

Roseburg Amateur Title Nabbed By Joe Hallmark

Joe Hallmark with a final 3 and 1 victory over medalist Woody Ball of Eugene, emerged as the winner of the Roseburg Amateur Golf Tournament. The tournament started Thursday and ended Saturday.

The victory for Hallmark marks the first time in the 10-year history of the tournament that a Roseburg golfer has won top spot.

Hallmark, ace of the Roseburg High School golf team this season, won four straight matches during the three-day tournament, and in doing so trimmed some of the finest golfers in the state.

Included among his victims was Ben Hughes, last year's tournament champion; Ball, this year's medalist; Pete Gerstner, Eugene, third best qualifier in this year's tournament, and Mike Lynch, Medford.

Roseburg golfers won four of the six flights played, missing a clean sweep only in the fourth and fifth flight.

Ball had advanced to the final with an easy 4 and 3 victory over Leighton Tuttle of Eugene. Tuttle before the semi-final round, had the best single round of the tournament with a three under par 33 on the third round.

Dr. Ralph Huestis of Roseburg was winner of the first flight with a 1-up victory over Bob Gasper of Cottage Grove. The final round went 20 holes before Huestis came out the winner. Huestis was forced to play 20 holes in his last three matches on his way to the top.

Second-flight winner was M. L. Hallmark of Roseburg with a victory over Gordy Marlatt of Eugene. Hallmark, father of young Joe, also marched through four opponents on his way to the top spot.

Third-flight winner was Ward Cummings, Roseburg, with a 3 and 1 victory over Bob Hamilton of Eugene.

Hugh Roberts, Cottage Grove, broke the Roseburg hold on first-place in flight action with a 2-up victory over Gene Hebrard, Medford, in the fourth flight. This was one of the two flights which did not have a Roseburg entrant in the finals.

In the fifth flight, DeRoss Kinkade of Cottage Grove downed Kim Cole, Portland, 4 and 3 to take the top place.

The other Roseburg flight winner was Jerry Kabler, who emerged with a 3 and 2 victory over Steve Fowler, also of Roseburg, in the sixth flight.

Game Commission Transfer To Take Pitney To Portland

William Pitney, Oregon Game Commission fishery management agent here for the last seven years, has been elevated to a new job. He will leave the Southwest Oregon Division office in Roseburg late this month to take over his job in the Portland office in the Basin Investigations Division. The division serves as a liaison group among public and private agencies developing water programs. It takes an active part in any basin development program in the state in which fish and wildlife are involved.

Pitney, his wife and two children will move to Portland this month. A replacement for Pitney in the Roseburg office has not yet been named, reports James Vaughn, regional administrator.

Pitney will leave behind one of the most fruitful fish development programs here in recent years. During his seven years here, he has had charge of hatchery plants, initiated intensive studies of summer steelhead and extensive angler effort and catch studies. He was in charge of the Winchester Dam counting station and was one of the leaders in the Diamond Lake poisoning and rehabilitation program.

Spring chinook have been released under his direction since 1951, and fall chinook and silver salmon since 1952.

Before coming to Roseburg, Pitney was at Florence in charge of aquatic week program. The program was later changed to the Oregon State College experiment station, and Pitney became fishery management agent of the Central Coast District for the commission. Pitney is a veteran of 17 years with the commission. Among his other jobs during the time was direction of stream surveys from along the entire Oregon coast.

PCL Asks Help From Big Loops

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP)—The Pacific Coast League went to the majors Monday for advice on how to survive if big league teams come to the West Coast.

The PCL directors also had a few survival suggestions of their own.

President Leslie O'Connor said the league leaders, in a closed five-hour session Sunday, directed him to write major league officials, in effect:

"You created our problem. Tell us what you can do to help us rather than destroy us."

The "problem" is the National League's permission for the Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Giants to go west, presumably to Los Angeles and San Francisco.

Change Not Approved
O'Connor emphasized the shift has not yet been approved. He said Dick Walsh, president of the Los Angeles Angels, reported that as far as he knew only the major league owners of the clubs involved know when a decision will be reached.

The directors, O'Connor said, were adamant on two points:

1. The Pacific Coast League will not be dropped from its "open" classification to a lower one.

2. All this talk of the majors moving west is hurting PCL attendance. Bob Cobb, Hollywood Stars president, estimated a \$500,000 loss at league games this year because of the reports.

League Seen Doomed
O'Connor said the directors unanimously agreed that the 33-year-old league would be doomed unless the majors cooperate in finding new cities to replace any lost teams. He said no potential cities were mentioned.

The PCL also wants a percentage of radio and television money from West Coast major league operations, he added.

Junior Riflemen Win At Ashland

Roseburg Junior Rifle Club teams finished one-two in the second annual indoor gallery rifle match held in Ashland Sunday in team shooting.

