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Just how much does pitching
count these days in the majors?
To the Chicago White Sox it
means a five-game American
League lead. And to the Phila-
delphia Phillies it means a sud-
den and surprising surge that now
has carried to within 1 1/2 games
of first place in the National.

The weak-hitting White Sox
lead the majors with 19 complete
games from their pitching staff.
The Phillies' staff tops the Na-
tional with 18.

Last night offered a pretty fair
example of how the two clubs
have been getting the job done.
Little Billy Pierce, the winningest
pitcher in either league, won his
ninth with a two-hitter that beat
the Boston Red Sox 1-0 in 10 in-
nings. It was Pierce's seventh
complete game.

The Phillies edged up on first
place Cincinnati by defeating the
Redlegs 3-1 on the three-hit pitch-
ing on Harvey Haddix, who won
his fourth.

The second-place New York
Yankees scored a 7-4 victory over
Cleveland. Baltimore beat the
Kansas City A's 9-7. Washington
knocked off Detroit 4-3.

While the Phillies who like the
White Sox have won seven of their
last nine games, were dumping
the Redlegs, the Brooklyn Dod-
gers claimed a full share of third
place, two games behind, with a
7-5 success over the Chicago Cubs.

Milwaukee Braves slipped into
fourth, three games back, with an
8-7, 13-inning defeat by the New
York Giants. Pittsburgh quit the
cellar with a 5-4 verdict over St.
Louis.

The White Sox have gotten com-
plete games in six of their last
seven victories and Pierce chipped
in his second in that span with a
seven-strike out job.

The Yankees slammed 12 hits,
one a ninth-inning home run by
Babe Ruth, and wrapped it up
with three-run bursts in the first
and third for Tom Sturdivant's
fourth victory. Mickey Mantle (3-
for-4), Yogi Berra (2-for-4) and
Bauer (1-for-4) fanned \$1,000 along
with Billy Martin and pitcher
Whitey Ford Monday for their
night club scrap — had half the
Yankees hits off loser Bud Daley
and two relievers.

The Phillies sent Brooks Law-
rence to his third defeat with a
pair of runs in the second on an
error, a triple by Chico Fernan-
dez and a sacrifice fly by Haddix.
Home runs by Duke Snider and
Gil Hodges helped the Dodgers to
a 7-0 lead, but Sandy Koufax then
collapsed, although gaining his
fourth victory with Clem Labine's
relief help. A two-run, sixth-inning
home by Bob Speake was the Cub's
first hit, but a three-run homer by
Ernie Banks started the young
southpaw on the way out in the
eighth.

A two-out single by Dusty
Rhodes won for the giants, who
also had home runs by Willie
Mays and Red Schoendienst. Al
Worthington won his sixth in re-
lief — by Frank Torre. Hank
Aaron, Carl Sawatski and Del
Crandall, Gene Conley lost it.

Two runs in the eighth brought
the Pirates from behind, with Dee
Fondy's RBI single the clincher.
Stan Musial hit a two-run homer.
George Kell became the 400th
player to make 2,000 hits in the
majors, getting three to spark
Baltimore's comeback victory. He
hit a two-run homer as the Orioles
wiped out a five-run Kansas City
lead in the fifth and then singled
for two more in the ninth.

Many Changes Mark Ring Magazine Ratings

NEW YORK (AP) — Beating Bob
Baker seems to be the way to get
into the heavyweight rankings.
Roy Harris, of Cut and Shoot,
Texas, followed the formula and
Wednesday was awarded the No. 9
position among the contenders in
the latest boxing rankings by
Ring Magazine.

There were many other changes
among the big boys and in the
other divisions.

Harold Carter, of Linden, N.J.,
joined the Army and lost his No. 3
ranking among the heavy-
weights until he returns to action.
Willie Pastrano, New Orleans,
Harold Johnson, Philadelphia, and
Bob Satterfield, Chicago, each
moved up a notch, to third, fourth
and fifth, respectively to fill in
the opening left by Carter. Hurri-
cane Jackson and Eddie Machen
retained their one-two positions.

