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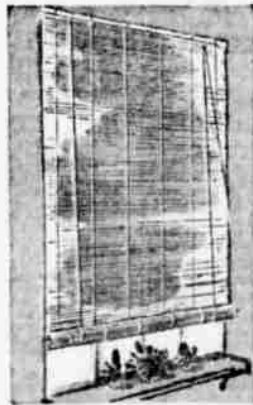

The trend in this popular flower is toward the low bushy types of Chrysanthemums that bloom in September and October.

Many gardeners are more inclined to let the experts grow the taller, larger flowered, spectacular types. It's more fun and less work to plant the bushy types.

Right now you can buy from the nurseries, well rooted cuttings that were placed in bands in February or March which are ready to set out. These will be labeled as to variety, type and color. The whole-sale growers try to keep the retail nurseries supplied with fresh stock and full assortments throughout the planting season.

CHRYSANTEMUM varieties have the surprising habit of blooming on schedule, whether planted early or late. Because of this you can have beautiful color combinations as well as a succession of color. By making proper selections,

you can be sure of continuous color from September into November. Included in the low growing or bushy types are: Cushion, decorative, pompom, and spoon. The heights vary from 12 to 30 inches, and the flowers are smaller than on taller growing varieties, but they appear in greater profusion.

Plant in full sun. Work in well rotted, weed-free manure when preparing the beds. Soil should be well drained. Although these varieties are naturally bushy, pinching back in the early stages of growth will encourage low branching.

WATER DEEPLY but not too often, just keep the soil moist. Use of mild liquid organic fertilizers will keep the plants growing steadily, but stop fertilizing as soon as buds are set.

Aphis and red spider are the chrysanthemum's worst enemies. Spray about every two weeks as a precaution. Control the aphis with nicotine sulphate, lindane or malathion. You can get red spider with malathion. Remember to keep bait around them, as around your other plants, for snails and slugs. These varieties may be grown in pots or boxes too. Use a potting mix containing equal proportions of sand, soil, and steer manure. Chrysanthemums grown in pots need frequent watering, generally every day in warm weather.
