

Harper Rehired For Head Baseball Job; Coach Added

Bill Harper, head basketball coach at Roseburg High School, has been announced as the new head baseball coach replacing Wayne Anderson who resigned to take the head coaching job at the University of Idaho.

Harper will still coach basketball in addition to his new job. Anderson, a former coach, was named as the new baseball coach in April in place of Don White who is moving to the new Madison High School in Portland.

Named to assist Harper in his job will be Arthur (Art) Thompson, a former high school graduate from LaGrande. Thompson will also be jayvee coach in basketball and frosh coach in football.

A former Idaho State college and Drake University student, Thompson received his education degree from Drake in 1953. He also holds a masters degree from the University of Oregon.

Thompson, who is 29 years old, will also teach general science in addition to his other coaching jobs. He has been assistant coach at Newberg.

He is married and has one child.

NCAA Rejects Washington Bid For Rowing Eligibility

CHICAGO (AP)—The NCAA Council took up the probation cases of Midwest and Southwest schools Saturday after rejecting the University of Washington's application to make its rowing crew eligible for the International Rowing Assn. championship regatta in Syracuse, N.Y. this month.

The petition vetoed by the council Friday said Washington felt the crew sport did not fit into the same category as other varsity sports.

"The council feels that rowing is an intercollegiate sport as much as swimming or cross country, for instance," said Walter Byers, NCAA executive director.

Washington, on probation for recruiting and irregularities in financial aid to athletes, has been ruled ineligible for all NCAA championship events and co-operating events. The regatta is listed under the latter.

The probation cases of the University of Oklahoma, University of Kansas, Texas A&M and Mississippi College came up for review Saturday.

Texas A&M has been cited for new violations of the Southwest Conference code. The school had been serving a one-year probation to end May 14.

Three days before this date, however, Texas A&M was charged with fresh violations and 14 1/2 week head basketball coach Ken Loeffler, who had been accused of recruiting malpractice, resigned.

Although the probation periods of all four schools technically have expired, council approval is required before full NCAA rights and privileges are restored.

Currently, nine other schools are under probation which expire on this timetable:

Ohio State, Aug. 21, 1957; University of California, Nov. 13, 1957; University of Louisville, May 1, 1958; University of Florida, May 1, 1958; University of Virginia, Aug. 21, 1958; University of Southern California, Nov. 13, 1958; Alabama Poly, May 1, 1959; UCLA Aug. 21, 1959; North Carolina State, Nov. 13, 1960.

Sharp two-hit pitching and heavy slugging by Glide pitcher Dick Smith enabled the Glide Wildcats to trim Burns 13-2 in a semi-final game of the state A-2 baseball playoffs Friday at Burns.

Glide will now meet Seaside for the state A-2 baseball crown next Saturday at Multnomah Stadium in Portland. Game time has been scheduled for 7 p.m.

Ace pitcher Dick Smith limited Burns to just two hits while his mates were collecting 12 off Burns pitcher Del Smith. For Burns it was the first loss of the year after nine straight wins.

Glide, the 1956 state B champion, opened the scoring in the first inning when with one out Bill Eswine walked followed by a single by Dan Kinne. Dick Smith then reached first on an error and then Al Smith singled to score Eswine.

Grand Slam
The Wildcats added four more runs in the second inning. Lee Holm walked with one out and Gary Wagner and Eswine singled to load the bases. Dick Smith then blasted the longest hit of the day, a home run into right-center field, for the four runs.

They added a single run in the third inning on a home run by John Livingston after one out.

Burns picked up a run in the fourth inning on a walk to Jim Ebar, an error on the Glide catcher on an overthrow to second and another error on a ground ball by Jim Womack that scored Ebar.

In the fifth inning for the Wildcats, Dick Smith as first man up in the inning blasted his second home run of the day in just about the same spot as the one before to give him a total of five runs batted in for the game.

Glide's big inning of the game was the seventh inning when they dented the plate with six big runs.

Kinne started the inning, was a walk followed by a single by Dick and Al Smith that loaded the bases. Kennedy then sacrificed K in a home with the first run of the inning followed by a walk to Livingston that loaded the bases again.

Holm then walked to force in a run, the second of the inning, and Wagner blasted a double to right that cleaned the bases. Eswine then singled to score Wagner with the final run of the inning.

The final run of the game was scored by Burns in the last of the seventh inning when Womack tripled for the second out, off Dick Smith and scored on a passed ball by Jim McCoy. Glide catcher, Smith struck out 11 Burns batters, walked one and hit one batter in one of the top pitching performances of the season. Dick Smith, losing pitcher for Burns, struck out 10 batters and walked four.

Leading hitter for Glide was a Smith with 3-4, including the two home runs. Wagner with 2-4 including a double, Eswine with 2-4 and Al Smith also with 2-4 were next in line, and McCoy, Dick Smith and Rothwell.

Senior Bill Oerding edged out Junior Ben Beamer for the batting title of the Roseburg High School baseball team for the 1957 season with a .362 average against Beamer's .361 mark.

Beamer was at bat three more times and got one more hit than Oerding, but missed the title by one point. Beamer was at bat more times than any one else on the squad, 72 times, with Oerding next with 69 times at bat and Ed LaRoque third with 65 times at bat.

Most hits for the year was nabbed by Beamer with a total of 26, followed by Oerding with 25 and LaRoque with 15.

In the strike-out department Rod Hoensch whiffed 20 times to take the lead in that department followed by Mike Hatfield with 18 and LaRoque with 17.