Moore Advances
Archie Moore, the light heavy-
weight champion, was advanced
from eighth to sixth among the
heavies, and Ingemar Johansson,
Sweden's European champion, re-
turned to the elite list in the tenth
spot. Johansson had been dropped
previously for inactivity. He re-
gained his berth by knocking out
Henry Cooper.

Willi Hoepner's upset of Trin-
idad's Yolande Pompey boosted
the German back into the ratings
as No. 6 among the 175-pound
contenders. Pompey fell from sec-
ond to third, exchange places with
another German, Gerhard Hecht.

Sugar Ray Robinson was back
as champion of the middleweights
with Gene Fullmer, West Jordan,
Utah, the leading contender fol-
lowing their return bout. Joey Gi-
ambra, Buffalo, N.Y., and Joey
Giardello, Philadelphia, both
made progress in the 160-pound
division. Giambra went from sixth
to fourth and Giardello from sev-
enth to fifth.

Giardello's narrow victory over
Rory Calhoun, White Plains,
N.Y., earned him Ring's fighter
of the month award.

Speed Impresses Bonus Receiver

NEW YORK (AP) — Bob Taylor,
the Milwaukee Braves' \$112,000,
18-year-old bonus catcher, said to-
day he didn't get much kick out
of watching his first game as a
major leaguer.

"I never get a bang out of a
game that my team loses," ex-
plained the husky, sandy-haired
lad.

Taylor, from Metropolis, Ill.,
joined the Braves yesterday and
was in the bullpen last night. The
New York Giants licked the
Braves 8-7 on Dusty Rhodes' sin-
gle in the 13th inning.

Taylor didn't get in the game,
but he warmed up both Warren
Spahn and Taylor Phillips.

"And let me tell you," he said,
"there's the big difference be-
tween high school ball and the
majors. The way those guys throw
is really something."

"To tell the truth, I didn't get
much of a chance to form im-
pressions, because I spent the
the whole game in the bullpen and
you can't see much from there.
I couldn't even watch our catcher
(Del) Crandall."

high school — four each in track,

Northwest League fans received
a heaping measure of hits, runs
and errors Tuesday night, with
the Eugene Emeralds and Tri-
City playing to a 13-inning, 13-13
tie in a game called because of
the league curfew.

The Salem Senators pushed
across 13 runs in the fourth in-
ning to drop Yakima's Bears 17-
10 and the Wenatchee Chiefs elob-
bered Lewiston, 16-7.

The Braves outthrew Eugene 18-13
but committed five errors to one
by the Emeralds. Two unearned
runs by Eugene in the ninth in-
ning helped send the contest into
extra innings. The game will be
completed later.

Eighteen Senators paraded to
the plate in the fourth inning as
Salem batters pounded four Yaki-
ma hurlers for 15 hits. Yakima
got eight hits and committed
three errors to Salem's two. The
six pitchers on both sides gave
up a total of 30 walks.

A total of 31 hits were pounded
out in the Wenatchee-Lewiston
game, 19 of them by the winning
Chiefs. Both squads bobbled the
ball twice. Ted Tappe got a three-
run homer for the Chiefs in the
first inning and Ron Carlon dit-
toed for the Braves in the second
frame.

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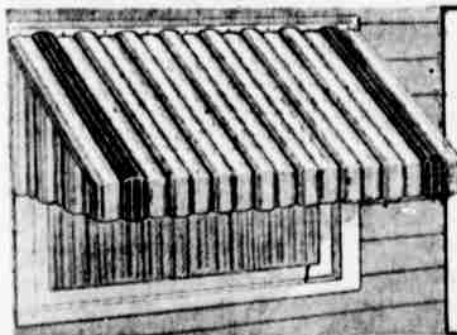
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