The team of Loren McClure, Dennis Gilkeson, Bob Flury and Larry McAllister took first place medals and the first place trophy with a combined score of 1,455. Each shooter shot 10 each from the prone, sitting, kneeling and standing positions.

McClure had a score of 371, Gilkeson 363, Flury 366 and McAllister 355 for the winning total.

In second place with a total of 1,407 was the team of Jerry Campbell, Lewis McAllister 363, Bob Blizard 353 and Ron Young 327.

First-place team won a permanent trophy and four gold medals and the second-place team won four silver medals.

In the individual firings, Roseburg entrants won three first-place medals, four second-place medals and one third-place.

Charlotte Gray was a double winner. She nabbed first in the class B 10-shot prone firing and first in all-around class B. The other first place was nabbed by Lewis McAllister in match three of the class A 10-shot kneeling with a score of 94x100.

A second-place winner in the meet was Campston in match one of the class A 10-shot prone firing with a score of 100x100. McClure also took second place in match two of Class A 10-shot sitting with a score of 98x100.

Other second-place winners were Darrell McAllister in the class B 10-shot sitting with a score of 98x100, and Gilkeson in match five of the aggregate shoot with 369.

Also with a 369 in match five of the aggregate shoot was Larry McAllister, who took third-place medal.

This was the last match of the year for the juniors.

Bowden Runs 3:58.7 Mile, Nation's 1st

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP)—Uncle Sam finally possesses a young man who has run the mile in less than four minutes, but it may be some time before he takes another crack at Australian John Landy's world record of 3:58 flat.

Determined Don Bowden, who toured four laps of the Baxter Stadium track at Stockton, Calif., Saturday night in a stunning 3:58.7, plans to concentrate on the half mile the rest of this season.

The 6-foot-3, long-striding University of California prelaw student finally cracked the foreign domination in the "Four-Minute Mile Club" with his virtual solo effort.

There were four other runners in the race. But Don set his own pace from the start and continually widened the gap until he hit the tape nearly 15 seconds ahead of the No. 2 man.

He was presented the trophy as the Pacific Assn. AAU Meet's outstanding man, even though less than half the events had been run. The 20-year-old native of San Jose, Calif., plagued by a heel injury last year, said his performance hadn't changed his plans for concentrating on the 880-yard run.

He won the latter event in a Pacific Coast Conference meet with a mark of 1:47.8. Next Saturday at Bakersfield he will run it in the Central California AAU meet.

Like 880 Run Better
"I like the half mile better, and I feel that I'm not strong enough to run several fast miles yet," the slim, 160-pound runner disclosed. Asked if he wouldn't like to run later against some of the foreigners who also have beaten four minutes, Don replied, "Yes, I would like that some time in the future."

METROPOLITAN, 800 top limit, down to the following eight teams, with The Allen as secretary: Howards Hardware, Postal Employees (or replacement), Pacific Plywood, Sutherland City Drive In, Myrtle Dairy, Del's Building Supply, Howards Men's Wear and Joe Richards' Men's Store (or replacement). It's full up now.

COMMERCIAL LEAGUE, with your columnist as secretary, has the following teams out of 10 last year: Bruton's Shoe Service, Bob & Gene's Union Gas, The Forrester, Moose Lodge, Chrystalline Tile, Umpqua Lions, Faith Lutheran Church, and possibly the Hardtoppers again. Team strength was upped to 830 sticks.

MERCHANTS LEAGUE, limiting to 760 pins, had Doe Foster as secretary and these teams signed up: Moose Lodge, Yoncalla Lions, Coca-Cola, Specialized Parts, Barcus Dodge, Roseburg Neon Signs.

JUNIOR CLASSIC has Dan Hill as secretary and certain members are Montgomery Ward, Douglas Veneer, Wallace & Hurd, Winston-Dillard Fire Department, Patterson's Bread and Pierce Auto Freight. The other half of this league will be called by Umpqua League with Barney Fenwick as secretary. Entrants to date: Curtis Bros. Furniture, Flegel Transfer, Rural Fire Department, West Coast Building Supply and Roseburg Motorcycle Club.

IT MUST be understood that any team or sponsor included in last year's competition must be given preference in filling up this year's leagues. After all such have been cared for, new sponsors may come in.

It will be noted that every night is filled with 32 teams except Monday and Wednesday. On Monday, the Elks plan to increase their representation to 16 teams, which will fill up that night. On Wednesday, there is room for two more eight-team leagues, and we have a number of applications from teams which bowled last season for them. It is only necessary to hold meetings and organize, and the city association secretary will help any teams to organize to fill up this hole.

THERE WERE 14 teams in the Metro and 12 in the Industrial. Cutting these down to eight teams each leaves 10 teams out of a spot. We suggest that these boys get together quick and assure themselves of a chance to enjoy their sport the coming season.
