of Rochester Medical School, who told a Senate-House Atomic Energy subcommittee that if some prominent scientists are right about the

amount of strontium 90 human bones can stand the world is close to the point where weapons tests must be cut to a minimum.

WASHINGTON (AP) — An Atomic Energy Commission (AEC) official said Wednesday some of the radiation increases that have scared some people since H-bomb tests began are too small to flutter a Geiger counter.

Merrill Eisenbud, manager of the AEC's New York operations office, said the strontium 90 from bomb tests that an average American would get in a 70-year lifetime would increase the natural radioactivity in his bones by only a small fraction. He said conservative estimates put the increase at from 1% to 18 per cent.

Eisenbud told a Senate-House Atomic Energy subcommittee studying fallout dangers that it is true tests of milk samples since April, 1954, show a tenfold increase in strontium 90—a substance produced in nuclear explosions which can cause bone cancer if concentrated. But he said he would not hesitate to let his own children drink the milk.

Compared with the natural radioactivity in all milk, Eisenbud said, the additional amount of strontium 90 is so small that delicate chemical methods are needed to show it. An ordinary Geiger counter, he said, couldn't tell the difference between milk before and after the fallout increase.

Eisenbud said he is "not at all apprehensive" of what would happen to humanity of bomb testing continued at the present rate.

ITU Votes Down Plan For Special Strike Fund

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Members of the International Typographical Union have voted down proposals to raise a special \$500,000 strike benefit fund and add 50 cents a month to their assessments.

Union officials at headquarters here said the idea of creating an extra strike fund by assessing members an added 1 per cent of earnings for three months was beaten by a mail vote of 42,622 to 26,080. Members already pay one-half of 1 per cent for the strike fund.

The suggestion to raise monthly assessments from \$5 to \$6.50 was voted down by a count of 41,471 to 38,007. It was the second defeat in six months for the proposal, which included 10 cents for the printers' home at Colorado Springs, Colo.

Steeplejack Is Killed In Fall From Steeple

PORTLAND (AP) — A steeplejack was killed Wednesday in a 100-foot fall from the top of the Immaculate Heart Church steeple here.

Police said that as the steeplejack, Dewey Carpenter, 31, fell he brushed against a painter who was working on a metal porch jutting out from the upper part of the church.

The painter, Jack L. Young, said he was nearly knocked from the porch.

Young told police that he told Carpenter, who was preparing the steeple for painting, that he thought a cable loop to which the steeplejack hooked his boat-swain's chair looked rusty.

Young said Carpenter replied that it was strong enough, and would hold. Shortly after, the cable broke, and Carpenter plunged to his death.

JIM THORPE, Pa. (AP) — Notables from the world of sports joined relatives and friends Thursday as a crowd of 5,000 persons witnessed the dedication of the mausoleum of the great American Indian athlete, Jim Thorpe.

The 20-ton block of Minnesota red granite was unveiled by three daughters and three Thorpe grandchildren in a wooded strip of land near a busy highway in this Eastern Pennsylvania community which changed its name in tribute to the versatile athlete.

On hand were officers from the Army installation at Carlisle, Pa., once an Indian school where Thorpe made collegiate football history.

Willie Shoemaker Up Saturday In Races

With Memorial Day's rich stakes history, racing fans turned their attention today to Willie Shoemaker and Gallant Man, the Texas-owned colt who almost won the Kentucky Derby.

The shoe, who admitted misjudging the Derby finish and lost to the Calumet Farm's Iron Liege by a nose, rides Gallant Man again tomorrow in the \$25,000-added Peter Pan Handicap at Belmont Park.

The Peter Pan, at a mile and one-eighth, is a stepping stone to the \$100,000 Belmont Stakes, third and final jewel in the triple crown for 3-year olds.

The mile and one-half of the Belmont on June 15 is expected to provide another battle involving Bold Ruler, who upset Iron Liege in the Preakness, Gallant Man and Iron Liege if his sore shins respond to treatment.

Iron Liege turned up a trifle lame after winning the Jersey Stakes at Garden State Park a week ago.

The high spots of Memorial Day racing at 13 tracks, where 347,763 fans wagered \$20,440,749, were at Belmont and Hollywood Parks.

A crowd of 64,708 at Hollywood Park saw Travis M. Kerr's Round Table, third in the Kentucky Derby, come back with an easy victory against 3-year old rivals after running an excellent second against Social Climber in his previous starts. He won the \$28,450 Will Rogers Stakes with a 1:34 2-3 clocking for the mile.

Ralph Neves sent the Oklahoma-owned colt across the finish line four lengths in front of Joe Price to pay \$2.50 straight.

New York's biggest crowd of 1957, a turnout of 50,435, jammed into refurbished Belmont and saw Portersville get up in the final strides for victory over Dedicate in the \$38,900 Carver.

Portland Lawyer Gets Suspension For Year

SALEM (AP) — Franz E. Wagner, Portland lawyer, was suspended from law practice for a year Wednesday because he had pleaded guilty to failure to file federal income tax returns in 1952, 1953 and 1954.

The suspension was ordered by the state Supreme Court on recommendation of the board of governors of the Oregon State Bar.

The court said the offense could not be overlooked because of the need for maintaining high standards of professional conduct among lawyers.

Justice William M. McAllister dissented, voting in favor of permanent disbarment.

TURKEYS INFECTED

SALEM (AP) — State Agriculture Department veterinarians Tuesday destroyed 2,400 turkeys at the Max Lyons farm on Sauvie Island because they were infected by ornithosis.

The state will pay the owners 80 per cent of the flock's value.

The department says there is no known cure for the disease. Destruction of infected birds is the only way to keep it from spreading.

Canyonville Boys Take Part In Marble Meet

The Annual Spring Handicap Tourney will be held Sunday through Thursday next week.

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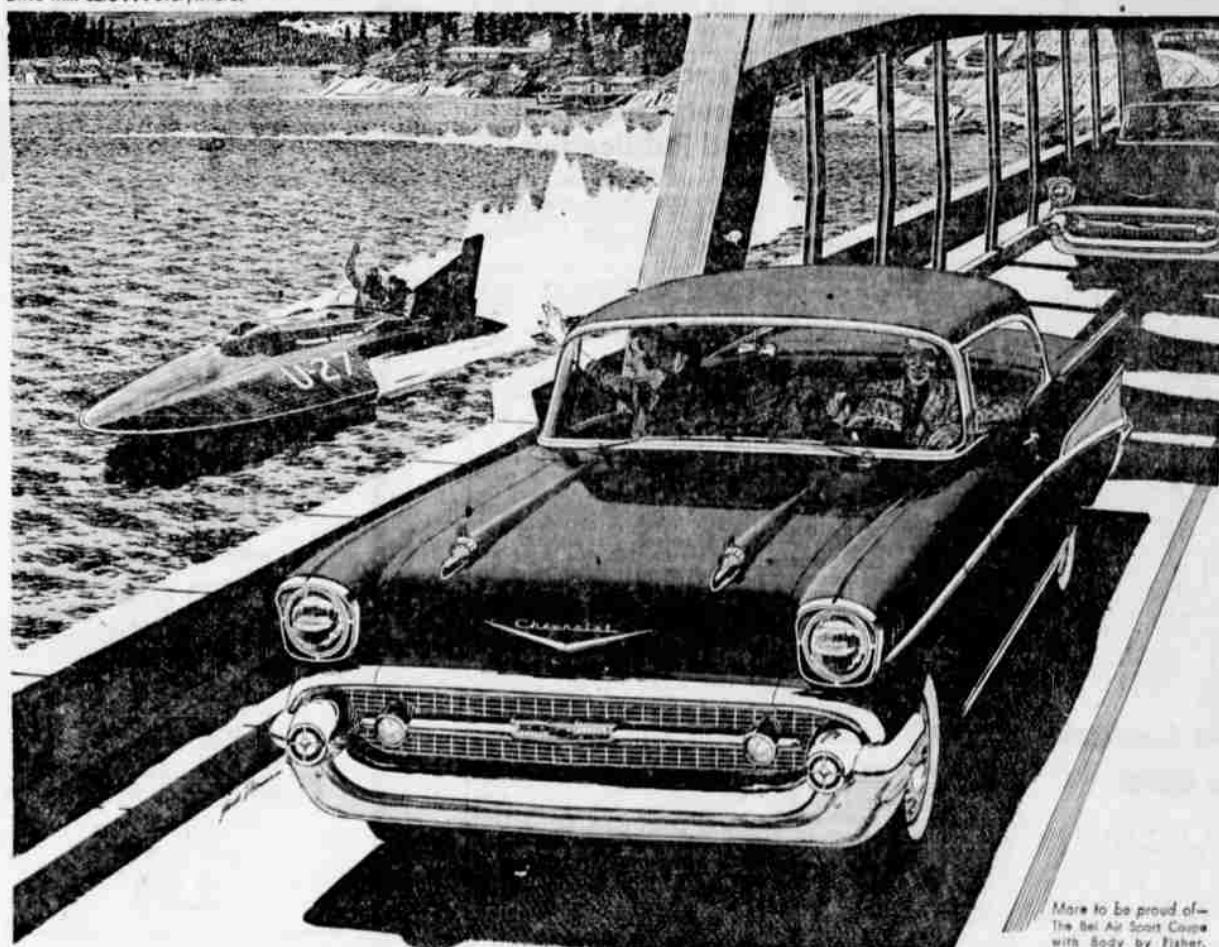
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
